Court orders Garland to hold 2006 election

Most of you know by now that the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has issued a writ of mandamus to call an election for 2006. The city council finally approved a June 17 date for the election, and districts 1, 2, 4, and 5 will be up for election.

I hope we can now move forward with the business of the city; therefore, I have asked that several agenda items be placed on the work session for discussion. I would really appreciate your input on these issues.

I am interested in what a limit on garage conversions would do to our congested neighborhoods, and I would be curious to see, if some type of limit is created, how it would work.

Also, I have been threatening to look at our current sign ordinance and look for changes and updates in this area. I believe they are drastically needed to keep up with our competitors in other communities.

The council will also have a discussion with *The Dallas Morning News* about the type of service delivery

course, every citizen can report violations; it is just not part of our charter.

I was told you can tell what somebody is interested in by looking at their checkbook, because the place where they spend the most money is their priority. We spend the majority of our budget on the landscaping, so, based on this theory, our main priority must be landscaping. I personally would like to spend more on special events and have great neighborhood parties, but our main priority still has to be landscape maintenance because that was our original goal

We had a landscape architect speak at the March 23 General Meeting. We are taking bids and formulating plans to improve the landscaping of the entrances and the perimeter walls. We would also like to landscape the area along Diamond Oaks between Big Oaks and Ridge Oak. This area is always busy with walkers, joggers, and golfers, so making it more like a park would be nice.

We are not sure yet how this is going to look exactly or how it will get done, so your opinions and suggestions are very important during this decisionmaking time. This is all about Oakridge as a community, not the ONA Board.

In closing, I want to reiterate that we understand our purpose. We want more people to join the ONA, but we mainly want joyful members. The Nominations Committee has done a great job choosing the upcoming board, and I hope you will be pleased with it.

Pending the election results in May at the General Meeting, I will stay on the board as vice president and Mike Dollar will be president. Mike and I have worked together closely over the last year and I look forward to following his leadership.

Don Pattie has taken over as the landscape director and is doing a great job. He has formulated a Request for Proposal (RFP) and will be taking bids from landscape contractors. This is a big undertaking, so make sure you thank him for the effort he puts into it.

The Praters will continue the excellent job with the newsletter and Web site. Sherri will assume the role of special events coordinator, as Joann Williams will become treasurer.

This, building community, was the missing, most significant piece of our three goals. I am really excited about seeing Oakridge moving forward.

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Mulch from Louisiana could contain pesky Formosan termites

There has been much controversy with the possibility of Formosan termites being found within mulch from Louisiana. Formosan termites are an introduced subterranean termite from Asia. They are considered more economically important since they consume more cellulose and have larger colony sizes compared to Eastern subterranean termites.

Formosan termites are most readily identified by their soldier caste with its tear-dropped shaped head and aggressive behavior. If the soldiers are encountered by humans, they will insert their mandibles into human skin.

Formosan termites can be found in trees, so they have the potential for being transported in wood mulch. There is a quarantine within Formosan termite-infested areas in Louisiana to prevent infested wood products from being shipped to new areas.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) supports the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's quarantines, and TDA has a quarantine to prevent moving Formosan termites from certain states and areas until items have been fumigated by a TDA-approved method.

Consumers should be aware that ter-

mites could be found in mulch, so be cautious when buying mulch. If these termites are introduced into areas, the cost of treatment will be more than the value of the mulch. Therefore, it is advised to purchase mulch from reliable sources. If a bag of mulch is infested with termites, reseal the bag and return the mulch to the retailer.

A more common way of introducing Formosan termites into areas is using recycled infested railroad ties as landscape timbers. Even though the railroad ties are treated by creosote, the inner portion is not treated. This allows Formosan termites to inhabit the center areas of railroad ties.

Termite Swarming Season

There are two subterranean termite genera that cause most of the structural damage in Texas. One, *genera Reticulitermes*, will become noticeable as the reproductives begin swarming during the day.

Termites are social insects and have a caste system consisting of workers, soldiers, and winged reproductives. Each caste member within a termite colony has distinct physical and behavioral characteristics.

Termites feed on any cellulose material, such as roots, paper, and card-

board. They are important to our ecosystem since they decompose cellulose. However, subterranean termites become economic pests when they invade human dwellings and structures.

Subterranean termites live in colonies underground to avoid sunshine and outside air. The workers build the shelter tubes from tiny pieces of soil, wood, and debris that are glued together using secretions and fecal material. Termites tend to have an extensive tunneling system underground, allowing them to carry resources back into the colony.

Termite damage may be detected by the presence of mud tubes, damaged wood, and the swarming of winged termites.

Termite damage may also be apparent on door frames or window sills, or dead termites might be visible along window sills or baseboards.

