Hello, ONA members. As always, thank you for your support and encouragement.

Mark your calendar for the **ONA General Membership meet**ing on Thursday, September 23 at Oakridge Country Club -6:30 social; 7:00 meeting. Baylor Medical Center at Garland will be offering a physician presentation and free blood pressure and blood glucose screenings, plus give-a-ways. Our dedicated Neighborhood Police Officer Tony Blassingame will be speaking also.

On August 31, the ONA filed our Oakridge **neighborhood vitality** project paperwork with the City. If all of our projects are approved, we'll be adding irrigation along the Buckingham border of Oakridge, lighting both Oakridge signs at the four main entrances, cleaning and painting the Diamond Oaks bridge, and "up lighting" the trees on the medians at the Ridge Oak entrance. We also filed sidewalk repair project paperwork on behalf of 20 Oakridge residents.

It appears that the work may begin as soon as Spring 2005. Completion of these projects will have a significant impact on the beauty of our neighborhood and of Garland. These projects will beautify major Garland thoroughfares and main entrance points for those coming from Richardson into Garland. We are terribly grateful to both **Billy Jack Sprinkler Com**-

pany and Oakridge Paint and Paper for their good will in preparing written estimates for our projects -- all the while knowing that to get the jobs, they'll have to bid all over again with the City next Spring. These beautification projects would not be possible without their efforts. I hope you'll check out their ads in the Oakridge News and return their good will by giving them your business, and referring your friends and family to them.

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Dear Oakridge residents

As many of you know, the City of Garland has been through one of the toughest years regarding the budget.

Many factors contributed to the sluggish growth to the bottom line. Property values have not increased as they had in the past, health insurance once again has increased over 10%, fuel prices have had an impact on the on the operations of our facilities and retail sales still remain stagnant. With all this being said, city staff prepared an excellent budget that does not include a tax increase on the debt service side nor the operational side.

The Police Dept has added 7 new positions that are dedicated to the 911 call center and should help in decreasing the average response time to an emergency call. The Council has authorized the Police Dept. to over hire for their next academy to fill the some 22 vacancies. Through retirements and cadets that do not make it through the rigorous training, the over hires should fill some of these open positions. The City Council also approved bilingual pay for Police and Fire and hopes to provide this to the rest of the employees next year.

The City Manager was intent on not reducing other city services and the Council approved the budget on September 7th. The City Council will be challenged during the budget retreat in November. We will be faced with many of the same negative factors as above. We will also be discussing public safety as our needs in the Fire Dept and Police Dept will grow as the city grows. The Council will also deliberate what type of compensation to provide employees as we are losing ground on market averages.
