

After receiving the July report last month with 20 offenses, I can say I was relieved to get the August report with only 7 offenses. This decrease of 13 offenses was a dramatic drop from the previous month. Only one of these crimes was committed after August 15, the date Garland schools reconvened for the 1994-95 school year.

I would like to comment on the Oakridge Homeowners Association (0NA) meeting, held September 15th at the Country Club. We had the privilege of having Mr. John Sholden, who is currently running for Justice of the Peace and Detective Joe Harn, who is assigned to the Intelligence Unit to monitor gangs in Garland. Mr. Sholden was the former Dallas County Assistant District Attorney in charge of gang prosecutions. He and his family are also residents of Oakridge. The program was very well presented and all those who attended left much more informed on the gang problems and what is being done to prevent it from growing in the City of Garland.

The month of October is Crime Prevention Month, so let's try to stay on our toes and be alert! As McGruff says, "Take a bite out of crime"!

ACCESSORIZING TIPS

Give your rooms a pleasing personality -choose the right accessories. A home should reflect the personality of those who live in it through its accessories. You may want to display your prized collections, family heirlooms, or choose the things that give the room a pulled together look. Accessories are grouped as functional or decorative. The functional group includes mirrors, clocks, lights, books, and pillows, while paintings, sculptures, plants, and small antiques are in the decorative category.

A good starting place is to consider everything you presently have. It can be challenging to find the right spot for your favorite things. Keep those that are the right color and size for your bare

places. Do you want to achieve a clean or cluttered look? A contemporary room usually has few accessories while a country room may have dozens.

The design principles of balance and proportion are important in the arrangement of accessories. A single tiny cup and saucer would be out of scale on a large coffee table and a large ginger jar lamp would overwhelm a small coffee table. There are two things to remember when working with a grouping: an odd number of anything is more pleasing than an even number and nothing should be displayed by itself unless it deserves to stand alone.

If your budget won't allow you to do everything you want to do, consider investing in one "good" item instead of ten cheap ones. This will aid you in making a visual statement.

DID YOU KNOW !!!

As residents of this community, we all have a responsibility for the maintenance of our home and property. Studies have shown that individuals do not violate City ordinances because of neglect or lack of concern. Most often, violations are noted when average citizens are unaware of their current responsibilities regarding municipal residential regulations.

One of the major areas of concern handled by the Code Enforcement Division.

High Grass or Weeds on Premises

High grass/weeds are considered a violation of municipal codes when growth exceeds 12 inches in height. When grass/weeds exceed 12 INCHES in height on the following residential property a violation is noted

Front Yard


Back Yard

Side Yard

Alley

Parkway.

Normally, a period of ten (10) days is allotted to residents for corrective action to be taken.



From The City of Garland Code Enforcement Department

A garage sale shall include "yard sale," "patio sale," "plant sale," "sample sale," or other similar terms. Garage sales require a permit. Such permit shall be issued for a sale period not to exceed more than three consecutive days, excluding holidays, and not more than three garage sales shall be permitted for the same location in any calendar year. Provisions of the sign ordinances shall apply. To apply for garage permit call 205 -3374 Fine(150.00)

Signs on public property (sec. 30.91) except as specifically authorized in this chapter, no person shall attach any sign, paper, or other material or paint, stencil, or write any name number or otherwise mark any sidewalk, curb, gutter, street, tree, utility pole, traffic sign, traffic light standard, public building, public fence or public structure. This section shall not prohibit the posting of government signs or the painting or attaching of street address numbers to curb.

Fine (250.00)


Signs in right-of-way prohibited (sec.30.90) except as specifically authorized in this chapter, no sign shall be erected or affixed within or project over any public right-of- way. This section shall not be construed so as to prohibit the carrying or displaying of signs by any person so long as such sign is not connected or affixed to the real property comprising the public right-of way, its fixtures and appurtenances. Structures in the central area zoning districts may have signs projecting over the public sidewalk

- 1. Garage sales
- 2. Business
- 3. Real estate weekend directional signage (allowed)
 - A. 45" from intersection
 - B: Additional emergency lighting on sign trucks
- Political sign -handled by neighbor hood code enforcement Fine (250.00)

BLOCK CAPTAIN GUIDELINES

- 1. Serve as a liaison between residents and coordinator.
- 2. Recruit new watch members, striving for 100% participation in the block or blocks for whichyou are responsible.
- 3. Assist coordinator in planning meetings and activities.
- 4. Maintain list of participating members, including name, address, phone numbers.
- Distribute newsletters to each home on your street.
 (DO NOT PUT THEM IN MAILBOXES, as this is a federal offense.) Newsletters should be placed under doormats or on door handle if there is no doormat.
- Check on empty homes and remove door hangers or other ads.
- 7. Maintain checking of members homes when on vacation.
- 8. Attend all block captain meetings whenever possible.

These are guidelines set by the Police Department for each Crime Watch program to go by. I always tell my block captains that they are probably already doing most of these things by being a good and trustworthy neighbor.
