Hello, ONA members.

As always, thanks for your encouragement and support.

If yours was one of the 20 sidewalks to be repaired as part of the neighborhood vitality program, I'm disappointed to tell you we had to remove these projects from our submission. The cost of the sidewalk repairs put us in the 20% match category, increasing the ONA match for our neighborhood projects by \$1,140. I didn't feel this was fair to all 502 members to pay an extra \$1,140 for our neighborhood projects to in essence subsidize the sidewalk repairs of 20 homeowners. The ONA Board agreed unanimously, so the sidewalk projects were pulled.

Now, that being said, the City still has its 50/50 sidewalk repair program in place. If you feel your sidewalk needs repair, give City Engineering a call at (972) 205-2170, and they'll send someone out to evaluate your sidewalk. If the City agrees your sidewalk needs repair, they'll split the cost of the repairs with you. It's a very generous offer by the City.

There was a young woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her "things in order", she contacted her pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes. She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in. Everything was in order and the pastor was preparing to leave when the young woman suddenly remembered something very important to her. "There's one more thing," she said excitedly. "What's that?" came the pastor's reply. "This is very important," the young woman continued. "I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand." The pastor stood looking at the young woman, not quite knowing what to say. "That surprises you, doesn't it?" the young woman asked. "Well, to be honest, I'm puzzled by the request," said the pastor.

The young woman explained. "My grandmother once told me this story, and from there on out, I have always done so. I have also, always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who are in need of

encouragement. In all my years of attending church socials and potluck dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course where being cleared, someone would invariably say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming...like velvety chocolate cake or deep dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance! So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder "What's with the fork?" Then I want you to tell them: "Keep your fork...the best is yet to come." The pastor's eyes welled up with tears of joy as he hugged the young woman good-bye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the young woman had a better grasp of what heaven would be like that many people twice her age, with twice as much experience and knowledge. She KNEW that something better was coming.

At the funeral people were walking by the young woman's casket and they saw the pretty dress she was wearing and the fork placed in her right hand. Over and over, the pastor heard the question "What's with the fork?" And over and over he smiled. During his message, the pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the young woman shortly before she died. He also told them about the fork and what it symbolized to her. The pastor told the people how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them that they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either. He was right. So next time you reach down for your fork, let it remind you ever so gently, that the best is yet to come.

Friends are a very rare jewel, indeed. They make you smile and encourage you to succeed. They lend an ear, they share a word of praise, and they always open their hearts to us. Cherish the time you have, and the memories you share. Being friends with someone is not an opportunity, but a sweet responsibility.
