# President's Corner - Mike Rose

The Oakridge Neighborhood Association begins its three month membership drive with this issue of the ONA Newsletter. The culmination of this drive will be the election of a new slate of officers at the May 23<sup>rd</sup> general membership meeting. The next three issues will be mailed to the entire Oakridge community, approximately 1,160 homes. The ONA Board decided to communicate to the whole neighborhood via these ONA Newsletters in hopes that it might cause our membership to grow. Are you a member of the Oakridge Neighborhood Association? If not why not? The dues are only \$48.00 per year per home (June 1<sup>st</sup> through May 31<sup>st</sup> of the next year) or one could think of it as not even the monthly cost of a meal at one of our fast food restaurants.

One might ask "what do I get for my family belonging to the Oakridge Neighborhood Association"? This is a good question and one that should be answered. Read on.

Some of the topics at the most recent general membership meetings included the following:

- Garland Fire Chief Grammer talked to our group and informed us how we might save money on our individual home insurance costs. He also told us of the immediate plans to add an additional fire station in North Garland.
- Assistant City Manager Martin Glen explained the concept of the new police and courts building, where it is to be located and the projected time table for its

# Reckless Driving Incident on Diamond Oaks Report by Bill Johnson

Shown below is a letter written to various city officials by an Oakridge resident, Dennis Cheatham In this letter Dennis described a recent incident involving an auto accident in his front yard that nearly involved his wife and children as innocent bystanders. He is pleading for ways to improve the safety of our neighborhood and his plea is echoed by many of us. The Board of Directors of the ONA joins with Dennis in seeking solutions and the support of all Oakridge residents in this matter is solicited.

Dear Transportation Department,

I am writing this letter to ask for HELP!

Our neighborhood has had a terrible problem with speeding cars, cars intentionally driving ruts through neighbors yards and golf course, (approx. 8 yards in our neighborhood carry the tire track scars.), theft and robbery.

My name is Dennis Cheatham and my family and I live at 2321 Diamond Oaks. Yesterday a car was speeding, or racing according to eye witness reports at @ 60 - 80 mph. down our street and lost control. The car skidded approximately 150ft. before jumping the curb and slamming into my 14yr. Old Bradford Pear tree. Had it not been for my tree, the 88 Toyota Camry would have wound up in my neighbors bedroom. The car was totaled, all the occupants but one jumped out and into the other race car (Honda Prelude) and left the scene of the acci-

The Police Blotter section of the Garland News supplement to the Dallas Morning News shows that February crime activity in Oakridge has increased. Residents should be alert to suspicious activity, and keep their garage doors closed when not being monitored.

An incident last November involved an automobile from the apartments across Buckingham Road crashing into the brick wall behind homes along Hearthside. We expect this damage to be repaired soon, weather permitting. Since this month's issue of the Newsletter goes to all Oakridge residents, perhaps this is a good time to remind residents whose homes back up to these walls that they are responsible for maintenance/repair of the walls, just as all property owners are responsible for maintenance of sidewalks in front of their homes. The ONA has taken a leadership role in **facilitating** repair of the current wall damage. But the ONA does not 'own' the walls and is not responsible for their repair.

An incident occurred recently (Feb 18) on Diamond Oaks where an auto skidded into the front yard of a home, destroying a large tree. The resident of that home has written a letter to city officials (printed as a separate column in this newsletter) asking for help in making this area and it's residents less vulnerable to reckless driving. This topic was discussed at the March 1 General Meeting and will be taken up by the ONA Board of directors. Several suggestions are under consideration, such as additional stop signs, speed bumps, increased patrols, ways to keep our streets from being used as 'shortcuts', etc. Support of the residents in making our streets safer is sought, as well as ideas and suggestions for making this possible.

completion. Have any of you or your family been to the present municipal court facility? If you have you will understand why the City desperately requires these new buildings.

