We as Americans must proudly display our flag in honor of those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms. Did you know the following:

There is no better symbol of our country's values and traditions than the Flag of the United States of America. Chosen by the Continental Congress in 1777, it continues to exemplify the profound commitment to freedom, equality, and opportunity made by our founders more than two centuries ago. Our flag's proud stars and stripes have long inspired our people, and its beautiful red, white, and blue design is known around the world as a beacon of liberty and justice.

Today, America's Flag graces classrooms, statehouses, courtrooms, and churches, serving as a daily reminder of this Nation's past accomplishments and ongoing dedication to safeguarding individual rights. The brave members of our Armed Forces carry "Old Glory" with them as they fulfill their mission to defend the blessings of democracy and peace across the globe; our banner flies from public buildings as a sign of our national community; and its folds drape the tombs of our distinguished dead. The Flag is a badge of honor to all -- a sign of our citizens' common purpose.

Its 13 red and white stripes represent not only the original colonies, but also the courage and purity of our Nation, while its 50 stars stand for the separate but United States of our Union. Let us pledge allegiance to this Flag to declare our patriotism and raise its colors high to express our pride and respect for the American way of life.

To commemorate the adoption of our Flag, the Congress, by joint resolution approved August 3, 1949 (63 Stat. 492), designated June 14 of each year as "Flag Day" and requested the President to issue an annual proclamation calling for its observance and for the display of the Flag of the United States on all Federal Government buildings. The Congress also requested the President, by joint resolution approved June 9, 1966 (80 Stat. 194), to issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 falls as "National Flag Week" and calling upon all citizens of the United States to display the Flag during that week.

President Clinton called upon the people of the United States to observe with pride and all due ceremony those days from Flag Day through Independence Day, also set aside by Congress (89 Stat. 211), as a time to honor our Nation, to celebrate our heritage in public gatherings and activities, and to publicly recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

In view of what has happened to our country the past nine months, we all should proudly display "Old Glory" from Flag Day through Independence Day. Please do not wait for a real estate agent to place a flag in your yard – go buy one and properly hoist the Red White and Blue.

Sometime this fall or early spring GISD plans to drop a \$375-400 million megaton bond issue on Garland voters, and if history is any indicator, GARLAND voters will sit at home on their "rusty dusty" and complain about the rising school taxes after they get their next tax statement.

In view of the size of the bond package, the purpose of this post is to stimulate debate. With school and property taxes escalating every year there are a few things voters should be asking in order to make an informed decision:

1. How will the money be spent?

2. Are these things absolutely essential to provide students with a good education?

3. How long will it take to pay off the bonds?

4. How much can Garland homeowners expect school taxes to increase every year in order to pay off the bonds?

The following information may be of interest: The last GISD bond election was in 1996 for \$152 million. The proposed bond issue will be a "package deal." Voters will be given one choice: to vote the proposal either up or down. There will be **NO** public hearings. Steve Knagg, Communications for GISD stated "the public hearing will be at the voting booth." Although portions of Sache and Rowlett are in the GISD, Garland homeowners will be picking up most of the tab because we have the largest population.

The following is being proposed. **High School** - Rowlett **Middle School** - Rowlett **Elementary Schools** - one for Sache, Rowlett and Garland

Natatorium (an Olympic swimming pool will probably be built somewhere in N. Garland. (For the old folks who attended the AARP Forum and recall Councilman Holden assuring them they will someday be able to swim in the natatorium, I suggest they hold off buying a new bathing suit).

Special Events Center - which is also suppose to be a "revenue generator"

Early childhood centers (similar to Head Start) Technology - computers, internet, desktops, upgrades, etc.

New Stadium with synthetic turf seating 8,000 people and 2000 parking spaces I have not been able to great a breakdown of cost for each of the above. When inquiry was made as to what voters can expect in terms of school tax increases I was told not to worry because Garland gets \$22 million/year from Robin Hood.

For those who are not familiar with Robin Hood, it was HB 72 that passed the Texas Legislature a number of years ago when some left leaning liberal judge decided that redistribution of wealth was the constitutionally correct thing needed to equalize educational opportunities. With the sweep of his pen the judge turned every school district in Texas into either donors or recipients.

At the present time contributing school districts are claiming they are near the maximum tax rate and alternative funding sources must be found to maintain their quality of education while confronted with progressively larger Robin Hood transfer payments. The donors are not happy campers these days.

Another interesting fact is the ethnic mix in GISD. Mr. Knagg informed me that at the present the percentage of Anglo students is 46% and shrinking by 2% annually. African Americans, Hispanic, and Asians presently account for 54% and rapidly growing.


Recommendation: This is the largest bond proposal in the history of Garland and how this is going to affect our pocket book is something that must be considered by every voter, so get informed.

Since Garland homeowners will be paying off largest share of the bonds, every voter should get off their "blessed assurance" and make their voice be heard. If you approve of this bond proposal then VOTE.

If you approve of some of the expenditures, but not all, let the school board know. If you believe nobody will pay any attention to you, sound off anyway!

If you oppose this bond proposal altogether, remember that GISD is increasing by about 1500 students a years and they have to be educated. What do you propose?

There are not enough pictures or words to describe **Jackie Griffin**. Jackie is the retiring **editor** of the ONA newsletter- a crafter, a reader, and a music lover, in addition to her love for her pets, playing games, working puzzles, friends, and food (anything fried).

Add to the accomplishment of these activities the fact that Jackie, at age 25, after having symptoms since age 16, was diagnosed with CMT, a form of neuromuscular disease, and you have the formula for a very courageous, honest, generous, straightforward, fun neighbor. She worked outside the home until it became too difficult and now she enjoys her activities at home. Jackie is very independent- she doesn't use her handicap as an excuse not to volunteer. When she gets tired and her legs won't safely carry her any further, you see her on Scooter, her battery -powered cart. Much of Jackie's life, according to her own account, was sculpted by living in a family of twelve children, of which she is the youngest, and a loving mother and father who are now deceased. She still maintains strong ties with her remaining family members that began with 6 boys and 6 girls -2brothers and 1 sister are now deceased. Her four living sisters make a pilgrimage each summer to visit, eat Cheerios, and coddle Jackie. She also goes home to Ohio for family reunions. She and her husband, Jim, moved to Oakridge in November of 1985. They later became involved in ONA and in 1995 when Jackie said she would help with the newsletter, you guessed it - she became the editor! After 7 years of editing the paper (that is almost 100 issues)- she is saying good-bye to the job. It would be impossible to count the accumulated hours she has spent calling, reminding, encouraging and even cajoling contributors of articles in order to get the news to us on time. She has typed, cut, pasted, entered, spelled, capitalized, measured, reviewed, arranged, completed and then carried the original to the printer. Then came the addressing and distribution, either by hand (as a few years ago), or to the post office (presently). She created a product that joined us as neighbors and informed us as citizens.

Jackie's favorite music group is Mannheim Steamroller. She hopes to go to their concert the next time they appear in the area. Jackie is probably drawn to their music by their uniqueness and quality of product – two of the same qualities she possesses and in turn, transferred to the newsletter. We are thankful for her years of service as **editor.** Our headline reads:

The 4th Of July Parade will be on Tuesday July the 4th! 9:00 AM


Oakridge Women's Club is sponsoring the annual Fourth of July Parade! Everyone is invited to participate! Join us or watch us! It is fun!


