The City Charter provides that City Council repre-them drew an opponent. I was asked why so sentatives are limited to three 2-year terms, and in May this year I will be on the ballot for my third and last term. The good news (for me) is that I will not have an opponent, and neither will Mayor Ron Jones. My colleague Darren Lathen in District 8 has opted not to run for his third term despite my best efforts to get him to run again. Jim Cahill will run unopposed for this vacated seat in District 8. Barbara Chick in District 6 will "term out" in May, and there are two individuals running for her seat on Council. In May 2010, four council members were up for re-election, and none of

many Council positions in Garland have recently run unopposed compared to many other cities in the DFW area, and I believe the answer is that in general, citizens are satisfied with the work we have been doing and our representation of their concerns. I know one former Council member opined a few months ago that we must be having "secret meetings" behind the camera because there are never any contentious or acrimonious council debates on TV (like there were when this person was on council). We are fortunate to have a strong neighborhood association in the ONA, active Citizens On Patrol led by Bill & Brenda Olive, a smart Neighborhood Patrol Officer in John Capers and proactive City Councilmen in Rick Williams. Some neighborhoods have even more crime but they just never hear about it. It is especially important to know your neighbors personally so that you can report suspicious activity.

I.D.E.A. Garland Makkah Masjid

Garland Makkah Masjid is a non-profit Islamic organization located on Buckingham Road at the site of the former Ryan's restaurant in Garland, TX. It is a Mosque and Community Center serving the Muslims of Garland, Richardson and North Dallas.

Makkah Masjid was founded in 1993 as the Islamic Directions Enhancement Association (IDEA) to provide Islamic educational, social and cultural services to the Muslim community in the

region and to promote the teachings of Islam to inquiring Muslims and non-Muslims.



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Crime Prevention & Safety by Bill Olive

A big welcome to those who recently signed up for the monthly siren and any updates and "alerts" we need to issue. The "Siren" membership now totals around 125.

The next incident was solved with an arrest by our Neighborhood Patrol Officer (NPO) Officer John Capers on March 8. However, the investigation is ongoing because the suspect is talking with police and owning up to or helping with other unsolved crimes.

An Oakridge resident was running on a treadmill in the garage when a male subject apparently rolled under the slightly open garage door and exposed himself. The complainant screamed and the suspect fled. Police were called and evidence was collected by forensics. Our NPO, a Garland detective, and several undercover police were assigned to the case. During the next few days police watched the area closely. We (Citizen's Patrol) had given our NPO prior reports of a young man following a couple of female residents over the past several of weeks and he, along with the COP had been on the lookout for this guy. After another incident on March 2nd, police stepped up their search and Officer Capers requested that COP patrollers not patrol the area so that we would not "tip off" the suspect

should he return. On March 8th around 2 pm the suspect was seen looking into the front window of the complainant's house (from the 4th) and was immediately arrested by Officer Capers. The suspect admitted to the crime of March 4 along with 3 other similar offenses (not Oakridge) as well as the March 2nd offense of entering another resident's yard. He is still being interviewed and the case is ongoing. Officer Capers did a fantastic job in catching this guy within a week's time. One of the great things about this incident is how the residents of the duplex area worked together by sharing information on the suspect. We informed homeowners the police were in the area in undercover vehicles and residents cooperated. All parties working together made the chances of this guy "getting away with it "almost impossible. Neighbors helping neighbors is the answer!

Oakridge Perimeter Walls:

There have been three of our perimeter walls damaged in the past month, two along Beltline (during the snow and ice period) and one on Buckingham last Sunday. As most of us know the homeowner is responsible for repair and in these cases vehicle owners hitting the wall have been identified and it now is up to insurance companies. This may take some time but everyone seems to be cooperating.

Representative Angie Chen Button:

Each year Texas State Representative Angie Button (district 112) meets with several groups for their input on matters ranging from economy to safety. On March 4th I was one of her invitees on the "public safety" roundtable. managers for the City have said on several occasions that this is the best council with which they have ever worked. All this just shows that if council members act professionally and cordially, issues can be resolved without all the drama and bickering that used to characterize many past councils.



Garland Power & Light has again received notice that it will receive a national award for reliability. This is the second year in a GP&L has won distinguished award. I know personally that the calls I get during power outages are invariably from Oncor customers—not GP&L.

U.S. Senator John Cornyn's office recently notified the City that the Garland Fire Department has received a Staffing For Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant award from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Federal Emergency Management Agency. The SAFER grant is in the amount of \$666,468 and the funds can be used to hire additional personnel. Staff is currently evaluating the grant conditions and requirements.

