Please read this newsletter carefully as there are articles within that will tell you how you might save some money and how it might cost you some money. The article by the Fire Chief suggests that we might be able to receive an additional 8% discount from our homeowners insurance policy. This is due to the citizens continued support for the fire department when they ask for capital improvement money to be included in the bond programs. The article by the Assistant City Attorney tells us of fines that will be imposed if we run the red-light. The City should have this program up and running later this year. Because the intersection of Buckingham and Jupiter is within the City of Richardson, there will be no installation of cameras here. The City of Richardson could institute a program similar to this, however at this time they choose not to. Wonder if they will change their mind when they see the improvement in our City's red-light runner problem?

As you are aware schools are back in session. Please be careful as you drive around within our Oakridge Community and the City in general.

The City has committed to be part of an internet site called www.neighborhoodlink.com. This site will link all cities throughout the United States, if they choose to participate. Our City Council did so at its July 18th meeting. Presently the ONA, Camelot and Spring Park associations are linked to this site. More information will be continually be added. Check it out.

As has been written in previous newsletters, The ONA

will be the next association to be tested by the City in the fledgling "benchmarking program ". Your ONA Board will be reviewing this program shortly with a questionnaire to be mailed to all of the approximately 1,180 homes within the Oakridge community. The Board hopes the city receives a tremendous return from the Oakridge area. Information contained in this questionnaire will assist the City and the ONA Board (and future Boards) in making decisions that will affect our neighborhood. If you have any questions about this process or the questionnaire contact your ONA District Director.

At its August Board meeting several folks from the Cities Transportation Department will be making a presentation regarding the complexities of installing "speed humps" on the major arteries within the Oakridge community. Look for information about this subject to be in future newsletters and on the ONA web site. Again, if you have immediate questions contact your District Director.

Although the temperature still says we are in the middle of summer, please consider contributing to the ONA flower fund for the planting of Fall / Winter color. Talk to your neighbors, if they are not members of the ONA, to see if they will contribute too. Our general budget does not allow for a great deal of color. The extra funds that have been contributed over the years have allowed the Board to dress up our neighborhood.

Remember to check the web site to note the schedule of the quarterly general meetings. It is important for all of us to participate in the Oakridge Neighborhood Association. *Are your friends members?*



DRIVE-UP APPEAL - DOES YOUR HOME HAVE IT?

Neighborhood Crime Activity

Our ONA newsletter includes summaries of neighborhood crime activity, a popular and important feature. These summaries have not been available in recent months while the Police Department made computer changes. We are now getting them again.

Crime activity data of interest to us is generated for District 12, Beats 7 and 8. Jupiter, Shiloh, Buckingham, and Apollo roads bound Beat 7. Oakridge is a large part of Beat 7. Apollo, North Garland, and Homestead bound Beat 8, to our east. Data for the prior month is given out at the Crime Watch meeting, held on the second Thursday of each month at the Police station. Also discussed at this meeting is general information about Garland Crime activity and efforts to contain it.

At the July Crime Watch meeting, Police reported the following:

Garland now REQUIRES house numbers to be displayed on the rear of houses that have alleys, as well as on the front.

Curfew for youths under age 17 is 11 PM on Sun-Thurs, and 12 PM on Fri-Sat.

Garland gang activity has subsided significantly over the past year, with active gangs down from around 25 to only 2 or 3.

Crime activity for District 12 (covering June 1-20) lists 16 items. Seven of these were in Beat 7, and only one was in Oakridge (criminal mischief on 6/16, in the 2500 block of Big Oaks). The other six items all occurred north of Belt Line and included habitation burglary (2), vehicle burglary (1), criminal mischief (2), and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle (1)

The nine items in Beat 8 (east of Shiloh) included vehicle burglary (3), criminal mischief (4), habitation burglary (1), and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle (1).

Crime activity data for the May time frame was not available. In April, District 12 showed 13 items. Four of these were in Beat 7, and only one was in Oakridge (criminal mischief, in the 2700 block of Diamond Oaks). The other three in Beat 7 included habitation burglary, building burglary, and criminal mischief. Nine items in Beat 8 included habitation burglary (4), vehicle burglary (2), and criminal mischief (3).

Oakridge crime activity as reflected in this data appears to be low. Hopefully, our Crime Watch and patrol activities have contributed to this. Missing Pets

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Automated Traffic Signal Violation Enforcement/City Ordinance Adoption

Traffic engineers will tell you that the most dangerous part of a street is an intersection. They will also tell you that the most dangerous part of a signalized intersection is driver disregard of those signals.

According to a study done by State Farm Insurance the north Dallas County area contains three of the most dangerous intersections in the entire United States: Beltline Road at Midway Road in Addison (rated No.1 most dangerous); Park Road at Preston Road in Piano (rated No.2 most dangerous); and Beltline Road at Preston Road in Far North Dallas (rated No.5 most dangerous). In Garland, three persons were killed in intersection collisions in 1999, alone.

