ONA Minutes from General Meeting

Oakridge Neighborhood Association Mtg. held at the Oakridge Country Club.

At 3:30 pm. President Scott Youzva called the meeting to order Scott named Sue Hageland as Parliamentarian.

Scott announced the Agenda for the meeting. Scott introduced the Board of Officers.

Jan Dolph, Garland Recycling Coordinator, gave a presentation regarding the recycling process, including a display of the 18 gallon bin to be used. She also indicated that a flyer will be circulated, explaining the products to store in the bins. Newspapers will continue to be picked up separately.

Cheryl Woods, Oakridge Parade Coordinator, discussed the procedures for the Oakridge July 4 parade, which will be held on 7-3-93. Parade will start at 9 :30 am at Oakridge CC, with prizes being awarded to the best participants. A parade permit is required at a cost of \$25. Flyers will be sent to announce the events.

Amy Mackey, Oakridge Swim Team Coordinator, announced the start-up of the children swim team and was recruiting participants. She indicated that they had a new coach this year and a meeting has been scheduled for 5/19, at 6:30 pm at Oakridge. The age group is from 5 through 17 and you must be a member of Oakridge. The first meet is June 14.

Mike Holden, City Councilman, announced some changes in the Recycling procedures. Pickup for grass clippings will be once a week and another pickup, once a week for papers. He also spoke about the Spring Creek Festival and stated flyers were distributed, as well as a notice in the Association newsletter. Volunteers to assist in the Festival are needed.

JoAnn Schmerheim, Treasurer, read the Treasurer's report indicating a current balance of \$6808.07. Motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the treasurer's report. Pat Downing, Finance Committee Chairperson, stated that copies of the proposed budget for the next Fiscal year were placed on the tables for the members' review. Pat stated that the Budget was based on continuing the Members Dues at \$25. Debbie Stucker raised some questions regarding the expenses budgeted for printing of the newsletter. Pat stated that the newsletter is one of our cost important assets and that we may have to go "outside" to continue the level of communication.

Wally Schmerheim indicated that the price for currently printing the newsletter is a real bargain. Motion was made, seconded and carried to adopt the Budget as presented. Motion was made, seconded and carried to retain the membership dues at \$25.

Jerry Horn, Secretary, read the minutes of the previous Association meeting held on 3/31/93. Motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the minutes as read.

Jack Rash, Vice-President, stated there were no further Committee reports. Donna Dayhoff, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, thanked all the individuals contacted by the committee and also thanked the committee members. Donna then read the following recommendations of the committee for the upcoming elections.

Scott asked each candidate to present a brief talk about themselves and why they are seeking election to their respective offices. Scott mentioned all ballots must be signed.

Mark Muerer stated that the individuals contacted by the nominating committee expressed their appreciation for being considered for possible positions. A recess was then called to allow the members to vote.

Using the preliminary budget, the Committee developed a Chart of Accounts for the organization. With these accounts, we will also prepare, no less than quarterly, a Budget/Variance report to track the operations with our initial forecasts. In addition, the Committee will also prepare quarterly reconciliations of the books.

These policies were the last additions to the Accounting Policies and Procedures presented to the Board.

HOME WORKS

HI! This is a new feature for the OAKRIDGE NEWS. In this column we'll deal with various aspects of home maintenance and repair. Each month we'll tackle a different and seasonal problem or project. With over 15 years experience as a professional handyman, I have a good idea of the types of things that can be done by the average homeowner and which ones need to be left to the professionals.

I'll try to walk you through the basic repairs and maintenance around your house.

After receiving our latest electric bill, it occurred to me that this is a very good time to talk about tips to save your money and at the same time to make your home a more comfortable place to live.

What I'm talking about is the caulking around your doors and windows. These two often-neglected areas can greatly affect the efficiency of your a/c and the health of your bank account.

The first thing to do is to make a visual inspection of all doors and windows. If the existing caulk is cracked, split, dried or missing, IT NEEDS HELP!

Step One:
Clean the windows between the frame and the wall by using a stiff-blade putty knife and a utility knife. Clean out the joint so it is dry and free of pieces of the old caulking

Step Two:
Go to a good paint store or Home center, and buy some 15 year caulking compound. One tube should be enough for approximately 1.5 to 2 windows, depending on window size. Don't forget to pick up a caulk gun, it'll be worth the \$5.00 you'll spend on it.

When choosing your caulk, the best color is white. It can be painted any color, or it can be left as it is. Your second color choice is clear, but be sure it is the type that can be painted.

Step Three:
Go Home!

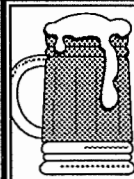
Step Four:
Cut the end of the tube, cutting an opening about the size of a pencil lead. Cut the tip at a 45% angle. Holding the flat side of the cut against the joint where the window meets the wall, squeeze the handle of the gun and run a bead of the caulk along the entire length of the seam.

After you have caulked one side, or the top or bottom, dampen your finger with water and smooth the bead of caulk.

ONE HINT....PRACTICE ON THE WINDOWS ON THE BACK YARD FIRST!

Doors are done the same, but be sure not to gouge or splinter the wood on the door jam. Simple Enough? I think so.

Most companies offer either a defined benefit plan - one that guarantees a specific benefit upon retirement that depends upon factors such as years of service - or a defined contribution plan in which both employer and employee contributions accumulate tax-deferred.
