Council Report

One of the things I have enjoyed, since retiring from the Social Security Administration on January 3, 2007, has been sleep. For years, my alarm woke me up at 5:00 am after having a 6 or 7 hour sleep. Now I wake up, without an alarm, usually after about 8 1/2 hours sleep with the exception of the week prior to April 1, 2008. That was the date the City Council was to consider a request for a Special Use Permit (SUP) on a large Race Trac store at the SW corner of Shiloh and Arapaho, and I literally lost sleep thinking about this request. SUPs are required for all gas stations, and if the SUP is denied, then the gas station will not be built. Normally, an unattractive Race Trac would have been a slam dunk denial, but the plan for the Shiloh/ Arapaho site was going to be a new

style store which included fabric awnings, a standing seam metal roof, decorative street lighting out front, brick all over including a brick enclosed dumpster, lots of landscaping, and in general an attractive exterior which looked more like a nice restaurant. When I watched the Plan Commission meeting, almost without exception, each commissioner seemed conflicted on how he/she should vote, but they eventually voted 8-0 to deny the SUP.

The Plan Commission decision was appealed to the City Council. I know I am only one vote in 9 on the Council, but the normal rule we use on the City Council is that we follow the lead of the Council representative in whose district the property lies unless there is a com-

pelling reason to do otherwise. My initial inclination, when I first spoke with the Race Trac people and saw their very much improved design, was to allow the SUP. They had also worked hard with the Planning Department to remedy traffic/safety concerns.

On the other hand, what I really would like to see is a plan for that site with a larger project more compatible with a residential setting, perhaps with a bank anchoring this corner. I emphasize that is what I would like to see because this 21 acre lot is currently zoned Shopping Center (except for a portion on the south section) which allows many uses such as minor automobile repair shops, laun-

renovation - accomplishing two of five neighborhood priorities identified through the City of Garland Strategy for Vital Neighborhoods Program.

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"Top 10" for Springtime

Spring has finally arrived in Oakridge, and CPS has great news! According to the US Dept of Justice, personal property crime has reduced 29% since 1975 (of course internet related crime has more than made up for this difference). The main



reasons for the reduction: Neighborhood Watch programs, home security systems, and Neighborhood Police Officers! Just goes to show that stepping out of the house and getting to know your neighbors - rather than spending time in front of the computer monitor - really is the safest choice!

And now, since we will all be spending more time outside, here is the "Top 10" list for ways to make Spring safe for all of us:

- Before resuming your rides through the park, check screws/bolts on bikes for looseness, wear, etc.
- Begin wearing sunscreen now. The sun's rays are just as harmful during the mild sunny days of Spring as they are during the triple-digit heat of the Summer.
- While cleaning gutters, trimming trees, or checking the roof, set the base of your ladder one foot from the wall for every 4 feet of ladder height.
- 7. Skip the headphones. Walkers/joggers wearing headphones are twice as likely to be a crime victim, since they are less aware of their surroundings. (They also get hit by cars because they cannot hear the screeching tires or horns).
- Before beginning the BBQ season, check the gas grill for leaks, loose seals, and broken parts.
- Spring means plant growth and not just harmless weeds. Learn to identify and how to eliminate poison ivy, sumac, and poison oak.
- Make sure your Spring Cleaning ritual includes removing old prescriptions from the medicine cabinet flush drugs; do not throw them away. Don't forget to check smoke detectors too.
- Practice safety around power lines. Do not attempt to remove a kite tangled in electrical lines. Contact GP&L (972) 205-2671
- 2. Carry personal identification with you during walks in case of emergencies.
- Report any suspicious activity in the neighborhood to the police immediately; no one ever complains about having too much information when it comes to Crime Prevention and Safety!

dromats, etc. without any council involvement....unless an SUP is required.

I wondered whether plopping down an industrial strength size gas/convenience store on that corner set the wrong "tone" for future development and might even preclude a larger, more desirable project in the future. In discussions with the Planning Department, it was their very learned opinion that the Race Trac would not adversely affect future development on that property. So, what direction should I go with this request?

If you saw the April 1st council meeting, you saw me argue that we should deny the SUP, and the vote was 7-2 to deny. What was the #1 factor that led me to

argue for a denial? Citizen input. I had about 15 emails/calls from residents opposed to the SUP, and there was public testimony at the meeting opposing the SUP. No one contacted me supporting it. Do these 15 emails/calls represent what the majority of the residents in District 7 think? I don't know, but that's the only feedback I got. Was the SUP denial the best decision? Again, I don't know. Only time will tell. But I do know one thing—your input is important. It made a difference in this case.

RESULTS OF STEPPED UP DWI PATROLS

After two weeks of increased DWI patrols, March 7th – March 16th, Garland Officers arrested 13 people for Driving While Intoxicated, issued 33 citations and made six non-alcohol arrests.

The additional patrols were funded by the IMPAIRED DRIVER MOBILIZA-TION GRANT which is sponsored by TXDOT. The grant's aim is enforcing DWI laws for all drivers with a special emphasis on Driving Under the Influence by Minors. There were no minors arrested during this enforcement time.

Statistics in Texas show us someone is hurt or killed in an alcohol related crash every 19 minutes and drunk-driving claims 5 lives every day. This year Garland has had three fatality crashes with the most resent one being alcohol related.

Sunday night, March 16th, as the enforcement came to close a P/U ran a red light on Glenbrook at Ave B causing a collision with a Garland squad car. The driver of the P/U was intoxicated and charged with DWI.
