The speed limit is 20 mph and the fines are very high if you get caught speeding. Also, remember to STOP whenever you see a school bus loading or unloading children. This violation also carries a very stiff fine. Just this week Garland had two traffic fatalities because of running red lights. When I attended the monthly crime watch meeting the other night, the police were still very emotional from the sight of one of these fatal wrecks which was caused by the driver running a red light. Ask yourself before you speed up to run through a yellow or red light if the chances are worth it. I saw a quote the other day I would like to share with you: "Don't Drive Faster Than Your Guardian Angel Can Fly".

#### Habitation Burglary – Overview:

Thief stole trimmer and gas blower valued at \$400 from an open garage door. Offense occurred between noon Sat. 7/25 & 8:00 am Tues. 7/28.

#### Vehicle Burglary – Moss Trail:


Thief broke window of '87 Maxima. Nothing was reported missing. Offense occurred between 10:00 pm Wed. 7/22 & 10:00 am Thurs. 7/23.

#### Vehicle Burglary – Moss Trail:

Thief broke window of '97 Mitshubitsi and broke steering column. Nothing was reported missing. Car was locked and parked on the street. Offense occurred between 10:30 pm Wed. 7/22 & 7:30 am Thurs. 7/23.

#### Vehicle Burglary – Meadowridge:

Thief stole mobile phone, valued at \$300, from unlocked '91 Toyota pickup parked on rear driveway. Offense occurred between 11:00 am Sun. 7/26 & 8:00 am Mon. 7/27.



#### Theft \$1,500 - \$20,000 - Diamond Oaks:

Thief stole golf clubs and other equipment from Country Club. Offense occurred at 7:00 pm Sat. 7/11.

#### Theft \$50-\$500 – Willow Ridge:

Thief stole green trash can. Offense occurred between 7:00 am Tues. 7/21 & 4:00 pm Thurs. 7/23.

#### Theft Under \$50 – Stoneridge:

Thief stole green trash can. Offense occurred at 9:50 am Mon. 7/20.

#### Theft of Unmotorized Vehicle -**Ridge Oak Pl:**

Thief stole 16-foot, 2-axle trailer, valued at \$705, from driveway of residence. Offense occurred between 8:30 am & 5:30 pm on Mon. 7/20.

#### Criminal Mischief - Ridge Oak Dr.

Vandal damaged '97 Saturn by scratching car with key causing \$800 damage. Offense occurred between 10:30 pm Sun. 7/12 & 8:00 am Mon. 7/13.

The crime statistics decreased by 2 from the month of June. Vehicle burglaries are up all over Garland. Please don't leave any valuables in your car, even if it is locked. Just being able to see a valuable is all the temptation a thief needs to break a window and steal whatever is of any value. Remember when you are working in your yard, carry your opener with you and keep your garage doors closed at all times. It only takes a few minutes before something costly is snatched away. The police say most of the items stolen can be pawned quickly for enough cash to buy drugs for a quick fix. The police strongly suggest writing down all serial numbers of your valuables, which would make it easier for the police to help you try to retrieve your stolen items. They are working closely with the local pawn shops in the surrounding areas via the internet. You may also want to video each room of your house in the event of a burglary. This helps to expedite insurance claims. Be sure to keep all this information in a safe place and easy to retrieve.

## **Environmental Committee Report**

We are into our second month with the new lawn service company. Unfortunately, because of the ultra dry weather, it is hard to see any improvements. They did a thorough review of the irrigation system and made a number of recommendations. These are being done including the repairs to various sprinkler heads and the raising of several above the shrubs.

We still need to have the electrical supply repaired at our Big Oaks and Shiloh entrance in order to have water available at that location. This will be done shortly. The bricks were replaced in the flower beds on the south side. In addition, the posts was repositioned at Laurel Oaks and Beltline. An additional 180 lbs. of concrete with steel reinforcement was added and the water sprinkler was moved a few feet away from the post.

Don't forget your foundations during this dry weather. It is never to late to start getting moisture to the clay soil around your foundations. As the soil shrinks from lack of moisture, it can cause your foundation to shift resulting in ill-fitting doors, windows, cracks in the walls, etc. etc. In addition, sewer and water lines can break causing all kinds of problems. The best long term solution is to use soaker hoses all summer long. Don't wait for the soil to separate from the house before you begin to water or use the soaker hoses.

Don't forget to place your <u>house number in back of your home</u>. I have noticed quite a few homes have numbers on their rear entry garages, but they don't stand out when looking at them from the alley. If you have a light colored paint, use dark numbers. Many are using "brass" and these fade into the background on light paint. You can be certain your number will stand out if you order a "neighborhood watch" metal sign from Mr. Gerald Cowan at <u>972-272-7433</u>. These are large white signs with the neighborhood watch logo and your number in black paint. Mr. Cowan will charge you \$10.00 for the sign but he rebates \$5.00 to the ONA Neighborhood Watch program to pay for the new C.O.P. (Citizens on Patrol) signs at each of the entrances to ONA.

ONA will be buying pansies from "The Network" in Richardson. This charitable organization helps provide food and other needs to the indigent. Selling pansies is one of their fundraisers. The pansies are supplied by the Bruce Miller Nursery on Beltline but they must be ordered from the Network and picked up from the Network offices at 1114 Commerce in Richardson. These are giant pansies, 18 plants to a flat and the flats are \$14.50 paid in advance. The deadline for ordering will be Sep.. 18th. and pick up of the plants can be made on Saturday, Oct. 10th. You can call 972-234-8880 for order forms or additional information on the five varieties available.

Thanks to the generosity of folks providing extra money for ONA beautification, we will be buying additional pansies this fall and begonias next spring.
