Dear Oakridge residents:

Tami and I just got back in town from a needed vacation and I am ready to tackle this year's challenging budget. Many of you may have heard that there is significant budget shortfall. Over the next several years the tax rate will increase due to the passage of the bond package as well as council will have to purchase the right of way for the 190 expansions, estimated at 30 million dollars.

There are a few options that the council may choose. Increase the tax rate evenly over the next 4 years (2 cents per year) or we could see a sharp increase over a 3 year period (3 or 4 cents per year). Again these taxes will be used for capital improvement projects and not for operations and management of the city. I do have some information that I can send to you, if you wish and I would appreciate your thoughts and input on this matter.

I received a call from Greg Simms of the Chamber of Commerce and he has advised me that the old Target at the corner of Beltline and Jupiter is under contract. I had been in contact with Lowe's about the purchase of this building and they had made an offer to Target. Mr. Simms said that a group of investors had offered more money and Target has accepted their offer. When I get more information, I will pass it along. I am excited to see this facility being utilized and hope that they will bring in a good neighbor.

Lastly, we will be approaching the deadline for the September filing for the Neighborhood Vitality Funds and I know that Oakridge Neighborhood Association is working overtime to be prepared. If you have any questions or you would like to be involved do not hesitate to contact me.

We can either clean up Audubon Park, or the Spring Creek Greenbelt Park (down Shiloh towards 190) -- I figured Spring Creek. Please check out our website at www.oakridgena.com or give me a call (972-495-7769) for all the details. Everything you'll need (gloves, trash bags, etc.) is provided by the City, and there's going to be food and prizes for the volunteers. Each family has to complete a registration form -- you can get it on our website, or come by and pick one up. Let's make a big ONA showing at the Trash Bash.

Neighborhood Vitality Application Process Winding Down By the time you get this, I'm hoping we are winding down all of our paperwork for the Neighborhood Vitality (Matching) Grant Program. If our total dollar amount for all projects exceeds \$25K, we'll be bumped up to paying 20% of the costs -- still a huge bargain. We could never afford such improvements to our neighborhood without this grant money. Our projects are lighting the main entrances, adding irrigation and landscaping along Buckingham, cleaning and repainting the bridge, and sidewalk repairs. Our deadline for submitting our application packet is September 1 so depending on when you get this, it may not be too late to contact me to add your name to the sidewalk repair list. It appears that because of the bond money circumstances, the work will not begin until Spring 2005.

I think that's about it for now. Have a good August. Nelson.


The Safety Factor by Jean Redfearn

As summer winds down, vacations are a memory and we all get ready for the school bells to ring. Many things are taken for granted. One of those is a safe journey to and from school. The City of Garland and the Garland Independent School District team up to provide Garland's children with a safe trip to school.

All adults can be a part of this team by following the traffic laws. Vehicles must travel at the speed of 20 MPH when the school zone lights are flashing, and stop behind the stop bars to allow the crossing guard and children to get safely across the street. Never enter a crosswalk when any pedestrian is in it. The crossing guard will drop his flag when it is safe to proceed. Also, be sure to wait when a school bus is stopped with the red lights flashing until the lights stop flashing.

Last school year, the City of Garland Adult School Crossing Guards safely crossed over 5,000 children each day, and over 15,000 children rode Garland Independent School District buses daily.

Garland Police will be strictly enforcing the traffic laws to ensure that the children and parents obtain the expected – a safe trip to and from school.

GARDEN CORNER by: Garden Lover

This month we are going to concentrate on a serious subject—mosquitoes. Did you know that mosquitoes are found everywhere, even in the Artic and Antarctic regions, and there are about 200 different species in the United States alone? Everyone has heard of the West Nile Virus, but few pay much attention to the warnings. Fortunately, Garland has not had any reported cases of West Nile this year. However, we have had mosquitoes that tested positive for the disease. West Nile is transmitted by a bite from an infected mosquito. It can infect people, horses and birds as well as other kinds of animals. Most people who become infected will have either no symptoms or only mild ones. The good news is that less than 1% of people who are bitten and become infected will get severely ill, however in some cases the virus can result in death. It is important therefore to protect yourself from being bitten, because we have no way of knowing who is going to be the 1%!

