More than 100 Oakridge residents chartered the Oakridge Neighborhood Association, Aug. 26, by ratifying the association's bylaws and electing a slate of officers. Six permanent committees were formed with a combined initial membership of more than 50 volunteers. Summaries of committee activities are presented on Pages 2-3.

Scott Youzva, 2706 Big Oaks, was elected president of the association. Scott owns a distribution and marketing company, and has lived in Oakridge 10 years. He and wife Denise have four girls.

Jack Rash, 2113 Windy Ridge, was elected vice-president. He is a writer and video producer. He and wife Carolyn have lived in Oakridge 6 years.

Jerry Horn, 3710 Big Oaks, recently retired from Mobil Oil Corp., was elected secretary. Jerry and wife Joan have lived in Oakridge 7 years.

JoAnn Schmerheim, who lists one of her many occupations as "full-time golfer," was elected Treasurer. JoAnn and husband Wally have been Oakridge residents for 6 years.

The first chartered meeting of the Association was held September 30, at the Oakridge Country Club. All six standing committees presented reports on proposed projects and objectives, and nominations were received for the five District Director positions specified in the bylaws.

The next general meeting of the Association is set for October 28, at the Oakridge Country Club. A cash-bar social will start at 7:00pm; the meeting will convene at 7:30 pm. No general meetings are scheduled in November and December.

Youth, Seniors Groups Organize

The Civic and Political Interest Committee has begun efforts to organize both youth and seniors organizations within the Oakridge neighborhood. According to Chairperson **Donna Dayhoff**, the Committee feels that sufficient support and benefit exists to justify creation of the two groups.

The Committee also is working toward creating an Emergency Network program that would respond to family emergencies in the neighborhood.

Other Committee activities include the establishment of a program to provide at least one ONA representative to all meetings of the Garland City Council, and the collection of zoning information for areas surrounding Oakridge. The Committee plans to publish this information in a coming issue of the Oakridge News.

Communications Committee Publishes First Newsletter

The OAKRIDGE News (which you are reading) was published by the ONA Communications Committee. The newsletter published activities of the six ONA standing committees, features on Oakridge residents, calendars, meeting notices, etc. (Your job is to read the whole thing and find out everything!)

Immediate plans are for the newsletter to continue on a monthly publication schedule at least through December, 1992. During that time, the letter will be distributed door-to-door to every household in Oakridge. After that time, the Committee is considering a recommendation to produce a bi-monthly edition only to ONA Members.

"The effort involved the Committee, the officers, advertisers, volunteers, and drafted recruits," said Diana Berry, chairperson of the Committee. "Jack Rash (ONA vice-president) and I did most of the writing and paste-up, but alot of people supported this effort in a number of ways."

The newsletter has been a major focus of the Committee for the past month. It hasn't been the only focus, however.

In the second meeting in as many months, the Committee drafted proposed editorial polices and advertising rates, and decided to develop an ongoing sign program to announce important events in the community.

The Communications Committee has only a handful of members to accomplish some very big objectives. If you have time, the Committee can use writers, artists, printers, graphic designers, desktop publishers, advertising salespersons, or just anyone interested in getting information out to our community. Financial Guidelines Set

Members of the ONA Finance Committee have created a preliminary set of guidelines for handling the Association's finances. According to Committee Chairperson Pat Downing, 530-4192, the guidelines hinge on a comprehensive budget, submitted by each Committee, and approved by the Board of Directors.

As envisioned, each committee will prepare a monthly budget for submittal to the Finance Committee. The Committee will review each budget and then forward it to the Board of Directors with recommendations. Disbursements are made when a previously approved invoice is received and approved for payment by the Finance Committee Chairperson and the Association's vice-president. The approved invoice is then sent to the treasurer for payment.

The Committee recommended that all checks drawn on the Association's account be signed by two officers of the Association. It excluded the vice-president as an endorser because he or she will be approving invoices for payment.

The Committee is working on otherguidelines and on assisting with the budgeting process.

Crime Committee Asks for Help

Following a survey by the Garland Traffic Dept., the Crime Prevention and Safety Committee is developing a sign program to encourage drivers to slow down throughout Oakridge. The signs, donated by Peggy Richey of Ebby Halliday Realtors, will carry various types of messages and will be moved around from time to time so their message will remain fresh.

The traffic department surveyed the number and speed of vehicles on DiamondOaks for a THREE DAY period. In that period, 5,598 vehicles drove on Diamond Oaks. The average speed of all vehicles was 39.6 MPH, with 12% of all cars and trucks driving in excess of 55 MPH!

Lt. Steve Jansen of the Garland Traffic Dept. said he was "very surprised" by the volume of people that use Diamond Oaks and "very concerned" about the high rates of speed. Jansen said his department will look into some solutions.

In the meantime, the Committee urges ALL Oakridge residents to drive the speed limit (30 mph on the streets and 10 mph in the alleys). "If YOU drive the speed limit," said Chairperson Luanne Payne, the guy behind you can't speed."

In other actions, the Committee proposed preparing a monthly crime-prevention tip for publication in the *ONA News*. Dennis Cheatam volunteered to initiate this program.