- The Director of the Performing Arts Center, Patty Granville shared with us the plans for the expansion and renovation of the PAC and the Plaza Theater. Did you know that the PAC will contain a banquet hall large enough to accommodate a seating of approximately 500 people? Have you and/or your family attended a function at the PAC?
- Jean Redfern with the City Transportation Department walked us through the process of getting speed humps installed on selected neighborhood streets. We also heard of a horror story from one of our members. This family came close to having a major tragedy take place in the Oakridge community (see page 1). Would speed humps have helped in this situation? Perhaps.
- The entire Oakridge Community has participated in a recent "Benchmarking" program. Slightly over 51% of the whole community responded. The members heard from Rebecca Beck, ODT Project Manager for the City of Garland. Becky shared the results of the survey and how future ONA Boards may utilize this information. We were the second Association in the City to participate in this program.

Our organization was among the first in the City to have a detailed article which outlined how the City is progressing with the installation of cameras at major intersections. The City of Garland is a leader in this field. We must applaud our City leaders in their attempt to control the violators of "red light runners". We must assist in making our streets safer.

The Vice President of the GEDP told us of how aggressively the City has been in securing new business. Much of their activity centers around the 190 Highway. This will be of benefit to the entire City but it will directly affect us.

Did you know that one of our members, Luanne Payne, takes on the Herculean task of organizing the ONA annual Christmas Dinner for Fire Stations No. 3 and 6? She has done this for several years. The firemen of both stations deeply appreciate this. Have you been a part of this service effort? Have you been on the receiving end of the fire departments services?

The Oakridge Neighborhood Association has a very active COP program. The folks who volunteer their time regularly walk our neighborhood and alert homeowners of potential problems. We have a continual problem of people leaving their garage doors open. Why is that? The ONA newsletter has addressed this and if you were a member you would be made aware of the situation.

The ONA Board two years ago created a Christmas home decorating contest. Participation is restricted to those who are members of the ONA Association. There is a monetary award for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place. The Board believes that this contest might have resulted in an increase in the number of home being decorated. Do you participate?

The Oakridge Neighborhood Association has a very active environmental committee. Its main purpose is to maintain and improve the quality of our "common areas". dent. The 14yr. old driver was so shook up that he could hardly stand up. Fortunately, no one was seriously hurt. Approximately two hours later the police left my residence after having the car removed and I then realized that my wife and 3 children were less than 30 seconds from walking out the front door of our house to walk our dog when the incident began. They all four stood at our entry way windows and watched the whole thing happen. 30 seconds and God's Grace surely saved my family from total devastation!!!

Today, I realized I have three major problems:

- 1) My wife and children are totally afraid to leave our house out the front door, much less ride their bicycles down the side walk 100ft. to a sidewalk adjacent to a less threatening street as we have instructed for the past 3yrs.,
- 2) I have a 25ft. high & 12in. diameter Bradford Pear tree lying across my front yard along with approx. 40ft. of tire ruts in my yard to deal with.
- 3) The reckless driving and bold acts of property destruction by reckless drivers will only get worse, as it has over the past 11 years I have lived in this neighborhood, unless someone takes some action.

I am willing to take some action but I need your help.....I believe this neighborhood needs a significant increase in police enforcement and perhaps as many as three or four additional stop signs.

I believe these stop signs would significantly reduce the cut through traffic in our neighborhood, while at the same time, significantly reduce the average speed on Diamond Oaks and Ridge Oak streets. These are the streets that are used by many drivers to avoid the often congested intersection of Jupiter and Buckingham. Also, because these two streets have long gentle curves they are often used by young drivers to practice their high speed driving skills. I would also like to submit the following action plan and request your advise and direction if this plan seems unreasonable...

### **ACTION PLAN**

- 1) I would like to request that temporary speed sensors be installed immediately on Diamond Oaks and Ridge Oak streets to validate the extremely high level of traffic and to substantiate the extremely high speeds and times of occurrence associated with this dangerous traffic.
- 2) Garland Transportation Dept., Garland Police Dept., Oakridge Neighborhood Association and Diamond Oaks / Ridge Oaks neighbors should evaluate this data to determine the best locations and the number of stop signs before someone is senselessly killed.

