News From "Let Sue Do It" Sue Hageland

As most of you know, my "Let Sue Do It" business has become predominantly "Let Sue Pet Sit". I love all the wonderful animals I am fortunate enough to care for but I know from the many calls I receive that there are people in our neighborhood who need other services as well!

Trash Container Ordinance

To improve appearance of Garland neighborhoods, City Council revised the sanitation ordinance to clarify where the green trash containers are to be stored. In short, the containers should not be placed at the collection point prior to 6:00 pm on the day prior to collection, and should be removed from the collection point prior to 11:00 pm on collection day. Containers should be stored either next to the side of the main dwelling or in a location out of the view of the public or adjacent property. As an exception, if the point of collection is from an alley, the container need not be removed from the point of collection unless it can be easily viewed from a street. Exemptions may be granted for unique circumstances or extreme hardship, such as a physical disability.

Residents are also reminded that city ordinance requires that house numbers be clearly viewable from the alley as well as from the front of the home.


An Oakridge resident reported that a lady contacted her at work, claiming to be a neighborhood Citizens On Patrol volunteer, and told her that that her garage door was standing open. When the resident and her husband arrived home the garage door was closed. To the best of our knowledge, no Oakridge C.O.P. volunteers were involved in this incident. We do not have access to resident work numbers. Should we find an open garage door where nobody seems to be home, our standard procedure is to contact the Police and ask that an officer be dispatched to check it out. We do not enter the home and/or close garage doors. At this time we suspect this was either a wrong number call from a patrol group from some other neighborhood or a prank call.

The next Citizens On Patrol Volunteer training class will be held on Saturday, February 24, from 8am to 5pm. One person from Oakridge, Carroll J. Innmon, is scheduled to attend. A portion of this meeting will be dedicated to code enforce-

ment training. Currently active patrollers are invited to attend, though anyone planning to do so should notify me or Officer Funk to ensure there will be enough space.

Environmental Report

This is the dormant month for most of our plants, at least that is what it appears to be to the casual eye. But winter seems to end in this part of the world around the middle of February and the spring plants are beginning to sprout. In fact, you may have already seen some of the daffodils are already blooming. Forsythias will be in full flower shortly as well as the other blooming shrubs.

This is the time of the year to prune your crape myrtles back to pencil size branches. Prune your bush roses now, but hold off on the climbing roses until after the first bloom cycle is past. Trim your ground cover plants before new growth begins. This is to remove winter damage and establish an even appearance.

Be sure to spray your hollies, camellias, euonymus, and photinias with dormant oil to eliminate scale insects. Check those instructions on the bottle for temperature and rainfall conditions.

You can divide summer and fall flowering gerennials before spring growth begins including mums, asters, etc. This will not only provide you with more plants, but it helps the original plants become stronger.

We have accomplished some improvements within Oakridge this winter. Irrigation lines were installed at Overview and Buckingham after several weeks of wrangling with the city. We used Billy Jack Sprinkler Co. to install these lines and were quite pleased with the results. As a result of the new water supply, flowers were replanted and dead shrubs have been replaced at this entry.

Bill Marks, the owner of Billy Jack's, has also added sprinkler heads to the south west corner of Big Oaks and Shiloh. He will complete the installation of a sprinkler system to the Northwest corner allowing us to add flower beds to that intersection this spring. In addition, we have added freeze controls to all of our irrigated intersections. This will stop the sprinklers from operating if the temperature drops below 32 degrees. We sure don't want anyone to have an accident because our sprinklers caused ice to form.

In addition, we are getting a bid on running sprinkler lines the length of our property on Shiloh. The valves previously installed are large enough to provide coverage. This would be an expensive installation and the first step in adding sprinklers completely around our perimeter.

If possible, we would add this cost to next year's budget and it would be conditional upon more new members. Our improvements are made with your dues dollars. If you could help by asking your neighbors to join, these costs would be spread over a much larger population.




