District 7 Council Report

At the June 15 City Council work session, we came to consensus that we would amend the current ordinance (which may have happened by the time this article is read) reguiring convenience stores to have high resolution cameras, a drop safe, a panic button, etc. This was modeled after an ordinance recently passed in Dallas. I personally had some difficulties with requiring "mom and pop" stores to purchase drop safes and incur a monthly expense for a burglar alarm systems with panic button, but the majority felt otherwise. Perhaps this will help fight crime.

Approximately 85% of the homes in Garland receive their electricity from Garland Power & Light, and the other 15% have a choice of electric

provider although all re-

pairs/maintenance is done by Oncor regardless of provider. The Garland City Press (a city produced newspaper sent every other month) always show a little electricity comparison chart. Even though GP&L customers do not have a choice of providers (it would take pages of complicated writing to explain why), GP&L rates in the little comparison choice have looked very good over the last year, but in recent months not as good. GP&L has not changed residential rates in about 3 1/2 years, so movement in the chart is a function of other providers changing their rates. In recent months, the price of natural gas (a fuel that is used by many turbines to generate electricity) has been low, so other providers' electricity prices have been going down while GP&L has remained constant. However, price isn't everything. During the huge storms of June 10/11, GP&L had only a few short outages. However, Oncor described the storm as the third worst in history, and I received many calls from Oncor customers in Garland who had no electricity for 2 or 3 days. I know many of them would have loved to have been a GP&L customer while they were sweltering in the heat and humidity sans electricity.

Many of you have driven by a sign on Arapaho which says Chambers Brothers. That sign is located on a gate to the 140 acres of Chambers

Incidents from June 7 through June 20

Graffiti Cleanup:

As of today (6/23) the city code department has taken care of the removal of most of the graffiti in Oakridge. There are a of couple spots which may require a second cleaning. We thank Garland Code Enforcement for their prompt action. In an effort to curb this activity, we will be speaking with the Oakcrest HOA to request that they secure an opening in their fence which allows people to pass from Oakcrest into Oakridge. There is, of course, the possibility that the graffiti was done by Oakridge residents and we are stepping up our patrols in an effort to prevent any reoccurrences. Residents living along the wall areas, regardless whether it is Oakridge's walls or the wall surrounding the electrical station, should be on the lookout for anyone who may be spray painting graffiti and report the activity immediately to the police. Graffiti is one of the quickest ways to lower home values in a neighborhood.

Diamond Oaks (second incident above). In the middle of the night someone (or group) removed all four wheels from the vehicle, leaving it lodged on the bricks removed from a neighbor's yard. In 2008 we had a similiar incident along Bending Oaks. Last week a local TV station did a report about this type crime; it's been occurring throughout North Texas. The manager at the Auto Zone store at Shiloh and Beltline suggests a relatively inexpensive way called "wheel locks" to help prevent this type of crime. Wheel locks are similar to lug nuts and can be easily installed. A set of wheel locks generally costs between \$10 and \$20 and are specific to the type of vehicle and the year it was manufactured. Auto Zone advised that you simply need to come in, provide the information needed and they will assist you in matching the wheel lock with your vehicle. They actually have some in color! If you have fancy or special wheels on your vehicle, the best option to prevent theft is parking your vehicle in the garage, the next best option is getting a set of wheel locks to protect your investment.

Brothers. That sign is located on a gate to the 140 acres of Chambers Brothers property that used to be used to mine gravel along with a few other enterprises inside the fence. Recently, they have been letting companies dump fill dirt in the many large holes on that property, but from what I've been told, it may take a long time to get that property level again. Eventually, it will be sold, but it may be a while before that property is in a condition to make it marketable.

The Scofflaw Program is a rarely used collection tool which blocks vehicle registration at county offices for offenders who have outstanding fines (e.g., traffic tickets) with the city. Garland was recently selected by County Commissioner Mike Cantrell to be the first city in north Texas to pilot this program. Once again it is good to see Garland being a leader in law enforcement, plus the city can certainly use the extra money generated by this program.

