C.O.P. REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER

C.O.P. PATROLLERS logged over 28 hours during the month of August, watching over the Oakridge neighborhood! This is just the beginning; we have several applicants waiting to be trained by the Garland Police Department, and when that's done, we can add to the number of patrol hours each month. It's not too late to join us, remember, the more patrollers we have, the more hours we can cover each month. Neighborhood police officer Sam Castorani advises that every hour we spend out there patrolling is extremely important to the prevention of crime in our area.

"Citizens On Patrol" has initiated a new method of alerting residents of open, unattended garage doors. Previously we utilized a blue doorknob hanger, however, these proved to be both cumbersome and time-consuming. They had to be placed on the front door of the home, which meant that the patrol person had to observe the open garage door in the alley, drive around to the front of the house and put the hanger on the front door, then return to his/her patrol. We also noticed that some residents might not remove items left on their front doors for several days and realized that anyone walking up to the door could easily see that the notice was referring to an open garage door. We decided this wasn't an efficient, or possibly even safe, method of notifying a neighbor of a potential problem. We've designed some simple, colorful postcards that are mailed to the resident instead. The postcards have been reviewed and approved by Officer Castorani; he agrees that these are more efficient, and much easier to read, than the old door hangers. Last month, on one day alone, we found 50 open, unattended garage doors. Remember, this is an open invitation to petty thieves, protect yourself, don't become a victim!

We're happy to report also that the C.O.P. now has a post office box of its very own to better serve the Oakridge area. Should any resident have anything they wish to bring to our attention, the address is Oakridge C.O.P., PO Box 452393, Garland, TX. 75044. The C.O.P. prepares monthly reports for the police department, and we regularly speak with Officer Castorani about any concerns that are brought to our attention. In addition, all residents should be aware that Officer Castorani is Oakridge's neighborhood police officer and as such he can be contacted via the GPD non-emergency number 972-205-2150 if you have a concern you wish to share with him directly. Please bear in mind however, that he is a police officer, he has regular duties that he must carry out, and may not be able to return your call immediately. If you have something that is urgent and needs immediate attention.....call 911.



North Garland Plan Contemplates Future

Reportedly, there will be a bond election next May. This will be a very important election for North Garland because of the many streets that need to be widened and improved, park and recreation needs, bike and hiking paths, a library, infrastructure needs and more. There will be many needs from across Garland that will exceed the money available so there will be competition to fund these North Area projects. When committees are formed later this year and the Council begins prioritizing projects, your voice needs to be heard—as well as at election time.

One of the methods to judge where infrastructure needs will arise is the use of a comprehensive plan. Planners can project utility, transportation, and other needs from these plans. The Garland Comprehensive Plans are state-mandated documents that, for Garland, are divided into geographic zones: North, South, East, West, and Downtown. A committee is assigned to each of these zones. The North Area Plan Implementation Committee is assigned to our area, of which I have served as vice-chair for over 6 years. The committee has 18 council-appointed members. One of its functions is to review the North Area Comprehensive Plan on an ongoing basis and then recommend revisions and additions as appropriate. The Plan is a set of goals and recommendations dealing with general land use and development, residential land use, retail land use, industrial and commercial land use, parks and open space, community facilities, environmental and urban design, and transportation.



The North Area comprises all land north of Buckingham Rd, Country Club Rd and SH 66 to the city limits, comprising 13,388 acres and 60,000 people (1999 population estimates). The Plan recommends 790 acres for retail/commercial use, a potential 13,708,332 square feet (at 40 % coverage) of building space. Almost 300 of those acres are allocated for the mall and out-parcels. The actual plan document includes pages and pages of design standards, density standards, etc. It is usually summarized on a multi-colored map, a portion of which is represented here.

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What's the Real Estate Market Doing?

Great Question. If you read the papers you would think that we are headed back to the 1980's. I disagree. If you read the business papers you will note that many of them have reported that Greenspan admits he made a mistake in 1999 when over a period of 14 months the Federal Reserve Board raised the interest rates 8 times.

