Some Observations from the Environmental Committee Chair Chuck Teske

<u>Year to Date:</u> This year we are off to a pretty good start with the addition of perennials at all of our entrances. New perennial plants include Red & Pink Miniature Roses, Yaupons, and Nandinas. The Miniature Roses are of a variety that bloom nine months of the year. These new perennials will allow the ONA to save money on Fall/Winter plantings. With all 5 sprinkler systems functioning well, the existing plants will continue to prosper.

<u>Future Plans:</u> During this Summer and into early Fall, we are going to be working on a few minor maintenance items and the completion of the landscape installation on the Ridge Oak islands. The islands at this entrance are now fully irrigated and the existing trees are beginning to come out of their malaise. On the east island there is a gap where a tree once stood. Our plan is to plant a pot-grown Oak tree, ring the tree with colorful perennials and install edging around the new plants. Additionally, both Ridge Oak Islands will need more Red Miniature Roses planted at their tips for symmetry. Contributions for this project would be greatly appreciated. The plants are very expensive and most of our budget is consumed by mowing and utilities expenses.

<u>Community:</u> Oakridge is a fairly private neighborhood with limited access and homes built closely together. That being said, we have to see each other every day, why can't we be a little more neighborly?

#### GARDEN CORNER by Garden Lover

Watering your lawn and gardens certainly wasn't a problem in June was it? If any- thing, many flowers, trees and shrubs are suffering from over watering this year. Because of the rain, trees are heavily leafed this year, making limbs heavier and more apt to break or split. Take a good look at your trees to make sure they are in good condition. While driving through Oakridge I have noticed some broken and cracked limbs and if left unchecked this could become a hazard, to you, your family, your home or someone else. If the damaged limb is low and lightweight you can probably remove it yourself. Be careful to cut it as close as possible to the trunk and don't let the bark peel to prevent disease and insect invasion. If the limb is high or heavy, call a professional tree trimmer; don't climb onto your roof or a ladder to remove tree limbs. I recently saw one of our residents on the roof, hacking away at an over-hanging limb. This is far too dangerous---and can cost a great deal more than hiring a tree trimmer. In addition, time spent in the hospital, undergoing surgery or doing therapy and recovering, is time you could be spending on the golf course or other fun activities. Besides, you'll need your strength and good health to rake all those leaves this fall. It looks like there's going to be a lot of them to rake!

When pruning shrubs, cut the branch back to an intersection or where you can see new leaf buds or existing leaves. This will allow the shrub to branch out more and keep you from having "sticks" for shrubbery.

You can also prune or pinch-back flowering plants that are becoming leggy. Again, use an intersection, a new leaf bud, or existing leaves as your marker. This will encourage new growth and extent your flowering season.

Of course, on most flowering plants you need to deadhead to keep the blooms coming. You may also need to mulch again in some areas because the rain has washed the mulch away. Unfortunately, hot dry weather is bound to come in Texas and mulch helps retain moisture as well as keep the soil cooler. Everything, including your plants, like "cool" during hot summer days. Now, where did I put my clippers and lemonade?

Be on the lookout for an older two-tone gray and black van with a ladder on the roof. The van has taillights duct taped. The driver is a light skinned male with long stringy hair. There was a second person in the van, but we don't have a description of him/her. The long haired person was seen trying to open front doors of two houses along Pepperidge on July 6 around 5pm. When he noticed an owner observing him he took off. Police, and the C.O.P., searched for but could not find the vehicle in our area. If you see this van, get as much information as possible-----tag #, driver description, etc. and contact the GPD or C.O.P. as soon as possible.

Make sure you keep your front doors locked....if either of the doors this person tried had been unlocked the culprit could have been in the house in seconds!

#### Internet Scam-be on the alert!

There is an internet scam coming from Lagos, Nigeria....the individual is trying to get someone to respond to him to "claim 35 million dollars" being held in a bank there". This is an old scam, it pops up periodically, and invariably people fall for it. If you receive one of these e-mails, delete it; never respond to it. The culprit doesn't have your actual name and oftentimes he/she is asking you to respond to a different e-mail address than the one the original message came from. People who have been foolish enough to respond in the past have found their computers compromised, or worse, their bank accounts, etc. One last word of warning, if you haven't updated your anti-virus program on your computer recently, do it now...there are several new worms and viruses that are being piggybacked onto legit e-mail and websites. It's just another way that crime is being perpetrated on unsuspecting people.

One big area that could be enhanced is sidewalk repair. Typically, when sidewalk repair is needed, a homeowner is responsible for the sidewalk on their property. The city sets aside money to assist a homeowner with 50% of the cost. With the recent bonds of the Neighborhood Vitality Program, a homeowner has the opportunity to be responsible for only 15% of the repairs.

Other benefits from this program are neighborhoods wanting safety features such as security gates or walls. Additionally, some neighborhoods have seen a deterioration of retention ponds. All of these repairs would typically be at the cost of the neighborhood; this program provides some assistance to those wishing to improve the quality of the place where they reside.

The Neighborhood Vitality Program has a deadline of September 1 for applications. Individuals cannot apply for this bond money, only an organized group. An example would be an existing association such as a mandatory or non-mandatory homeowners association, or even a crime-watch group. Furthermore, several neighbors may join together to submit the application. Items such as estimates for repair will be included on the final application.

This is the first time that the City of Garland has had a program such as this. It stands to benefit everyone because, previously, money was not available to get into the neighborhoods. The goal is to see the quality of neighborhoods improve that, in the past, may not have had the funds to do so. I hope that associations and groups will take advantage of this great program to make their neighborhoods even better places to live.