The Committee is asking for "Block Watch" volunteers to represent the Committee's programs to 10-12 homes on their block. "Block Watchers" will keep an eye out around the neighborhood and volunteer to do such things as pick up newspapers for out-of-town neighbors. The Committee feels there should be at least two Block Watchers for every 10 homes. If you want to volunteer or if you want additional information, call Luanne at 530-9323.

The Garland Police Department is seeking information about a suspect in a reported molestation of an elementary-school student, Oct. 3 near the creek by Davis Elementary. The suspect is a white male, about 35 years old, 6-ft, 200-210 lbs., with short black or brown hair. He reportedly had with him a medium-sized brown dog named "Brownie." If you have an information about this case, please call the Garland Police Dept.

200 By January Set as Goal

The Membership Committee has set a membership goal of 200 households by January 1, 1993, and 300 households by June 1. According to Committee Chairperson Sue Sweetnam, "the goal may seem high right now, but we think it is attainable."

Currently, there are 112 household memberships in the ONA.

Several membership development programs have been initiated by the Committee, including sponsorship of a hayride and consideration of hosting a new member breakfast.

The Membership Committee produced the new-member packets and name badges for the last general meeting of the Association. The packets that were not picked up will be available at the Oct. 28 general meeting. All packets not picked up will be distributed after the October meeting.

Work already has begun on preparing the Membership Directory, which will be published early in 1993.

The Membership Committee needs volunteers, both to serve on the permanent committee and to help with special projects. Please call Sue at 495-3948 if you have a spare hour or two a month to help promote membership in the ONA.

Entries Cleaned by Volunteers

The Environmental Committee has undertaken several projects, including the first-ever, organized clean-up of Oakridge's entryways. The clean-up was done Oct. 3 by approximately 20 volunteers.

On-going maintenance of the entryways has been a priority item at both meetings of the Committee. Representatives of the Committee have met with various city officials concerning a cooperative approach to maintaining both the entryways and the areas between the street and the brick wall that surrounds Oakridge.

As a part of that effort, and to help Oakridge residents with their own landscaping, the Committee is seeking to establish a garden club for all Oakridgeresidents. If you are interested in joining the garden club, please contact the Environmental Committee Chairpersons Ron and Pam Harbach at 530-5024.

Recycling is another interest of the Committee. Joan Nichols, who says she recycles practically everything, has agreed to share her recycling expertise through the pages of future editions of this newsletter. If you would like to help Joan or find out more about recycling, call her at 414-9274.

Another area of interest for the Committee is deed restrictions. The Committee plans to compile a complete set of deed restrictions for all areas of Oakridge. As soon as this project has been completed, the Committee will publish a number you can call for information regarding restrictions in your area of the neighborhood.

Most of the reactions to date have been in favor of ONA assuming the responsibilities of the Crime Watch Program as outlined by the Garland Police Dept. The ONA Crime Prevention & Safety Committee plans to publish the results of the survey in the Nov. issues of the ONA News.



As I See it.. by Diana Berry

It was a day I'll never forget. I couldn't figure out where 30 or so neighbors came from, how they got there or even why they were there. My 47 year old father was playing racquet ball, my 56 year old mother was recovering from breast cancer surgery and I, an only child almost 18, was primping to spend an evening with my school friends.

The phone call came, I was needed at the hospital, my dad had taken ill. I went to the emergency room, and was told that he had died instantly of a heart attack. I was in shock. Upon my return home, cars and people were everywhere. I don't think I could have ever made it through that day if it hadn't been for the care and concern from those people, yes, all neighbors. It was the extended family I needed.

This closeness didn't happen overnight, the people in my neighborhood, knew each other, helped each other, bought and sold to one another, long before the concept of networking ever was used or abused. They unified against city invasion, fought against crime, and had more fun as a team then I can even imagine. There was the polyanna group, rowdy group, the social circle, the introverts and extroverts, every walk of life in a variety of packages, from the reverend to the rumored mafia man. By taking the risk of developing relationships people had agreements and disagreements, made life-long friends, bickered, negotiated and resolved alot of issues.

As friends and neighbors we laughed, cried, fought and defended each other. As an adult I envy "my old neighborhood" where people had enough courage to dance close enough to sometimes step on each others toes.

Today, how refreshing to see in our neighborhood of Oakridge people coming together organizing an association with the purpose of making our homes a part of a sharing community so that we can live safer, beautify our surroundings, and be a voice together. I pray my misfortunes will not happen to any family within our community, but as a neighbor if I can provide support, count me in... I hope you will join us, too!.

A resident of Oakridge, David Vinson of Willow Ridge, did not stop at shaking his head. He reacted quickly, and called the newspaper with an offer to help. When he learned that no information could be released, he contacted the Dallas Police Dept., but was unable to reach the dectective assigned to the case. With tenacity, David caught the attention and cooperation of an Onduty dective who responded to David's intentions of replacing the young man's bike.

Trying to remain anonymous, David, his wife Debbie, and their three daughters, shopped most of the day, trying to find an identical replacement. After several stores, they couldn't locate an exact duplicate. The Vinsons decided to contact the victim's family through the police department to find out the child's second choice for make, model, and color.