Start by *sparingly* applying insect repellent containing DEET to any exposed skin and to your clothing. The **more** DEET the product contains **the longer time it can protect** you from mosquito bites-- it does not mean that it will protect you any better-- it just lasts longer. But, don't waste money buying products with DEET concentrations over 50%; it won't increase your exposure time. Insect repellents can irritate the eyes and mouth, so avoid applying repellent to your hands or the hands of children.

Now, go outside and take the following actions:

Empty standing water in any container, including plastic chair covers and grill covers, or anything that can retain a small amount of water such as potted plant trays, wading pools, bird baths, and

fountains or even toys. Of course, you will want to clean and refill the wading pools, birdbaths and fountains and this should be done at least once per week.

Drain or fill temporary "pools" (those little divots in the lawn that we all have) with dirt.

Keep swimming pools treated and circulating and rain gutters unclogged.

Make sure window and door screens are "bug tight".

Place mosquito netting over infant carriers when you are outdoors with infants. <u>Never use insect repellent on infants.</u>

Replace outdoor lights with yellow "bug" lights.

Mosquitoes that carry the West Nile virus are more active around dusk and dawn; however, in this area they are also likely to bite at any time of the day.

The Garland Health Department can set up a mosquito trap in your area if you see a large number of mosquitoes. Call 972-205-2000. The trap remains in place overnight and depending upon the number of insects trapped, spraying can be done to help. The trapped insects are sent to the state lab for testing to determine if any of them contain the West Nile Virus.

Remember, mosquitoes feed on blood, if they're hungry, they're going to bite you. Protect yourself and stay safe.

Crime Watch / C.O.P Report by Bill Olive

A review of police reports from mid-May through June 30 reveals over \$8,000 worth of items were stolen from unlocked cars, garages and homes in Oakridge! The value of items stolen from locked cars and homes totaled just over \$5,000. There were eight incidents reported during this period, 5 were from unlocked vehicles, open garages and unlocked homes. It appears that Oakridge residents are "putting out the welcome mat" for thieves. The items taken from the locked vehicles included laptop computers, cash and cell phones, all items that should never be left in a vehicle, whether it is locked or not. Please, do not leave "attractive" items in your vehicle where they can easily be seen. Take everything of value from your vehicle when you get home unless you're parking your vehicle in a locked garage.

During a recent Crime Watch meeting, it was pointed out by the Police Department that many people have a garage loaded with "stuff" valued at \$500 or less while they park their expensive car, loaded with goodies, in the drive or on the street. The Salvation Army and other charities are always looking for donors; perhaps it's time to clean out the garage and move your valuables inside.

On Saturday, August 7, the Garland Police Department will be graduating another group of citizens from its Citizens on Patrol class. I will be attending to discuss patrol procedures from a citizen's perspective. There will be another class as soon as sufficient volunteer applications are received. If you would like to join us just give me a call. One or more hours a week can make a big difference, and, the more patrollers we have, the better for Oakridge. Here is my take on how the C.O.P., helps the Garland PD. If what we do frees up one police officer to "back up" another, then an officer's life may be saved, or a thief or murderer may be apprehended.

Don't forget, Officer Blassingame is scheduled to be at the ONA general membership meeting on September 23. Donations: If you would like to contribute to the C.O.P., please mail a check, made out to the ONA to this address: Oakridge Citizens on Patrol, P.O. Box 452393, Garland, TX., 75044. Our "wish list" includes new reflective signs, new *quiet* revolving lights, better communication devises, scanners, incident note pads, stamps, surveillance cameras, etc. The C.O.P. is under the direct control of the Garland Police Department via Lt. Rene, and Officer Blassingame. We are a voluntary part of the ONA, however, the C.O.P provides services to *all* residents of Oakridge whether or not they are ONA members. We do encourage everyone to join the ONA to help keep Oakridge the place to be!

Please remember that school (yeah!) reopens this month---be vigilant, there will be some "very excited" youngsters out there. **School zone speed limits are strictly enforced**.

Thanks to all the residents who have taken the time to call us regarding various "suspicious" activities. We are hoping to present some Attaboy/Attagirl Awards at the September ONA meeting.
