The more units installed the more effective the entire neighborhood can become in ridding Oakridge of the annoying door to door solicitors.

Speaking of the ONA COP group, did you notice the beautiful Christmas decorations on the bridge this past holiday season? We should thank the COP for the installation and care of the decorations. Hopefully they will reappear next Christmas time.

The ONA District Directors should, also, receive a rousing thank you for making all of the Oakridge entrances eye-catching this past holiday season. I am sure they all had enough to do around their own home but they took the time to make our neighborhood more attractive. We all appreciate the Directors efforts.

Do you or any of your neighbors have Holiday decorations up outside of the house? There is a city ordinance in force that could cause one to be in violation if the decorations are still up on the outside of a house. Call the City Code Enforcement Officer listed in this newsletter and inform him of the decorations still being displayed. Again, we should all help in making the Oakridge area a more pleasing neighborhood.

Have you taken a drive in the Oakridge area lately? Have you noticed the new houses being built on Oak Point Drive? These houses should assist in improving the value of all of our homes. It is nice to see the Oakridge area become built out. Wonder when someone will purchase a house and redevelop it? This is not out of the realm of possibilities. People will discover the benefits of living in a neighborhood that, for the most part, does not have parallel streets; that neighbors care about one another and that contains a private golf course. This can only happen if we all continue to maintain our houses in a neat and orderly appearance.

Speaking of new houses being built – at the January ONA board meeting the board and several adjacent residents listened to a developer tell his story regarding the 14+/- acres of land located at the Northwest corner Shiloh and Belt Line roads. This developer is the same one who did the development in Richardson located where Buckingham dead ends at Audelia. He intends to request a similar type development in our area. The ONA board will keep all informed. Be ready to listen to his story directly at the next General Membership meeting on **March 6**th.

Have you noticed, while driving around the Oakridge area, the many different types of street lights? Some of these are very ugly and do not conform to the type that were originally installed. The city has chosen to allow individuals and or neighborhood associations to upgrade the ugly street lights when these are damaged or destroyed. They will, also, allow the upgrade when the lights are to be replaced due to becoming obsolete. There is a cost involved in the upgrade. The cost depends on several variables too numerous to describe here. The ONA board is working with the city to work out the "kinks" in this new city ordinance. However if it all works out there is a question as to fitting into the limited budget the ONA lives with its participation in any excess cost to upgrade. The immediate solution is to increase the number members in the ONA. You can help. How – by getting your neighbors and friends to join. We have approximately 43 % who are members. It is unrealistic to achieve 100 % but why not 50 or even 60 %? There are 1,187 houses located in the Oakridge neighborhood.

Finally, at our March 6th meeting we will elect a nominating committee. Their charge will be to present a slate of officers via the April ONA newsletter for 2003 - 2004. The election will be at our May 22^{nd} meeting. Mark **March 6th** and **May 22^{nd}** on your calendar.



Thanks to all Oakridge residents who decorated their homes for the holiday season. It sure made patrolling a much more pleasant experience. Although we did have some incidents of vandalism, I think Oakridge faired quite well. Recently, I had a talk with Officer Tannock who told me that Garland's "operation safe holiday" was a success this year.

The C.O.P. provided the ONA with some photos of places on the perimeter of Oakridge that needed fences installed or repaired. We now have a new fence between a portion of Meadowridge and the Pavilion Apts. Another fence has been repaired behind Hearthside. These fences will add security to our community. Chuck Teske, the ONA environmental chairman, is responsible for this quick action. Thanks Chuck!! In addition, the C.O.P. was instrumental in getting the apartment management company to do the necessary repairs and replacement to their fence.

We have brought to the attention of Garland's "Graffiti Hotline" the only graffiti in Oakridge (on the wall of the alley behind Hearthside). The graffiti does not seem to be gang related. The C.O.P. will have removed this graffiti by the time this article appears. If you see any graffiti, please give us a call. We will take a picture of it, call it in to the appropriate place, and see that it is removed. All graffiti is brought to the attention of the Garland "Gang Unit" for evaluation.

Some statistics------ During the 2001 calendar year, there were approximately 91 incidents in the Oakridge area which were called into the GPD. The Oakridge

Citizens on Patrol logged in over 225 hours. This past year, 2002, we had approximately 42 incidents referred to the GPD while the number of patrolled hours increased to over 475. In no way does this mean that the incident drop is a direct result of our patrols, however, it does cast a positive light on our efforts. The one thing that we have tried to do this year is place more emphasis on our visibility. Thanks to

the following C.O.P.'ers who participated in these 475 hours: Brenda Olive, Jane Mayers, Bill Edwards, Jim Cook, Bill Johnson, Jerry Giles, Jim Tucker, Ken Byrd, & Bill Olive. You too can become part of this elite group (sometimes referred to as the "geezer patrol") by enrolling in the next Garland Police C.O.P training class. Contact me at 972-495-3402 for an application and/or information.

The Oakridge C.O.P. will soon have a copy of police reports for all Oakridge incidents during the calendar year 2002. We will then be contacting the residents who were victims to discuss the incident. This will help us evaluate the criminal activities here in Oakridge and better formulate our plan of action for 2003.

I don't know if the "click-it or ticket" push is still ongoing with the GPD, however, the GPD has been issuing tickets to drivers who don't use seat belts. This program is funded by the Federal Govt. and, as one of our officers said, the feds don't fund cities that only give warnings. Buckle Up!!

When driving along Diamond Oaks please do not exceed the speed limit. Perhaps you have seen GPD patrol cars there recently. Their presence is due to complaints from Oakridge residents about speeders. It's hard to beat this new radar in court!!

Lastly, I'd like to thank all of the Oakridge residents who acknowledge us as we patrol. Your smiles and waves mean much to all of us. Thanks, and have a "safe", happy, & healthy 2003.


