#### President's Message



### Stay Alert in the Kitchen

The leading cause of home structure fires involves cooking equipment. During the five year period between 1992 and 1997, home-cooking accidents caused an annual average of 97,300 reported fires resulting in 310 deaths, more than 4,800 injuries and \$385.5 million in property damage.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, more that half of the stove fires started when food was left unattended. Fire safety experts caution that while portable fire extinguishers can be excellent tools for fighting small home fires, the first priority is safe escape. Yet in the early stages of a fire, and only after the fire department has been called, the right extinguisher can be very effective and can save property.

Don't wait for an emergency to learn how to use a fire extinguisher. Familiarize yourself with its proper use before a fire flares up.

The following information was extracted from <u>The Crime-Watch Coordinator's Monthly Report</u>, Robbery, Burglary, Criminal Mischief, Unauthorized Use, June 2001 which is compiled and reported by the Garland City Police Department (viewable at the police department's website: http://www.ci.garland.tx.us/police/gpd1000.htm)

• The City of Garland made 639 reports for the entire city during the month of June 2001.

• District 12, comprised of Beats 7 & 8 (Oakridge is part of this district) had a total of 41 reports or 6.4% of the city's total reports during June 2001.

• Beat 7 (Oakridge resides within its boundaries) had a total of 18 reports or 2.8% of the city's total reports.

• Oakridge (addresses within our community) had a total of 5 reports in June 2001 or 0.8% of the city's total reports. **Oakridge specific report information follows:**

#### Foreword


This marks the second year of Are We Safe? The National Survey on Crime Prevention. It helps refine the picture that emerged in 1999.

More Americans felt afraid walking in their neighborhoods in 2000, despite seven years of declining crime rates; parents' concern for children's safety is high but millions of children are left alone during the week and on weekends without adult supervision; engagement with neighbors is high but community volunteering has slipped.

n short, we know there are problems, but we're not doing what we could to address them.

This survey annually looks at fear of crime and at four areas of safety: self and home, family, neighborhood, and community. These concentric areas shape our sense of personal and civic security. Within each area, the survey looks at the state of prevention measures and levels of action throughout the nation.

Why crime prevention? It keeps us from becoming victims. It helps our children grow up safer. It saves us from the physical, financial, and psychological costs of crime. It improves the quality of our lives. It (Continued on page 7)



#### C.O.P. NEEDS YOU!!!

Citizens On Patrol is looking for volunteers. Some of our patrollers have moved recently and we need to replace them as well as increase our numbers. If you would like to "give something back" and become part of a very special group of people please give me a call. All it takes is a few hours each month.

What does the C.O. P. do? We patrol our neighborhood, by motor vehicle, bike or on foot. We're an integral part of the safety and security of Oakridge. We help the Garland Police Department by acting as their eyes and ears when they can't be here. While all of us would like to have an officer from the GPD in our neighborhood 24 hours a day, we realize that it's cost prohibitive. The C.O.P. is the next best thing. We're volunteers and we have a vested interest in our neighborhood because we live here. The more volunteers we have the more hours we can have someone out there patrolling. The more hours we're on patrol the less likely we are to have crime in our neighborhood.

Qualifications for C.O.P. are simple: Have a clean arrest record, attend a training class presented by the Garland Police Department and be willing to spend at least an hour a week on patrol. Both women and men are needed and welcomed.

If you've been a C.O.P. volunteer in the past, we want you back. If you would like to join our special group, give me a call. You'll be working with some great people who just happen to be your neighbors and you'll be doing something that is essential toward keeping our neighborhood a wonderful place to live. For more than a year, Bill Johnson has been the C.O.P. Coordinator for the Oakridge area. He's spent countless hours helping the residents of Oakridge. Bill's recently been elected to serve as a director for the Oakridge Neighborhood Association and asked me to take over his C.O.P. Coordinator responsibilities. His legacy will be a hard one to follow. We all owe Bill a big "THANK YOU".

#### ANOTHER SPECIAL PERSON

When you consider that it takes just about one hour to patrol the streets and alleys of Oakridge, and, the distance traveled is 14.3 miles, then Bill Edwards, one of our C.O.P. patrollers has chalked up over 1,400 miles during the past 2+ years. Recently Bill had eye surgery and has been unable to patrol. We wish him a quick recovery. When Bill returns and resumes his patrols, give him a wave when you see him on Monday nights.

#### **BLUE "BURGLER" NOTICES**

The Garland Police Department has provided C.O.P. patrollers with blue notices to place on houses that have open, unattended garages. The GPD states that one of the most frequent reasons for burglary is open garage doors. A simple click of the remote can solve the problem and save you a big headache.
