

The ONA is currently taking orders for delicious pies, cheesecakes and French braids. These products are from the same company, Red Wheel Products, that we bought our cookie dough from back in November. These pies are 10" pies with a selection of Apple at \$8.00 each. The Peach, Cherry, and Pecan are \$9.00 each and the Chocolate "French Silk" at \$11.00 each. The selections of cheesecakes are Raspberry Swirl, Tortoise, and Vanilla, all 30 oz., for \$11.00 each. There is also a selection called "Baby Cakes" with 12 individual cakes in the package with assorted flavors of Vanilla, Raspberry, Amaretto, and Key Lime. This variety package sells for \$11.00. The French braids come in 3 flavors; Country Apple, Cherry Supreme, and Sweet Cinnamon and sell for \$9.00 each.

All of these products are delicious. The fruit pies are frozen and ready to bake. The Pecan and French Silk pies are ready to serve when thawed. The French braids come frozen and are so simple to bake. If you set it out the night before serving to let it rise (usually 10 hours) then you have a delicious pastry to serve to your family or friends for breakfast the next morning that is simply delicious and hard not to say "I made it myself". The cheesecakes are also frozen but ready to serve when thawed to room temperature.



FIRE ANTS!!!

Fire ants can be controlled with the right plan and without harming the environment. Here is a "Texas Two-Step" method designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Step-One": The first step in this method is to broadcast a bait insecticide over the entire yard. At least three baits can be applied in this way: Amdro®, Award®, and PT 370 Ascend®.

"Step-Two": The second step is to treat individual problem mounds with an approved mound drench, granule, or dust insecticide. Individual mounds should be treated no sooner than three days after baits are applied. Try boiling water as a non-chemical treatment for fire ants. Use three gallons per mound. About 60 percent of the mounds treated can be eliminated. This treatment can be hazardous for the person transporting the hot water. Take care not to pour boiling water on grass or plants. Always wear a long-sleeved shirt, gloves, and eye protection when

NEWS FROM LOWELL HYATT CITY COUNCILMAN – DISTRICT 7:

The ONA will be featuring articles from our City Councilman, Lowell Hyatt, occasionally, to keep us updated on happenings in Garland and other items he would like to share with the district he represents. This first article is from his own personal experience. Lowell and his wife, Lois, participated in the second ever Garland Fire Department's Citizens Fire Academy.

The academy consisted of ten, 3-hour weekly sessions and one all-day Saturday session. Classroom subjects ranged from arson investigation and fire prevention to CPR/first aide training and EMS demonstrations. Each night we also had physical activities. These were either fun or terrifying, but never boring. We learned the proper way to handle fire hoses, how to climb multi-story ladders and actually tore two cars apart using the "jaws-of-life".

Our first big surprise was being outfitted in our firefighting gear. The suit is heavy (80 lbs. with air pack), stiff and hot. The helmet is heavy and the boots are awkward, heavy and very uncomfortable. It took us at least 15 minutes to don our gear. The firefighters don all their gear and are ready to roll in one minute.

Our biggest thrill, up to the Saturday session, was rappelling off the roof! We were in a harness and hooked to a rope. We were told to stand at the edge of the roof, lean straight backwards off the roof and walk down the wall. We controlled the speed with one hand holding the rope behind our backs. The only thing that got us down the wall was having absolute trust in the abilities and confidence of the firefighters directing the activities. Although the first time down was terrifying, the second try was almost fun. All of these activities were preparation for our Saturday visit to the Dallas Fire Department Training Center. Saturday was approached with both excitement and apprehension. Captain Johnny Bellows, our leader, assured us it would be a fun, fun, fun day. He was wrong, wrong, wrong!

Our apprehension increased when the first thing we saw on arrival was a Garland Fire Department ambulance. It was further increased when we were handed previously worn helmets that were deformed and singed from extreme heat. After donning the helmets and our bunker gear, the firefighters began helping us with the face masks and air packs. The experience of having our faces sealed in a mask and using an air pack to breathe was unnerving and began testing our courage. After having our equipment checked by no less than 6 different firefighters, we were ready to enter the "flashover chamber". We were seated on narrow benches along the walls of the chamber and a fire was ignited at the rear. The chamber quickly filled with gas and smoke, and the temperature rose to 500° where we were sitting and 1,000° at the rear of the chamber. In a short time the gas ignited into what the firefighters call "fingers of death". Flames were shooting across the ceiling right over our heads, further singeing our already deformed helmets. Our 15 minutes in the chamber seemed like an eternity. We had completed our second test of courage.

Our third and last test was the "burn house". When we entered the burning structure, it was as if we had stepped into a black hole. The smoke was so intense we could not see our hands in front of our faces. We were told not to turn loose of the hose we were dragging with us because that hose was our lifeline back out of the building. We crawled on our hands and knees, wearing 80 lbs. of equipment, dragging and clinging to a heavy, stiff hose without a clue where we were in the building or what room the fire was in. We finally saw a glow, sprayed some water in that direction and got the heck out of the building.

At any point with any of the activities, we were free to stop or not participate. Many of our class members could not put on the facemasks. Some could put on the masks but could not enter the buildings. Each person had the support and encouragement of the firefighters and other class members no matter what their decision.

Why would anyone voluntarily subject themselves to these very frightening experiences? What we thought was going to be an interesting and somewhat boring learning experience about firefighting, became a wonderful and exciting learning experience about ourselves. While we were learning about the challenging and dangerous profession, we were also learning to face and conquer fear and to have absolute faith in those firefighters who guided us through our tests of courage. We were a part of a diverse group of strangers who came together and worked as a team. We clapped and cheered as individual members accomplished difficult tasks.

We were surprised and impressed with the enthusiasm and pride shown by each firefighter as he talked about his job. We came to realize firefighting is a calling, not a profession. The citizens of Garland are fortunate to have such an outstanding fire department. We can show our appreciation by keeping the firefighters/ EMS teams and their families in our prayers.


