# City Council by Rick Williams

In past articles I have written well-deserved kudos about city employees including City Secretary Mary Kayser. She is currently President of the Texas Municipal Clerks Association and earlier this year received the award for municipal clerk of the year in the State of Texas. Unfortunately, when someone is that talented, the word gets out and she has now been hired as the City Secretary for the City of Fort Worth. The City Secretary job is one of six positions that are hired by and report to the City Council, so we will likely be interviewing replacement candidates in the near future. We will really miss Mary!

The highly anticipated 9.9 mile President George Bush Turnpike (i.e., State Hwy 190) eastern extension is on track to open in December, giving motorists a smooth drive from northwest Garland to Interstate 30. I anticipated some sort of ceremony or ribbon cutting, but it will just be a "soft"

opening." By the time you read this, it likely will be open. Thus, for us in District 7, it will be a short trip to shop at Bass Pro or eat at the restaurants overlooking Lake Ray Hubbard. Although the corridor will be open to traffic, motorists will continue to see minor construction activity through the first part of 2012 as final touches are made to the corridor's infrastructure.

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

Here are a few tidbits from that briefing. Health tested 2,371 mosquitos and found none positive for West Nile Virus nor were there any human WNV cases. Streams around Garland are also tested, and 96% were found to be pollution free. Animal Services had another busy year including receiving 8,543 calls about stray animals, of which, 7,255 were apprehended. The animal shelter took in 2,666 animals from owners who simply relinquished them for various reasons such as cost to keep, moving, etc. Very sad.

Code Compliance inspects proactively each Garland neighborhood 3 times each year in addition, of course, to responding to individual complaints. Response time for a complaint is now about 5 hours. The City uses a private contractor to abate violations like high grass, fence in need of repair, refuse in driveway, etc. That contractor did 2,378 abatement actions last year, and each resident is charged for these services. Under the city's ISIGN program, illegal signs in the public right-ofway can be turned in for 50 cents each. Last year, 11,920 such signs were turned in (I suspect 10% of these were ones I picked up), and just imagine how trashy the city would look if these signs had not been picked up!

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# Crime and Safety Report By Bill Olive

On December 12 the Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association had its Christmas dinner and our guest, Chief Bates, updated us on the ongoing news of the Garland Police Department. Here are a few points the chief shared with us.

- 1) Highway 190 is now open all the way to I-30. This will make travel to and from Garland much easier and hopefully encourage more businesses to move to Garland. Unfortunately, unscrupulous people will find it faster to exit Garland. On this note, Chief Bates told us that Garland has a great relationship with all our adjoining cities and police departments to assist in capturing fleeing felons.
- 2) Next year Garland police will be switching to the Chevy Caprice police vehicle. The good old reliable Ford Crown Victoria police vehicle will no longer be made. The new Chevy will have plenty of horsepower. Also, look for the new 2012's to sport a new color scheme----black and white rather than Garland's present blue and white. There is a nationwide movement among law enforcement to go back to the traditional black and white for vehicles. It will take a few years until these changes are fully realized by attritation of older vehicles, so don't get confused if you see a new black and white alongside an older blue and white-both can still write tick-

- ets. Oh, most patrol vehicles have numbers on them denoting the year of the car and district patrolled. The first two numbers are for the year of car and the second two are for the district. Thus, squad 1114 would be a 2011 Ford Crown Victoria patrolling district 14 (Oakridge is part of this district). There are exceptions to the above for police vehicles assigned to the NPO unit, traffic unit, warrent unit, and a couple others.
- 3) This year our police department won a grant to purchase a "sky tower". You may have seen this crime fighting tool in a mall parking lot or other high traffic area. The tower has proven to be very effective in combating crime. You might think of it as Garland's "eye in the sky".
- 4) It was hoped that the police department would be getting new technology that allowed a police vehicles to actually read license plate numbers without the officer having to either type in the plate number or call dispatch. This technology has created some legal issues and Chief Bates has decided to wait before further pursuing this idea.
- 5) Garland will continue to use the 12 "red light" cameras. Although revenue collected has gone down since the start of their use, traffic accidents have also declined--which was the intended purpose of the cameras anyway.

Our quarterly Crime Watch/Citizens Patrol meeting was held on Nov. 19th with guest speaker Det. Godwin of the "sex crimes" unit. We were given some disturbing statistics about "predator" crime and child abuse. In Garland there are approximately 400 registered sex offenders. You can see these "perps" by visiting the Garland police web site and accessing the offender list. In Oakridge we only have 1 offender who is not considered much of a risk. Under state law police depts. must check on these offenders at least once a year (Garland checks 4 times by actually

visiting the offender's residence and interviewing them). All registered offenders must renew their drivers licenses yearly so that any facial or hair change can be updated. There are many more hoops an offender must jump through to stay out of jail (which is a good thing).

