

Residents with trash collection at their front curb or alley adjacent to a street must move the green trash container from the curb or the alley and place it next to the side of the house or any other area out of view from adjacent properties.

C.O.P. REPORT FOR AUGUST

As many of you know, August 7 was designated as "National Night Out". The idea is to get people outside to meet their neighbors and thereby help reduce crime in the neighborhood. This is a wonderful idea, and one that every neighborhood should try to utilize. Unfortunately, August 7 is hot in Texas. Few, if any people, are willing to be standing or sitting around outside during evenings like we've been experiencing. However, to do our part, your C.O.P. patrollers were out and about that evening, patrolling our neighborhood. As a part of our patrol efforts that evening we made note of eleven (11) streetlights that were out and notified the city so they could be repaired. We've been assured the lights will all be fixed within 10 days. If you notice a light out on your street, you can do your part in keeping your neighborhood safe by

reporting the outage to STREET LIGHT REPAIR at 972-205-3483.

Some of our patrollers have noted that parked vehicles are beginning to congest a couple of our streets. Please remember that emergency vehicles require a lot of room to maneuver. If a street is narrowed to a single lane, it can adversely affect the response time of an emergency service. Lives or homes could be endangered, so we urge everyone to utilize their driveways or garages for parking.

Once again, we remind everyone, **don't issue an invitation to thieves and burglars.** An open, unattended, garage can allow someone access to items in your garage as well as provide access to your home through the door leading from the garage into your home. Let's all try to make Oakridge a neighborhood that unsavory characters avoid.

Finally, we're still seeking additional volunteers for the C.O.P. Although the response was very good from our previous request, we need a few more people before the police department will present a training class, and everyone must be trained before being allowed to patrol. Why not join this special group of people, make a difference in your neighborhood. We're only asking for a minimum of an hour total per week per person. Many people are out there walking, running or bike riding anyway, so just combine your exercise with some volunteer work. Do two things at once. Now that school is starting again, we would like to have enough volunteers so that we could have patrols out every day around the time the children in our neighborhood are coming home from school to help ensure their safety. This is a perfect opportunity for the parents of our community to get outside, meet other parents and help protect the children.





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Crime Prevention Guide To Home Security

Burglars enter a house, apartment or condominium every 15 seconds. Burglars look for what the police call "targets of opportunity" - in other words, easy pickings. Common sense will help keep the burglar away. Be aware of the common methods which burglars use to gain entry, and make sure your entire family understands what to do in certain situations. Most home burglars are amateurs looking for homes which present the least risk of detection; the greatest opportunity for easy gain; and the maximum potential for escape. They are looking for homes which appear unoccupied and unprotected; homes without adequate locks and lighting; open or unlocked doors and windows; and home sites which provide easy concealment from neighbors and passing motorists

Unfortunately, the burglar doesn't need to look around very long to discover "Welcome Burglar" signs unwitting left around many homes. It is even more unfortunate when you realize that all it takes to make your home less inviting to a burglar is a little more common sense and several easy, effective and inexpensive crime measures. Listed are measures, which can decrease the chances of becoming a burglary victim.

Survey your home: Look at your home through the eves of a burglar's eyes. Does it look like an easy target? Are there obvious security weaknesses?

Shrubbery should not obscure doors and windows. At night leave a few lights burning outside your home. Strategically placed floodlights will make your home less inviting to a burglar. Windows and doors should be securely locked.

Doors- Inadequate locks should be replaced or supplemented. Single-cylinder deadbolt locks are recommended. The bolt should extend at least one inch beyond the door edge. This would prevent a burglar from kicking in the door. If an exterior door contains a glass panel or is near a window, a double-cylinder deadbolt should be installed. This will prevent a burglar from reaching inside to unlock the door after breaking the glass.. Be- fore you install new locks, consult a locksmith. Many home improvement centers provide workshops tailored to home security and various information regarding locks and their installation.

Keep track of your keys. Do not leave an extra key outside your ho me. Keys hidden under doormats, flower pots, or on a window ledge are the first places burglars look prior to actually "breaking in". Do not attach your name or license number to your house keys. Lost or stolen house keys, which contain such information, can be easily traced to your home. In addition, do not leave your house keys with your car when you leave your car at a parking lot.

Wooden exterior doors have either solid core or hollow core construction. Solid core doors provide the greatest security. They are also best suited for installation of good locks. If your home is not equipped with a peephole, install one. Sliding glass doors are particularly vulnerable to attacks by burglars. A pin-type lock or a steel rod can be inserted in the door channel. Additionally, install two or three screws in the overhead track to m- duce the chance of lifting the door out of the track. There are also a new variety of keyed locks for patio doors.

Make sure your garage door is always locked, whether you are home or not. Many garage thefts occur during the day when homeowners are home. If the garage door has glass panes, cover them to prevent your valuables from being seen.

Windows- Always ensure your windows are locked. Double-hung windows can have added security by utilizing a 'pinning" technique. With the


window closed, drill hole (angle down- ward) through the top corners of the inner frame, partially into outer frame. Insert pin or nail. In addition, keyoperated window locks are available.

Consider buying a burglar alarm system. They vary in sophistication from a simple door alarm that makes noise, scares the thief and alerts neighbors, to silent alarm systems which are linked to a law enforcement agency or security service. Check with your homeowner's insurance agent for recommendations. Some insurance companies may endorse specific manufacturers and the discount received on homeowners insurance may increase.

Establish good communications with your neighbors. Many times the best deterrent for a burglar is watchful neighbors. If a burglar notices watchful eyes he will more likely move on. Also, a watchful neighbor can report suspicious circumstances to the appropriate authorities.
