Neighborhood Incident

An Oakridge resident reported to me an incident occurring on April 5th, in the early evening. This resident, a woman, was driving in the vicinity of Ridge Oak when she passed another car occupied by 2 or 3 youths. Someone in this other car, a light blue Mitsubishi (she thinks) threw something at her car. While it bounced off her hood and windshield, it apparently did no physical damage. However, it did frighten her. She pursued the youths down several streets. They seemed to know the neighborhood fairly well, and finally went down an alley. She reported this incident to the police, along with the license number of the car (YVT 02W).

I cite this instance to inform and alert Oakridge residents. If anyone has had problems with drivers of this vehicle – or if you do in the future – or if you know who owns this vehicle, do not hesitate to contact the police. Such attacks on solitary drivers in our neighborhood, especially women, can not be condoned. Certainly, these young men should be reprimanded for their behavior.

Environmental

Cy Farver

Spring has sprung and they are already talking about water rationing! I guess it is never to early to get prepared for dry weather when you live in this part of the world.

One of the ways we can save water and help our yard and plants in the process, is to water in the early hours of the day. If you have an irrigation system set your timer to run at 4 a.m. or cut your time in half and run it twice. You can run the first cycle at 4:a.m. and the second at 6a.m. This allows the water to soak in and reduces run off when the top layer is saturated. The second cycle has a better chance of getting to the deeper roots. If you don't have a system then keep your hose watering to the early hours as much as possible. If you water in the afternoon, you will lose a lot to evaporation, especially on these windy spring days. As the summer comes on and the heat rises, you can actually scald your plants with afternoon watering.

We have replaced all the pansies at the various entrances with begonias. This is earlier than in the past, but with the kind of summer being predicted, we wanted to give the plants an early start and good root systems before that heat hits them in June.

We have mulched all the plants and will put down another layer in a month. This will give the young plants a chance to come up a little bit more and not get smothered with the mulch. The coverage should average about three inches to reduce water evaporation and prevent weed growth.

The ONA Members have made very generous donations for flowers in past years. And we are asking for your support again this spring. The flower's cost is a small part of the overall expense when you factor in the water and electricity used to maintain the flower beds. Neighborhood Survey

The City of Garland is wrapping up the first test phase of its Neighborhood Benchmarking Program, and will soon begin a pilot program that involves the Oakridge neighborhood. One portion of the benchmarking program is a resident opinion survey that focuses on issues and conditions specific to your neighborhood. We recently tested this survey in the Camelot neighborhood, and we are very pleased with the response. We had an initial response rate of 46%, which is exceptional for a mail survey.

The results of the survey are currently being studied to identify any changes that need to be made to the questionnaire before it is mailed to neighborhoods in the pilot program. Findings from the Camelot survey have been forwarded to the City's Community Services Manager for follow-up with the neighborhood association and appropriate City departments.

At a recent board meeting, the Oakridge Neighborhood Association voted to partner with the City to enhance the survey in the Oakridge neighborhood. Normally, the City would conduct a statistical sampling of residents for the survey. The ONA, however, has pledged

to pick up the additional postage costs required to mail the survey to <u>every household</u> in the Oakridge neighborhood.

We are excited about the ONA's interest in the Neighborhood Benchmarking Program and look forward to working with you in the future. Look for the resident opinion survey to appear in your mailbox during the early summer months.