Detective Godwin strongly urged that parents monitor their child's internet usage and install programs that can alert them. One site he recommended is <u>Eblaster.com</u>.

We also saw some photos of actual offenders and heard about their crimes. In an effort to drive home the point that these offenders can comefrom all corners of society Det. Godwin showed us a picture of a man serving time now in Texas for child abuse. His occupation at the time he was arrested and sent to prison was that of flight steward on "Air Force Two". At the same time, we've all heard of the many arrests recently of offenders whose crimes were committed many years ago. It seems that those who "got away"

with it" for years are now being apprehended!

Next month there will be a statistical analysis of the crime rate by month comparing month by month and year by year. It appears at first glance that our crime rate has decreased in Oakridge.

We are wishing everyone a healthy, happy and prosperous New Year!

Year. People put out boxes on the curb for big screen TV's, computers, all kinds of electronics, etc and we began to see thefts rise, even though the weather was very cold and nasty. This year, lets throw these guys a curve ball..if you have large boxes, cartons, etc. to go in the trash, break it down and put it into a garbage bag or at the very least, break down the box and turn it inside out and tie it with a string so that it doesn't blow open --this way you're not advertising your great good fortune to someone who thinks the world owes him everything and he doesn't have to work for it. After all, it was your hard work that earned the money to buy the item, don't let someone steal from you.

We expect that there will be roofers still working here in Oakridge during January, so there will still be eyes watching--but, a majority of the replacement roofs have been completed already, so the number of crews will be less than they have been during December. If you have not already had your roof checked by a reputable roofing company, we suggest you do so as soon as possible since insurance companies only allow a limited number of days between the incident (Oct. 24th) and the time frame when they will no longer accept a claim. If the roofer says he found some damage and he will contact your insurance company for you - NO -you should call your insurance company yourself to ask for an adjuster to come out and check the roof. This is free, in addition to your roof, he/she will check the gutters, skylights, attic fans, junction boxes, etc. any of which could have been damaged by the hail storm on Oct. 24th. He/she will then sit down with you and explain what damage, if any that he/she found, and discuss with you your deductible, your depreciation and the bottom line, the cost of a new roof or anything else that needs to be replaced or repaired. Never sign a contract with a roofing company until your insurance adjustor has made his/her inspection and given you their full estimate of repair. Some insurance companies will actually write you a check that date for a portion of the repair, then they will follow up with you to determine when the work has been finished to your satisfaction..Note, I said, finished to your satisfaction. In a few instances, the insurance company may send an adjustor out again to check the roof and make sure the quality is what was quoted to you, frankly, most insurance companies don't bother...as our insurance company told me, making sure that you're getting what you're paying for is your responsibility.. Remember, if the new roof develops leaks or other problems it is your responsibility to deal with that roofing company to get any necessary remediation done---this is a good reason to make sure you have a local, reputable company..

As previously noted, if you have never had experience with a roofing company, check them out before committing to them. Get references, ask neighbors, check with the BBB. Drive around the neighborhood or walk around and check out how the jobs that are being done look, check for debris left in the yard, watch to see how they treat shrubbery and plants. watch to see if they pick up all nails that may have fallen from the roof. You don't want nails being picked up by your lawnmower next spring, and you certainly don't want nails in your driveway, on your sidewalk or patio or swimming pool. There are some roofing companies offering 20 year shingles, 30, 40 and 50 year. This does not mean these shingles will last for that many years--the sun, wind, rain, snow, sleet and hail here in Texas simply degrades the shingles over a period of time, so those little granules on the shingles just gradually wash off. All the squirrels and birds running around on the roofs don't help either. We didn't think we had any damage to our roof, but we noticed that our attic fan was making a humming noise for a day or so, then, there was no more humming. When the insurance adjustor came out, he discovered the attic fan had been damaged by the hail, causing the top to crush into the blades, and that burned out the motor. We probably wouldn't have known that until next spring when it didn't come on and we had the fan company come out to check it out.

We also were surprised to learn that the wooden facia (the portion of the wood that is hidden by the gutters) was rotted out and needed to be replaced before new gutters could be installed. We hired a carpenter to install new wood of a much better quality than had been there before, he also replaced some of the soffit (portion of wood that is under the overhang) now everything is nice and new, the gutters were installed a couple of days later and now, you'd never know that there was damage at all. As I drive around Oakridge I can't help but notice many people are getting new roofs, but what is truly amazing is how much just getting a new roof can upgrade the appearance of a home, and I've noticed that many residents have also done extra work in their yards to make everything look more well groomed. While none of us want to experience a hail storm, certainly not one like the Oct 24th one, we must agree that sometimes just this type of thing can "perk up" the whole neighborhood.