## **ALL AROUND THE TOWN!!**

It is a pleasure to bring you news from the City of Garland. The year 2001 promises to be very exciting. The City Council recently adopted an aggressive Capital Improvement Program ("CIP") for this year. The CIP serves as the City's capital budget, and typically includes the construction of infrastructure, municipal facilities, and the acquisition of large or specialized equipment. The CIP is multi-year in nature, identifying planned expenditures and anticipated funding sources over a five-year horizon. This year's CIP is one of the largest in recent history totaling \$139.3 million. Included is \$26.6 million for streets, \$60.2 million for the closing of Castle Landfill and opening of Raney Landfill along with other utility projects, \$5.3 million for parks, and \$5.1 million for drainage.

Some of the more high profile projects include \$5.7 million for the Performing Arts Center ("PAC") and Plaza Theater. Renovations on the Plaza Theater are almost complete and it should be open for performances this summer. Renovations to the PAC will include total exterior renovation as well as expanded lobby, dressing rooms, and restrooms. In addition, a separate banquet hall will be constructed on the grassy hill in front of the existing facility. The two will be connected by a porte-cochére.

Another component of the CIP is the \$11.8 million for the Municipal Justice Center that will be located at the corner of State and Forest. Construction on phase one is anticipated to commence in September of this year with a completion date by the end of 2002. In addition \$2.6 million has been approved for the construction of a second clubhouse at Firewheel. This clubhouse will be located at the intersection of Brand and Talley Roads and will service the new 27 holes which are due to open this summer. The new clubhouse should be completed by the end of the year.

Funding for the CIP comes from several sources including (1) debt issuance, (2) transfers from the operating budget, (3) grants and other outside contributions, and (4) interest earnings. By far, the primary source of funding for CIP projects, however, is debt issuance. Funding for the 2001 program will require \$23.6 million in tax supported debt. This program could result in up to a one and one-half cent increase in the ad valorem tax rate.

I am certain that many of you are aware of the congestion that we are experiencing on the George Bush Tollway, especially during rush hour. The City has had many discussions with the North Texas Tollway Authority about this issue. I am very happy to tell you that an additional two lanes, from the Brand Road bridge to the first toll plaza, are currently under design. They hope to begin construction this summer. This will ease not only your daily commute, but will provide greater access to the mall that is expected to break ground by summer.

The Jupiter Road and Downtown DART Light Rail Stations

are under construction and on schedule. Garland is slated for service by the fall of 2002. The opening of the Downtown Station will enhance the overall plans for that area. The City is seeking funding to implement a downtown streetscape project that would add landscaping, lighting, brick pavers, benches, and other pedestrian enhancements; as well as identify entryways and create linkages between Downtown activities and focal points. Many of these improvements are outlined in the Downtown Area Plan adopted by the City Council in April 2000. The Plan sets forth goals and recommendations to guide Downtown development and revitalization.

Main Street Garland's effort to revitalize Downtown are also paying off, with the opening of several new businesses and the renovation of several others. The Main Street Program is working to have the buildings around the square designated a National Historic District in order to aid their preservation and to attract additional visitors to the downtown area.

We are well underway with plans for another fabulous Star Spangled 4<sup>th</sup>. This year the event will run from Friday evening, June 29<sup>th</sup> through Sunday, July 1<sup>st</sup> with wonderful fireworks each evening. Our motto this year is "Let the Fun Begin" as we celebrate Mardi Gras in July! There will be a variety of volunteer opportunities that I hope your Neighborhood Association will avail themselves of.

Your neighborhood association has been a long supporter and active participant in my quarterly homeowner/neighborhood association meetings. I appreciate your dedication to making not only your neighborhood, but also the entire community a better place to live, work and raise a family. I appreciate hearing from you on how we are doing and what we can do to continue to improve the quality of life in Garland. These are very exciting times for our city!