Despite the obvious dangers of running red tights, north Dallas County residents continue to do so at alarming rates. During a pilot study performed by the City of Richardson, an average of one violation occurred every two minutes in peak drive time periods. In the study, red light violators reached speeds of up to 56 miles per hour while running the light and entered the intersection as late as nine seconds after the light had changed to red. In just one red light cycle, six drivers ran the light. Moreover, the accidents that result from a red light violation are especially dangerous because airbags and passenger restraint systems do little to mitigate the effects of "t-bone" impacts that occur when a vehicle runs a red light.

You may recall that one of the legislative initiatives approved by the City Council for the last legislative session was a bill that would authorize the automatic enforcement of traffic signal violations. Representative Joe Driver agreed to sponsor the legislation and attempted to shepherd it through the process, but the bill was ultimately defeated apparently due to political opposition unconnected to the actual legislation or the goals it attempted to achieve.

We have continued to study the feasibility of automated red light enforcement programs notwithstanding the defeat of our bill. As a home-rule municipality, we do not need legislative authority to carry out such a program. The legislation that we attempted to have passed on a state-wide basis could just as easily be adopted as a local ordinance and an automated red light enforcement program could be implemented immediately rather than waiting for the next session of the Legislature.

Several major cities in the United States have implemented automated red light enforcement programs with great success. Red light violations have decreased by nearly 60% in cities like Baltimore, Maryland, that have committed to make red light enforcement a priority. The success of such programs is due to two factors. First, the public is constantly reminded about the dangers of red light running. Second, the automated enforcement programs adds teeth to the public education part of the program by aiming at - and fining - those drivers who actually run red lights and who are presumably fully aware that the light is red when the driver enters the intersection. The automated red light enforcement devices currently on the market are able to target only those vehicles that run a red light after the light has displayed a steady red signal long enough for the driver to recognize and react to the

signal. The devices do not detect drivers that enter the intersection on a yellow tight only to have the light turn red once the vehicle crosses the intersection. Moreover, the devices are programmed to detect substantial violations, that is, drivers that enter an intersection on a steady red and that, in addition, are exceeding a pre-set speed, usually 15 to 20 miles per hour. Thus, automated red light enforcement cameras are uniquely able to pick out those persons whose intentional disregard of the signal makes our intersections that much more dangerous.

Companies such as Lockheed-Martin, a leader in the field, offer automated enforcement systems for purchase or for use on a turn-key basis without cost to the sponsoring city. Under the turn-key basis, the company will install the system, maintain the equipment, and process the violations for the sponsoring city to enforce without cost to the city. The company is re-paid only from the proceeds of the collections from violators. Thus, the automated enforcement program can be run on "user fee's" without impacting law-abiding taxpayers.

At its regular meeting on August 1, 2000, the Garland City Council authorized the implementation of an automated red light enforcement program in Garland.

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Notes from Fire Chief Danny Grammer

- Both average response times for emergency medical runs last year, as well as average structure fire response in 1999 was 4:44.
- ISO (Insurance Service Office) rating has improved to a rating of 2. This rating sets fire insurance premiums for a specific City. A #1 rating is the best and a #10 is the worst. There is only one #1 rated City in Texas, so a #2 is an excellent rating. The City of Garland has gone from a #4, to a #3, to a #2 in about 4 years. The financial difference between a #3 rated City and a #2 rated City is 8.2% on the State's standard recommended rate. Therefore, a City of Garland homeowner's fire premium can go down around 8.2 percent because of these improvements. Home-owners should check with their insurance agent on reduction of premiums.
- The thermal vision cameras purchased last year are proving to be very beneficial to firefighters and citizens of Garland. These state of the art cameras allow firefighters to see in an otherwise totally black environment. The cameras will allow firefighters to find a victim in a fire in a matter of seconds, as opposed to many minutes or maybe even not finding the victim at all. The City of Garland was the first major City in the United States to place a camera on every fire truck in the City.
- The Fire Department is looking for a site to build Fire Station 11 on. The new station will probably be on Belt Line Road between North Garland and Shiloh and will cover portions of both Council Districts 6 and 8. Station 11 will reduce response times in the immediate area and City wide. The Station is about two years from being constructed. The present plans are to have a paramedic staffed fire engine at the station.
- Fire Station 9 opened at 4320 O'Banion in the fall of 1999. This significantly reduces response times in that area.
- Fire Station 4, presently at 3422 Broadway, will move to Broadway and Oates. The new station should be open in about a year.
- Fire Station 10 will be built next year in far north Garland near the new golf course.
- Across the City, the Fire Department is closing two fire stations and adding six new ones. This will give the City of Garland eleven fire station total. This will equate to better fire and EMS coverage and reduced response times across the City.
- A Heavy Rescue Truck has been placed in service at Station 8 on 1426 E. Miller. This rescue truck has the capabilities of responding to virtually any type rescue incident including high angle, below grade, trench, collapse, or swift water.

- The Fire Department's "Downtown Safety Clowns" have a new presentation and is presently putting on shows in Garland schools.
- The Fire Department has received a new pumper truck which is housed a Station 5 near Lake Ray Hubbard. The new fire engine can discharge 1250 gallons of water in one minute, this is five tons of water!
