National Night Out is America's Night Out Against Crime. This year it will be Tuesday, August 2, 1994. You can easily participate by turning your front porch light on at 6:00 pm until dark. DINING IN STYLE

A dining room should harmonize with the other formal areas of the home, particularly the living room and foyer. A radical difference--going abruptly, for example, from a Queen Anne living room into a minimalist dining room--can be something of a shock to guests. It is especially important when a dining area is open to the living room, that it blend with the living room's style.

The formal areas should have some unifying factor—color, is the most frequent intermediary. For example, a living room with a color scheme that consists primarily of 60% hunter green, 30% raspberry and 10% royal blue (as an accent) could be reversed in a dining room and contain

60% raspberry, 30% hunter green and 10% royal blue, or some other accent color.

Window treatments are another avenue to unify the areas. The style of a window treatment can either be repeated in both rooms, perhaps with different or coordinating fabric, or the same fabric could be used in compatible styles. An example of this would be formal swags and jabots in a traditional living room and a Chippendale, or step-shaped, cornice in the dining room. If the rooms are open to each other, it is best to use the same style of treatment in matching or coordinating fabrics.

For years, it's been customary to purchase dining room "suites", in which all the pieces match. Today, antiquated customs are giving way to a more free, design - your-own style, and it is becoming increasingly popular to mix styles within the rooms, although it is not wise to use one style in one room and an entirely different style in another.

For example a contemporary table and chairs can team up with an ornate periodpiece--an armoire or sideboard--to the decorative benefit of both. The living room and/or foyer should have a similar mix. There is a definite movement towards an eclectic blending. This is not to be confused with "hodgepodge", which uses little or no discrimination when combining pieces.

Handsome dining rooms come in all shapes, sizes, colors, and styles, white skill-fully harmonized to enhance the pleasures of a well-prepared meal.

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

TAX APPRAISAL VALUE -vs-SOLD VALUE by: Peggy Richey

Allow me to thank those of you who called me for assistance in fighting the appraisal district over the increase in property taxes this year. Some of you were surprised to find that the increase was still less than the value of your property and in some minor instances the appraisal district actually lowered your property value.

The property value that determines your taxes may or may not be the selling value of your home. When the market values were decreasing at an alarming rate in the middle to late 1980's, many owners were successful in having their tax values lowered, which subsequently lowered their taxes. Periodically we still find homes with tax value rates higher than current sold prices, but in some other cases they are well below the selling value. I do not know what formula or method is used for determining value for tax purposes. Please check before you go to the district because as your values might be below solds in the area and you run the risk that the tax appraisal district could increase your tax value. It would seem that the tax value and selling value would be the same, but that is not always the case.

Allow me to touch on one other issue. Appraisals are done for several reasons. The fact that you have refinanced your home and the appraisal was a given price may or may not be the value that a buyer is willing to pay. The values given to you by a realtor take into consideration not only condition and design, but also current competition in the market place. Competition is one of the largest factors in price. As the inventory decreases, the values will start to rise. Be assured that the taxing authorities will be watching these increases and you may see small rises each year in your tax base if values begin to increase.

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

A couple of ONA Officers are trying to negotiate a deal with the City of Garland to assist in improving the appearance of the entire Oakridge perimeter. Whatever deal they are able to strike, WILL REQUIRE some participation by the residents of Oakridge.

We've already solicited bids for just mowing and trash pick-up for the entire perimeter. We would have to **DOUBLE** our membership to meet most of the bids. (And that doesn't include any plants or grass we might want to plant.)

We hope our Association's negotiators are successful in getting some assistance from the City. And there is a good chance they will. The City of Garland, under the old City Manager, had adopted a very aggressive program of supporting neighborhood associations that were willing to contribute either manpower or money to help improve the look of the neighborhood. What the City will contribute now, will be a pretty good indication of how the in-coming administration feels about neighborhood associations.

We're fortunate to have Richard Fricks as our district's representative to the Garland City Council. He was very active in Camelot's neighborhood association, and has been to just about every ONA meeting since our first one a little more than 2 years ago.

Whatever the city is or is not able to do, we as residents of this community need to address the overall appearance of Oakridge. Inside these walls are some very beautiful homes with manicured lawns, a golf course, and beautiful plants, trees, and shrubs. OUTSIDE these walls are some pretty ugly sights, including our own wall.

Only about one-third of you have joined the ONA. It seems reasonable, indeed, that DOUBLING our membership is not that far out of the question... if more of us get tired of seeing ugly walls.

ENTRY WAY MAINTENANCE- \$438 PER MONTH WHAT DO WE GET FOR OUR MONEY?

<u>WEEKLY</u> - mowing, edging, trimming, blowing of walk ways, and litter pick up on each visit.

ONCE MONTHLY - shrub trimming.

4 TIMES PER YEAR -turf grass fertilization and shrub fertilization.

<u>SPRING AND FALL</u> - seasonal flower bed preparation. This does <u>not</u> include flowers.

NOT INCLUDED IN MONTHLY CONTRACT:

- Soil additives for flower beds.
- Dead shrub replacement.
- Irrigation Inspection- we are in need of a preventive maintenance irrigation program. This should be on a monthly basis in order to handle the irrigation system efficiently.

Most of the 35 to 40 neighbors who attended reported a "really great time." No organized activities were planned other than what turned out to be a fantastic pot-luck supper. And the only planning for that was that Ken provided his front yard, a few tables and chairs, and an occasional forgotten napkin or spoon. Everyone was told to bring anything to eat they wanted, their own plate and silverware, and their own drink. If you wanted something other than the ground to sit on, you could bring that, too.

Ken spent several trips up and down the one block of Windy Ridge to secure the signatures of every resident, saying that it was ok to have the party. The form, which he had obtained from the City, was returned with all the signatures. He then printed up a flyer on his computer, advertising the event and inviting people on Windy Ridge to invite our neighbor behind us.

The City came at the appointed time and erected barricades at either end of our block. When the party was over, they came and removed them.

The weather cooperated, the kids played nice, and the adults chowed down on good food and good conversations with our neighbors. A few came from other streets, and even one former resident came to tell us how he missed the old neighborhood.

It was nice getting to know people you hadn't met and discovering you have common interests other than your residence. The party lasted 2 hours, and probably would have gone on further had not a rude thunderstorm moved through the area.

The residents of Windy Ridge wish to thank Ken for his efforts. He says he will do it again this Fall or next Spring. Judging from the positive response, if Ken can't find the time, someone else will.