How did this affect the market? Its impact was greater in the commercial world then our general housing market. Here is what happened. In trying to slow the Stock Market, raising the rates tightened money and it was difficult for many new .com companies to get credit. Understand that many of these .com companies had great models, but being young when credit tightened, they sold out to larger companies. These larger companies bought them at overwhelming prices. They had more employees than needed and salaries had grown at such a rate that when the market fell last October, the larger companies could not support the debt and the numbers of highly paid employees... hence the start of the telecom layoffs.

The hardest hit price range for the housing market is above \$500,000.00. Our market is still good, but the prices have not continued to rise. They are leveling.

Remember that as we head into Fall it takes longer to sell a home because of the change in family lifestyles with the kids back in school, their activities and don't forget about the time change. When it gets dark at 5:00 pm it limits the hours in the day to show homes. People cannot see homes in the dark.

I also believe that we will see several rate cuts. I am not sure what effect this will have on our market, but I will be sure and keep you posted.

Parks Richardson vs. Garland

Living as close to Richardson as we do, many residents often wonder why Richardson has all those irrigated, landscaped medians, wild flower plantings, etc., and Garland does not. A comparison of the two cities may help explain.

Population: Richardson 91,802

Garland 215,768

Acres of Park: Richardson 856

Garland 2,698

Park Budget: Richardson \$9,409, 105

Garland \$6,819,257


Employees: Richardson 120

Garland 87

What the above shows is that Garland has about three times as much park land as Richardson but maintains it with 33% less money and far fewer employees. So Garland citizens are certainly getting their "tax money's worth" from the Parks and Recreation Department. The next obvious question is why does Richardson have a bigger budget when the population/acreage is so much smaller? The answer is simple...

TAX DOLLARS from a much larger tax base.

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The Question Is: To Deregulate ... By Jess Janke, Area Manager, TXU

As an investor-owned electric utility in Texas, TXU Electric is participating in the deregulation pilot program in June of 2001 and market opening of our industry in January of 2002. This means that in January TXU Electric customers will have the opportunity to choose their retail supplier for electricity. The retail provider will negotiate with power producers, pay a delivery charge to the

"regulated" transmission/distribution company, and then bill the customer for their usage.

Notice that the transmission/distribution company will remain regulated. The Public Utility Commission of Texas will regulate the transportation rates, and see that reliability standards are met. This means that TXU Electric will continue to maintain the lines and respond to outages. It also means that duplicate facilities will not be needed, as retail providers will be utilizing existing lines to deliver the commodity. If you are currently a TXU Electric customer, you will have the right to purchase your electricity from any retailer licensed by the State. If you do not choose a different supplier, and are a residential or small commercial customer, your rates will be reduced by 6% in January of 2002 as required by the Deregulation Bill. Whether you change suppliers or not, the choice will be yours to make the best decision for your own situation.

... Or Not to Deregulate.

The Garland City Council recently announced plans for Garland Power and Light as Texas begins to deregulate the electric industry. On May 21, 1999, Senate Bill 7 was passed into law. The purpose of the bill is to bring competition into the electric industry. Deregulation begins on January 1, 2002 for all investor-owned utilities. One of the provisions of the bill stipulates that electric cooperatives and municipally-owned utilities such as Garland Power and Light are not required to participate.


The Garland City Council has made the decision not to enter into deregulation for now or the foreseeable future. In fact, all 77 Texas electric cooperatives and 73 municipal utilities have also made the decision not to participate in deregulation. The option to enter the deregulated market will remain open to GP&L. However, once the City Council votes to participate in deregulation, the decision is permanent and there is no opportunity to withdraw at a later date.

Garland Power and Light recently mailed a brochure to inform customers of the City's continued commitment to provide reliable service at a competitive price and to answer possible questions concerning electric deregulation. Additionally, the City has other measures in place to assist with any further questions. A deregulation hotline - 972-205-D-REG (3734) - has been established to answer questions not covered in the brochure.