About 3 months ago I spoke at an Oakridge Neighborhood Association quarterly meeting regarding a proposed change in the Garland ordinance about where green trash bins can be stored for those individuals who have front pick up. Currently, for a typical Lshaped house with a front garage, they can be placed on the concrete driveway in front of the front-facing portion of the home. I took a survey of the ONA residents at the meeting, and by a vote of 35-3, residents were in favor of a change which would require the trash bins to go behind or at least to the side of the house (i.e., no longer sitting in the drive way in plain view of the front street). After much debate, and I mean MUCH debate, we decided at the June 15 work session to change the ordinance. Essentially the new ordinance (which may have passed by the time this article is being read) says for front pick up houses, the green trash bin must be placed (1) out of view, or (2) to the side of the house. The Garland City Press will run a little article plus diagram to explain this change.

I have not witness any evictions in District 7, but I'm sure some have occurred. Often when this happens, the persons being evicted from a home will have their possessions put on the front lawn by the home's owner. All this is done while the constable watches the process. Such an occurrence is not only stressful to the person being evicted, but also to neighbors who see clothes, furniture, etc. strewn over the front yard of a nearby home. The Council recently met with Constable Mike Gothard, and we worked out a procedure where the home's owner can call the City of Garland to have a container placed on the street. Then items taken from the home will be placed in the container. If not claimed by the owner, these possessions will be hauled off by the City. .

On June 20, I attended the Garland Neighborhood Management Academy graduation ceremony at the Central Library as District 7's Ruth LeGrow, with the Brentwood Village HOA, was one of the graduates. GNMA is a series of educational classes conducted by the City of Garland on a variety of topics important to neighborhood vitality. The GNMA exists to provide neighborhood residents with the tools to actively engage in the municipal government process and to manage neighborhood growth and change. The program is an important educational and empowerment component of the Strategy for Vital Neighborhoods by providing planning, education, management tools, and technical assistance to enable neighborhoods to reach their goals. City of Garland Information - Easy Access

The City of Garland is committed to open and transparent government functions and having a fully informed and engaged citizenry. The City utilizes many tools to give citizens ready access to news and information about the City government functions. Here are some examples:

The Garland City Press is published bi-monthly and mailed to every residential address in the city. The City Press contains news about important City Council actions, Neighborhood Vitality activities, and a wide range of City services, programs and events. It is also available on the City's website at <u>www.ci.garland.tx.us</u>. Look under the "News" tab at the top of the page and select "Garland City Press"

CGTV is the City's government access cable channel. CGTV broadcasts City Council and Plan Commission meetings live and as re-broadcasts during the weeks between meetings. Other programs feature news and information about such items as pet adoptions at the City animal shelter, energy and water conservation, crime prevention tips and much more. CGTV is available on Time Warner Cable channel 16 and Verizon FIOS-TV channel 44. CGTV is available via video streaming (live and video-on-demand) on the City's website at <u>www.ci.garland.tx.us</u>. Click on the "CGTV Video Streaming" icon on the left side of the page.

The City's website contains a wealth of information, forms, and documents related to City government functions including meet-

ing agendas, contact information for City Council and City Departments, online payment options for utilities, City taxes and City citations, and much more.

Also on the City's website, is a link to subscribe to "Garland E-News" to receive City news releases and other announcements via email. Subscription options include general news releases, notification of City Council agenda postings and much more. Look for the "Garland E-News" icon on the left side of the City's home page.

Another online option is the Citizen's Request Center. This portal contains hundreds of FAQs about almost every City department. The Request Center also offers you the opportunity to submit a new question or a request for a specific service. A log-in is required for questions and most requests. Look for the "Citizen's Request Center" icon on the left side of the City's home page.

In the case of an emergency or urgent notification, the City of Garland now has the capability to notify residents via the telephone through **CodeRED**. The system is geographical-based and allows the City to alert citizens based on their location and telephone numbers. A pre-recorded message tells a live person or an answering machine about the specific situation

and if any action is necessary. The City of Garland has added new automated severe weather warnings to its CodeRED telephone notification system. These notification calls will be launched as soon as the National Weather Service issues a severe weather warning, providing critical preparation time when severe weather threatens. Whether you have already registered for CodeRED or are registering for the first time, **you must "opt-in" for the automatic weather warnings**. To register, go to the City's website and click on the "CodeRED" icon on the left side of the home page.

Have you ever noticed brochures or flyers in your City of Garland utility bill? Those notices are reserved specifically for City government news and information such as your Recycling Schedule, Energy Conservation news, and other timely City sponsored programs.

Various City department representatives are available to speak to neighborhood and community groups or host information booths for neighborhood events. Speakers can be requested through the Citizen's Request Center or by contacting the department directly.

The City continues to explore additional means for reaching out to its citizens.
