



January 5, 1994 7:00 p. m. Oakridge Country Club

Attendees: Jo Ann Schmerheim, Barbara Muller, Ron Harbach, Ron Horan, Luanne Payne, Lila La Grassa and Bonnie Fisk.

Several members were unable to attend so an informal meeting was held.

Jo Ann announced that Luanne Payne has been appointed to the Oakridge Country Club Board of Directors as a representative of the Oakridge Neighborhood Association (ONA).

Jo Ann thanked the board members for their efforts in the recent money making projects benefiting ONA. She also commented on the excellent clean up job our maintenance contractor had done on the Shiloh side of Oakridge. There were many weed trees and other debris that was removed.

Membership now stands at 351. All those attending were pleased to hear of the increase.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE- Ron Harbach, The sprinklers on Diamond Oaks may have a leak somewhere because there is standing water near the controls. Overview was shut off because of malfunctioning. Repairs will be postponed until spring. The maintenance contractor has done a good job this past year. Jo Ann instructed Ron to get bids on sprinkler maintenance and clean up and maintenance of Shiloh and Buckingham.


(Hopefully our membership will increase so we can add these services to our maintenance contract.) The City of Garland maintains Beltline and the City of Richardson maintains Jupiter.

Take a break from the kids and join other Moms at our next regular meeting on Tuesday, January 1 Orb at 1 p. m. We will be meeting at the Oakridge Country Club to have dinner as well as elect officers, make or change guidelines, discuss future programs and enjoy each other's company. So if you would like to have some input regarding the structure and direction of the Cc-op, we strongly encourage you to attend this meeting.

BLOCK CAPTAIN GUIDELINES

- 1. Serve as a liaison between residents and coordinator.
- 2. Recruit new watch members, striving for 100% participation in the block or blocks for which you are responsible.
- 3. Assist coordinator in planning meetings and activities.
- 4. Maintain list of participating members, including name, address, phone numbers.
- 5. Distribute newsletters to each home on your street.

(DO NOT PUT THEM IN MAILBOXES, as this is a federal offense.) Newsletters should be placed under doormats or on door handle if there is no doormat.

- 6. Check on empty homes and remove door hangers or other ads.
- 7. Maintain checking of members homes when on vacation.
- 8. Attend all block captain meetings whenever possible.

These are guidelines set by the Police Department for each Crime Watch program to go by. I always tell my block captains that they are probably already doing most of these things by being a good and trustworthy neighbor.

ATTENTION BLOCK CAPTAINS

I want to personally thank each of you who are block captains and to let you know that I appreciate you representing your street or block and helping to deter crime in our neighborhood. In talking to many of you, I feel a sense of neighborliness returning to the neighborhood. I know I have met so many nice families through my contact as the Crime Watch Chairperson. This job is very important to me and I want you, as a block captain, to feel that your job is important also. With a contact person on each street, I feel as though we can cut down on all the criminal mischief reports. The stronger the system is, the better it works.

So even if you don't hear from me every month, I definitely know you are there and I can count on you. Your help in delivering the newsletters each month is extremely helpful and is very important. The newsletter is the main source of communication we have to get vital information out to each household in Oakridge. If anyone wants to volunteer, you may contact me, Luanne Payne, at 530-9323 or leave a message on the Voice Mail, at 220-2286. A few streets still need a representative and some streets need more than one. Again, I want to thank you all for your continued support and hard work.

To be a Block Captain. You need just to be a loyal and trustworthy neighbor who is willing to keep an eye on your neighbor's house while they are away, pick up newspapers and mail, and report any suspicious activities.

Our goal is to have a Block Captain for every 6 to 10 houses. With approximately 1,200 homes in Oakridge, we have a long way Oakridge News
