Council Report

Like most people, I'm not fond of losing, but on July 1, I was on the losing end of a 6-2 City Council vote which passed a metal recycling ordinance in Garland. I shall not rehash all the details of the ordinance, but basically it requires all metal recyclers in Garland to take a photo and get a fingerprint of those selling metal (other than aluminum cans) for recycling. The idea is to stop or reduce metal thieves who may steal \$35.00 worth of copper tubing from an air conditioner unit while doing \$2,500 in damages. I did not and do not believe this law will be effective, but I am certainly not going to criticize my 6 colleagues whose opinions differed from mine for several reasons.

First, I gave my best arguments during debate, but in the end, the ordinance passed. This is the democratic process, and who can argue with that?

Second, this council works very well together, and one of the reasons is that we don't criticize each other. Disagreements are a natural part of the legislative process, and when one ends up on the losing side of a vote, you simply move forward. If you want to read about Council bickering, read the Metro section of the Dallas Morning News where frequently council members in other cities are jabbing at each other in the press. We don't want to be like that in Garland.

I mentioned in last month's article, that I was leaning toward NOT voting for an ordinance which would ban cell phones in school zones, but I encouraged readers to e-mail me with opinions. I received a total of 6 opinions, and like me, none supported this proposed ordinance. When it came up for a vote on the July 15 Council meeting, not one City Council person made a motion to pass the ordinance (i.e., all 8 of us just viewed it as a "feel good" ordinance which served little practical purpose). Thus, we obviously did not pass this ordinance.

Pest Check—Cicada Killers

During the warmest days of summer, we will be joined by a rather large insect, known as the cicada killer. Cicada killers are active during late July and August, coinciding with the appearance of cicadas which they sting and paralyze. Cicadas are large insects that "sing" in the trees during late summer. The female cicada killer will search tree trunks and lower limbs for cicadas,

which she will sting and drag back into her burrow.



The female cicada killers usually dig burrows in areas that are sandy, bare, and exposed to full sunlight. They prefer to nest in areas of little vegetation, compared to thick areas of turf. Each

female captures at least one cicada (some collect two or three) and a single egg is laid in the cicada before being sealed off. Even though an area may contain many burrows, female cicada killers are solitary. This means that each female constructs a burrow and captures her own cicadas to serve as food for her developing young.

The cicada killer develops through complete metamorphosis, with four life stages: egg, larva, pupae and adult. In two to three days, the eggs will hatch. Depending on the number of cicadas in its burrow, the cicada killer larvae can feed for 4 to 10 days. Then the larvae will pupate and the adults will emerge from July to August. This insect only has one generation a year.

One thing we did pass on July 15 was an increase in solid Waste collection. Specifically, the monthly charge increased (effective August 1) from \$16.25 to \$18.09 per month--a \$1.84 increase. Of course, the reason is due to the price of gas—as the solid waste collection trucks use a lot of gas. We will start a series of

budget meetings (most held on Thursday evenings in August) FY 09 (i.e., Oct 08 – Sept 09), and all these budget meetings will be televised. If you care to tune in and provide me with feedback, that would be appreciated. For example, I know for a fact Garland's Star Spangled 4th celebration has been cut from the FY 09 budget since this will save the City about \$230,000. How important to you is this

annual celebration? I know some other fee increases will be part of the proposed budget presented by the City Manager to the Council. As always, we will be doing our best to keep taxes as low as possible while at the same time, providing the level of city service that residents of Garland expect.

Garland recently created a Citizens request Center, accessible on Garland's home page http://www.ci.garland.tx.us/Home (in the left column). This site allows you to find information or ask questions about City services. In addition, you may request certain City services online. At this time, service requests are limited to a few departments, but the City is adding new departments as quickly as possible. Another feature on Garland's home page is a link (in the far right column) asking your thoughts about how to save money, since the budget is going to be very tight. That link is scheduled to come down on August 28. You can provide your thoughts there, or if you prefer, email me directly.

On July 24, Garland had its first confirmed case of West Nile Virus, and it was a district 7 resident who lived in Oakridge on Rocky Trail. This human case was a surprise since the City of Garland has tested over 2,000 mosquitoes thus far this summer and has not seen any virus activity. Notices were sent to surrounding neighbors, and the City sprayed for mosquitoes on July 28.

It is natural to be concerned about the effects of spraying on you, pets, the environment, etc.; however, the City of Garland sprays Aqualuer 20-20® which has an active chemical agent called Permethrin. Mixed with water it is applied at 5.0 ounces per minute with the truck driving at 10 mph. Thus, only 5/100ths of a teaspoon of active agent in a microscopic mist lands on a typical residential lot (1/4 acre). It has the lowest toxicity to mammals of any insecticide on the market. Typically, the City only sprays areas where a mosquito has been found carrying the virus or where an individual lives who became infected.

Pest Check—Cicada Killers

Adult cicada killers feed on flower nectar and sap. The female wasps are non-aggressive and rarely sting unless touched or disturbed. Male cicada killers are usually aggressive and tend to defend nesting sites. However males lack a stinger, so they are harmless.

Non-Chemical Control Options:

- 1) Apply fertilizers and water turfgrass to promote growth.
- 2) Also place mulch in flowerbeds and around shrubs to cover sandy soil to help reduce cicada populations.

Chemical Control Options:

Control is usually not recommended, since this is considered a beneficial insect. However these wasps can become a problem in high traffic areas around homes and in commercial areas such as around swimming pools, flower beds, and golf course greens.

If control is necessary, first the nests should be located during the daylight hours, while the female is foraging. Then at night or before dawn, sprinkle around 1 tablespoon of carbaryl dust into the burrow and then close the entrance of the burrow. Other suggestions for spray treatments that are labeled for wasp control include acephate, allethrin, cyfluthrin, cypermethrin, permethrin, and resmethrin. Repeat treatments may be needed for two to three weeks as new wasps move into the area.
