The Global Economy and How it Affects us Locally

1998 began with the start of a Sellers Market. After over 10 years we finally saw a decrease in inventory which caused a rise in the value of our homes. Fortunately for both Buyers and Sellers the interest rates have been at an all time low. Currently running around 6% - 6.5%, they jumped up a full point last week to stabilize at about 7.25% in a response to the Bond Market. They are continuing to drop back down again this week as the market stabilizes. Don't forget we have experienced record-breaking highs in the stock market for the past 6-7 years. The low interest rates have allowed so many families to move and either buy a home for the first time or move their growing families into larger ones.

So why has the market slowed since September of this year? Usually, home sales slow the last two weeks of August through the second week of September as families and their children adjust to a new school year. The housing market has always picked up in October responding to families wanting to move before the holidays.

The global economy has a direct effect in our market. The behind the scenes talk is that of layoffs and job security. I think the closing of the Raytheon plant in Lewisville may be the tip of the iceberg. It has been 10-15 years since we have seen unemployment as a major threat to our area. The prediction is that there will be more layoffs this next year. Under these circumstances, many people have a wait and see attitude about selling their homes and buying a larger home.

The slow down in the housing market is affecting the higher priced homes more then the moderate priced homes. Executives that are using stock options, big bonuses and personal stock market gains to purchase, usually buy these homes.

They are cautious about their futures as many of them are being asked to relocate as their companies merge and others are being offered early retirement packages. Many middle management jobs are deleted during these mergers. Until we know what the employment situation is for 1999, you will see a more cautious attitude from consumers through the remainder of this year. New construction nationwide had a 30% drop in sales last month.

The unemployment and relocation of families could increase the number of homes available for sale and cause a halt in the increase in the value of the housing market if not a possible decline of prices. At the same time, if the inventory stays about the same and the buying public has a wait and see attitude, the housing values will continue to level and there will be moderate or no price increases.

On the bright side, it is expected that Greenspan will lower the rate 25 basis points this month causing the interest rate to continue to drop. What a great time to be buying a home! I remember my Father telling me years ago when the rate was hovering between 17% and 18% that he borrowed money against his life insurance policy to buy a house at 4% interest. Now, many years later, 5.75% to 6.25% is not bad and who knows how far it will drop.


Criminal Mischief - Rocky Trail:

The crime statistics increased by 2 offenses from the previous month of August which reported 9 offenses. The two related offenses that occurred on Big Oaks were juveniles who are Oakridge residents. This house was for sale and vacant. This happened within a week of closing on the house and the owner had to make all the repairs quickly to be able to finalize the sale of the house. The damages incurred by these juveniles was extremely expensive. Remember the holidays are approaching which means we need to take special precautions with our home and while we are out shopping. During the next few months we will be featuring some safety tips from a young man who lives here in Oakridge. We hope these tips will be helpful to all us.





<u>Safety Tips – 1st in a Series:</u>

This feature is being provided by Josh Criswell, who is working towards his Eagle Scout rank. He represents Boy Scout Troop 437 and is providing these safety tips for his community to earn his Safety Merit Badge. Josh lives here in Oakridge with his parents and sisters.

- 1. Do you keep a list of all valuable property with a duplicate list kept in a safe place away from the house, such as a bank deposit box? This is helpful in case of a fire and will be necessary for insurance claims.
- 2. Do you have a list of your credit cards and serial numbers of valuable property?
- 3. Do you have a description and photo of any valuable property that doesn't have a serial number, such as antiques or collectibles?
- 4. Do you avoid unnecessary displays of, or publicity about, your valuables?
- 5. Do you keep excess cash or other valuables in the bank?
- 6. Do you hide a house key under your doormat? This is the first place a burglar would look.
- 7. Do your family members know what to do if your house has been broken into?
- 8. Do your family members know to leave everything undisturbed until the police have checked your house for evidence?
- 9. Are your trees and shrubs trimmed to eliminate hiding places?
- 10. Have you made it difficult for burglars to reach an upper floor by eliminating trellises, drainpipes or ladders?
- 11. Is the outside of your home well lit?
- 12. Is your house number easily visible from the street and alley at any hour?
- 13. Do you have emergency telephone numbers listed by your phone?
- 14. Do you use good telephone security procedures?

We hope these questions will be helpful in making your home a safer place. Sometimes we have good intentions to take care of these things but usually find ourselves putting it off to do another day. Some of these safety tips can be taken care of easily during a weekend. We just need to make it a priority.

DIAL THE CODE!!!

Effective December 5, 1998, ALL local calls in the "972" and "214" area codes will require dialing all 10-digits (area code + 7 digit phone number). You also must dial 10-digits for local calls within the same area code. In other words, beginning December 5th, everyone will have a 10-digit phone number regardless who or where you are dialing in the metroplex. That means even your neighbor here in Oakridge. So you may want to start practicing this change so you can get use to it by December 5th. After that date, if you do not dial all 10-digits, you will get a busy signal. Make sure you give all 10-digits when you give your phone number out to businesses or friends. Remember, MANDATORY

FYI . . .

Call before you dig! If you are planning on digging in your yard, you are now required to use a special tool; "the telephone". A new state law requires anyone digging or excavating with a machine powered equipment to a depth of more than 16", to call the Texas One-Call Notification Center two days before digging begins. The center will notify all appropriate personnel to mark the locations of underground lines, pipes and other facilities. This law went into effect October 1, 1998. The number to call to report planned digging is 1-800-344-8377.
