President's Message

With the New Year now in full swing and the latest cold blast of winter snow gone, we can begin to hope for the warmth of spring to be just around the corner. It is this time of year that we will be getting out in the yards more often and seeing our neighbors. I would hope that you have gotten to know your neighbors and they know you. If not, take these opportunities to introduce yourself and in doing so, ask if they are members of the ONA. Our goal is to involve as many people in the ONA as possible and will be starting a new membership campaign in the next few months. Our greatest recruiter for the ONA is word of mouth from each of you to your neighbors and friends in Oakridge.

The ONA is working to address many of the issues that affect our neighborhood and will try to work with our residents to keep everything in good shape. Several issues have lingered and we are doing everything within our authority to correct these. The Jupiter perimeter wall has yet to be repaired and the residents responsible have not taken the necessary action to make these repairs. We will investigate the resources available to us to make this happen. The wall at Shiloh and Big Oaks was damaged again, just weeks after it was repaired. The wall reconstruction should start very shortly. We have investigated the possibility of having a traffic light installed at this intersection, but the city has not given us much hope to have this done. Because of the cost of a traffic signal, the city must prioritize the installations and they state there are worse intersections waiting on traffic signals.

City Seeks to Retain Sound Financial Foundation for Future

The 2000 census shows the population in Garland to be over 215,000 citizens. This is a 35,000 increase since 1990, or almost 20% in ten years. With rapid growth comes the need for expanded city services — more fire stations, fire equipment and firemen, more police, equipment and facilities more solid waste facilities like Raney landfill — more streets and alleys to build, rebuild and maintain. The list is endless.

The 1995-96 city budget was \$300.5 million. The 2001-02 budget is \$422.2 million, an increase of \$121.7 million. This does not include Capital Improvement Programs, which have ranged from \$80 million to \$128 million each year. The operation of your city is indeed "Big Business" in terms of dollars.

As both a council member and mayor, I have continually worked to hold the line on property taxes. In 1995 the property tax rate was \$0.6336 cents per hundred dollars of valuation. The rate for 2001-02 is \$0.6411, an increase of only 3/4¢ in almost six years. I am very proud of this accomplishment.

In 1998, shortly after being elected mayor, the city staff and I reviewed the PCI index of street conditions. It showed we were falling behind in street maintenance. I made a proposal to the city council that would almost double the amount of dollars going into street repair and replacement. The council endorsed my proposal and has carried this maintenance program forward each year since.

2001 was a great year for Garland. In spite of the economic downturn and the tragedy of September 11, progress has been made. The city manager and his staff, working with the city council, put plans in place not only for the balance of

These blue vests are unique to Oakridge and make the patroller visible to residents as well as provide the Garland Police with an easily recognizable person should they have to respond to a call. To add even more visibility Oakridge patrollers who use their vehicles while patrolling have magnetic signs for the sides of the vehicle and starting this week, they will have yellow revolving lights for the top of their car. Unfortunately, they haven't come up with a yellow revolving "dome" light for the top of people's heads yet, but our walkers can still be recognized by their blue vests. Officer Gooch was pleased that Oakridge has taken this "extra step" and stated the added visibility will help by showing potential "bad guys" that they should go somewhere else.

The City of Garland has agreed to look at the nepotism situation with the City Council appointment for various volunteer positions within the city. Developer Presents "Town Square" Concept for Mall

The Garland City Council received a presentation on the new mall from the Simon Property Group at its work session Tuesday, Jan. 22.

Jeff Muzzy, city manager and Greens resident, announced at his quarterly meeting with homeowner and neighborhood associations that the presentation was being prepared for separate viewing on the city's Channel 16 available on cable. He also said attempts were being made to include the PowerPoint presentation on the city's web page(www.ci.garland.tx.us), which includes a map of the planned development.

Mr. Muzzy, Mayor Jim Spence, and Councilman Michael Holden traveled to Bowie, Maryland, recently to see first-hand the "town square" concept that is being offered by the Simon group. Stores can have more individual architecture and are "open" as in a town setting, but are managed so that anchors are still strategically situated as in a traditional mall.

Mr. Muzzy said antidotal evidence shows that many people in the Bowie area, in some cases over a hundred miles away, are reporting family trips to the new mall.

The Bowie mall is primarily retail and most of the structures are reported to be essentially

single-story except for the anchors. The Firewheel facility could have higher facades with office space on higher floors.

Over one million square feet are included in the development.

In the north Texas area, Highland Park has long had a town square-type shopping center, as well as the recently completed Southlake Facility. Both are doing well.

mission of Texas.

2001 but for the future as well. These plans, while prudent in a declining economy, should really be done just as good business practice and will become a part of the standard operating procedures of the city for the future. The bottom line is to deliver quality, timely and cost effective services to all the citizens of Garland.

2001 saw a slow down in new construction as well as sales tax revenue. \$144 million of new construction was built in Garland, a decrease of about \$37 million from the previous year. Sales tax revenue came in under that collected in 2000 and continues to fall. The Garland Economic Development Partnership, consisting of the city, school district and the Chamber of Commerce, continues to function well. In 2001 the GEDP was involved in the development of over 1.95 million sq. ft. of diverse projects with tax values of over \$83 million and the creation of about 770 new jobs. The city maintained its rating of AA and AA+ with Standard and Poors and with Fitch.

The Gale Fields Recreation Center was opened in October. In April the new South Garland Branch Library opened.

New ordinances regulating charter schools, metal buildings, retail sales of gasoline and new development standards for the I-30 and I-635 corridors, based on the SH 190 corridor standards, were adapted. DART rail service between Dallas and downtown Garland will become a reality later this year. The Garland Police Department celebrated its Fiftieth Anniversary in 2001. The Eleven Fire Stations concept plan continues to move forward. Land for the new fire station at Brand and Talley Rds is in the process of being purchased. A #2 rating for fire insurance was maintained in 2001.

GP&L is ready for electric deregulation in Texas. A new 85 MW turbine generator came on line in June. For GP&L residential and small commercial ratepayers, your bills will be lower than the "price to beat" mandated by the Public Utility Com-


In 2001, the Firewheel Golf Course became the largest municipally-owned golf course in Texas and the third largest in the nation, with 63 holes of golf. A new clubhouse is presently under construction on Brand Rd and on September 25 the residents of north Garland saw the opening of the new Brand Rd bridge. In 2001 over 20 miles of streets were repaired with concrete slabs and 2.6 miles of asphalt streets were rehabilitated. New traffic signals and the replacement of street signs continues. In 2001 the downtown Plaza Theater was restored and the renovations and additions to the Performing Arts Center will begin in early 2002.

These are just a few examples of the many, many things going on in our city.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to visit with you about happenings, past and present, in our growing city. I want to thank all of you for allowing me to serve the last four years as your Mayor. It has been an honor and a privilege.

My prayer is that God will continue to bless our families, our city, our great nation, and that 2002 will be a great year for all of us.