Some Preventative Practices

Eliminate contact between the wooden parts of the house foundation and maintain at least six inches between the soil and porch steps, lattice work, door or window frames.

Stumps, scrap wood, grade stakes, foam boards, cardboard boxes, and newspapers found around structures should be removed.

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Oakridge Citizens on Patrol warn people of dangers of solicitors

During the last several weeks. we've received numerous calls from Oakridge residents asking for the status of the Oakridge prowler who was taken into custody last month. From information we've received, the suspect was already on parole from another county at the time he was arrested by Garland police. Because of this, he will probably stay in jail until his trial. We will keep you informed of the final disposition.

Everyone should continue to be vigilant regarding their property and There have been several person. reports of criminal activity in the surrounding neighborhoods. It is a known fact that these people tend to work one neighborhood then move on to another. Unfortunately, if the pickins are good in one neighborhood, they remember and come back again. January and February were Oakridge's turn, and now they're hitting the surroundding areas. Let's don't issue an invitation to come back to Oakridge.

Being alert and watching out for your neighbors, as well as yourselves, is a good way to prevent them from returning here. First and foremost, keep your garage door closed! If you see your neighbor's door open, call them or knock on their door. If you get no answer, call the police and/or us. Remember, it only takes a minute or so for someone to enter, snatch whatever is available, and run. Having to go out and buy new golf clubs, new bikes, or a new car isn't necessarily what you want to do with your time. And filling

company is a major pain and a big time consuming job.

We've had some reports of magazine salesmen going from door to door again. This is the same old story: they're young people who are being used by some less-than-savory characters to play on the compassion of others. While they're scamming you with their sob story, they're scouting the neighborhood for likely targets so they can come back later and rob and steal.

Garland has some pretty good laws on the books regarding door to door solicitors, and the ONA still has some "No Soliciting" signs available. These can be displayed on the front area of your home to prevent solicitors.

The signs can help keep people from walking up to your home, so they have no reason to look in through your windows. If someone comes to your door whom you don't know, don't open the door. It isn't rude to yell "Who is it?" first. Then, if it isn't someone you know, ask, "What do you want" and finally say, "I'm not interested," without ever opening the door. Friendly is nice, but safety is better! If they don't leave, or insist upon talking to you face to face, advise them, "I'm calling the police," and do it.

Now is a good time to check your home. Look at it the way a burglar or thief would. Are your windows covered partially or totally by shrubs or trees? Cut or trim them back and don't provide a hiding place. Do all of your windows and doors have working locks? If not, please get some installed, either by yourself or with the help of someone else. There are some advertisers in our

out all the paperwork for your insurance newsletter who do odd jobs. Call one of them and let them assist you.

> There is some good news; according to the weekly reports we receive regarding recorded incidents, Oakridge had no reported crimes since mid-February. However, in the last couple of days, we've been told about some golf clubs being stolen at Oakridge Country Club. If you see any strange activity at the club, call the club at 972-530-8008.

> The Citizens Patrol is planning to be at the Oakridge picnic in May to pass out some items that might be of interest to residents. Please stop and talk to us about programs we are looking into that may help our neighborhood become less attractive to bad guys. One thing we're considering is sponsoring an evening self-defense class taught by one of Garland's police training officers. We will let you know how this progresses.

> Finally, Citizen's Patrol gets no funding from the City of Garland, ONA, or any other group. The hats, vests, shirts, scanner radios, bikes, fuel, and other items are all provided for by the individual members at their own expense. The signs for the cars are very important and need to be upgraded and replaced.

> If you would like to help out financially, please stop by our display at the May picnic. If you would like to participate as a patroller, give us a call at 972-495-3402. All of our patrollers have had C.O.P. training by the Garland Police Department, and 80 percent of active C.O.P members are also graduates of the Garland Citizen's Police Academy.

Cake Mix Cookies

Cake mix cookies are the easiest and best cookies — 45 minutes from start to 3 dozen warm, delicious cookies.

Ingredients:

1 cake mix 1/2 cup canola oil 2 eggs 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Stir ingredients together. Drop by spoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet and bake until done.

Variations: We love lemon cake mix cookies. Also, try devil's food cake mix cookies with half a bag of chocolate chips stirred in. Spice cake mix cookies are very good.

Yellow cake mix cookies rolled in cinnamon sugar before baking are pretty good snickerdoodles. I've even made orange-cranberry biscotti using an orange cake mix and Craisins dried cranberries.

Tips: I use a Silpat liner on my halfbun-pan baking sheet. Makes perfect cookies.

You can get these at AceMart, across the street from Oakridge. I also bought a small scoop there that I use to scoop out the cookies. Sometimes I roll the cookie dough balls in sugar, and sometimes I press them down a little also before I bake them.

Never be without homemade cookies with cake mix cookies!