Most everyone occasionally sees a home painted in a hideous color, and I'm occasionally asked what can be done about it. About the only "solution" is to move to an area with a mandatory homeowner association that must approve paint colors. The City cannot pass an ordinance dictating acceptable color for homes. However, Garland does have an ordinance which say "a portion" of the exterior home, fence, etc. cannot be painted a different color than the remainder of the home (e.g., if an exterior siding panel is replaced, it must be painted consistently with the color of the remaining siding).

Finally, no one is happier than I about Spring finally arriving. What a fun time to go buy flowers and other annuals to spruce up the garden. Naaman Forest High School is having their annual plant sale at the Special Events Center in Garland on Saturday, April 2, so I encourage you to join me and help support the sale. I know last year I bought some hard to find Copper Plants from these students.

When all was finished at the San Diego Intercollegiate golf tournament Tuesday March 15th, the UT Arlington Mavericks golf team returned home with the individual medalist honor and the honor of being co-champion of the tournament.

Former Oakridge resident **Paul McConnell** (son of Dean and Donna McConnel on Ridge Oak Drive) and current UT Arlington Maverick carded a two-under 70 to take care of the individual medalist competition. The sophomore won his first collegiate tournament as he finished at two-under par 214 to edge SMU's Kelly Kraft by a stroke.

The Mavericks entered Tuesday's final round just three shots off the lead held by SMU and still trailed the Mustangs by that same margin with three holes remaining.

UTA was also to close that gap as the team finished with three players in the top seven and was able to return home with a share of the title, their second in their last three tournaments after winning the Lone Star Invitational in their last tournament of the fall.

Tournament winner McConnell and Wes Worster helped fuel the Mavs comeback as each had two birdies over the final three holes.

"We played well today and kept fighting to the end to force that tie," UTA head coach <u>Jay Rees</u>, who captured his 11th team title, said. "I was proud of the way they guys hung in there at the end. They knew the tournament was on the line and they kept grinding it out to earn a share of first. I thought we would play well because we had some great practice rounds."

In the process of winning the tournament, the Mavericks defeated two of the top 20 teams in the nation in No. 6 San Diego State and No. 19 San Diego. The sixth-ranked Aztecs are the highest ranked team a Jay Rees-led team has defeated.

McConnell registered five birdies on his round, which were offset by three bogeys. He finished the tournament playing all three rounds at par or better.

Worster carded a one-under 71 Tuesday and finished in a tie for third. The senior had an eagle on the par-5 14th and also added four birdies. Only a double bogey on the final hole kept him for tying his teammate for individual medalist honors.

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May and June beetles emerging soon, possibly along with Grubs

During the months of April and May, we begin to see the adult May and June beetles (Phyllophaga Non-Chemical Control Options: spp.) flying around lights or onto window screens, most commonly at night. The female May beetle will usually deposit eggs into the turf in April-May; where as the June beetle will usually deposit eggs in May-June. The eggs will hatch into grub worms that are creamy white in color with brown heads and are "c-shaped." The grubs feed on dead organic matter and then move to the roots of plants. Since the grubs feed on roots, they can injure roots of grasses and other plants. This causes infested grass to brown and easily removed in large clumps.

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Before treating for grub worms, lawns should be inspected to determine the presence of an infestation, which is more than 5 grubs within a square foot. In order to inspect an area, soil sections that are 3 to 4 inches deep should be taken randomly to total one square foot. One square foot of turf can be sampled by removing four, 6 inch square pieces of turf or ten, 4 inch cup cutter core samples. The optimal time for inspection and treatment should be 5-6 weeks after the most beetles are seen. This will ensure that smaller grub worms that are less than ½ inches will be found in the turf.

Some Control Options:

Maintain healthy turf by fertilizing and watering properly.

Parasitic nematodes in the genera Steinernema and Heterorhabtitis have been shown to be effective against white grubs. They can be purchased and applied to infested areas.

Chemical Control Options:

Irrigating the soil with 1/4 -1/2 inches of water prior to treatment can improve the effectiveness of the insecticides, since the grubs will move closer to the soil surface.

Imidacloprid, halofenozide, thiamethoxam, and clothianidin are some active ingredients found within insecticides that are often applied before extensive grub worm damage is seen, since they are effective on smaller grubs. Lambdacyhalothrin and trichlorfon are some active ingredients within insecticides that are used when larger grub worms are present.
