There has been an empty gas station on the SW corner of Beltline and North Garland Avenue for several years. We approved that location for a 7-Eleven store during the first council meeting in July. Even though that store is "grandfathered," they will voluntarily be using SH-190 landscape/screening standards which I much appreciate.

Mosquitoes are very bad this year due to a warm winter and a rainy spring. I had a request to spray one neighborhood where they were particularly bad, but we did not spray. There was a time in Garland when we sprayed upon request, but that's no longer the policy. The City wants to be consistent to all citizens, and thus, we use a rule of at least 100 trapped mosquitoes (of a certain species known to carry West Nile virus) before spraying. Mosquito control is far more effective when they can be addressed in their larva stage still swimming around in standing water, and that's why there is so much emphasis on

making sure that standing water is drained whenever possible. Once they are flying around, we have pretty much lost the battle. The mosquito insecticide is a contact spray, and even when a neighborhood is "nuked," the results are seldom very effective since many of the mosquitoes are resting under leaves and bushes when the spray is in the air plus many other mosquitoes from outside the sprayed area can fly in. In fact, I saw a local TV piece recently that explained the City of Arlington simply doesn't spray whatsoever due to being so ineffective.

There are currently 17 Neighborhood Police Officers (NPOs) and they cover 26 police districts within the City of Garland. Chief Bates has recently decided to disband the Gang and Narcotics units, and increase the number of NPOs to 26—one for each district. Essentially, each NPO

Membership Update

Is The Water Safe To Drink?

Yes. The taste and odor is a palatability issue. No health hazards are created regardless of the taste and odor.

What Causes Taste & Odor Change?

Each summer, throughout the months of July, August, and September, lakes and other surface water supplies experience a natural event – an "algal bloom." Algal blooms are common to surface water supplies in warm weather climate states like Texas.

Conditions For An Algal Bloom To Occur In Lake Lavon?

Nutrients must be present -- such as nitrogen. phosphorous, and calcium, which are derived from decaying vegetation in the lake. Turbidity has lessened -- the turbidity or cloudiness of the lake water has cleared up, allowing the penetration of the sunlight. This occurs due to lack of rain.

Temperature increase -- the optimum temperature range of the lake water for an algal bloom is 80° - 85°. This is provided through many hot summer days.

When all conditions are met, photosynthesis will take place and the algae will grow or proliferate. Algal species, such as anabaena secrete an "oily" substance from their cells that causes an odor in the water supply.

will deal with gang and narcotic issues within their district. NPOs have long been very popular with Garland citizens and have been very effective in dealing with local crime issues that are of concern to citizens.

Someone knocks on your door offering a free air leakage test and free weather stripping and insulation if needed. The person does not have a solicitation permit from the City of Garland. If you are like me, this is a red flag for some sort of scam. Well, maybe! Oncor has just such a program www.takealoadofftexas.org, and since service thanked this land to our attention. from the City of Garland is not needed.

If you've been watching the news lately, you've seen San Bernadido and Stockton, CA. filing for bankruptcy and Scranton, PA. paying all employees minimum wage because they are simply out of money. The general explanation for these dire financial situations is the economy and mismanagement. It always makes me thankful for Garland's management.

Garland Police stepped up their DWI patrols from June 30th through July 8th in an effort to keep Garland citizens and visitors safe during the Independence Day activities. The additional enforcement resulted in 14 DWI arrests and 3 DUI-minor arrests. There was a single car fatality

wreck reported during the same time period, and it is believed that the driver had been drinking.

I frequently receive calls/emails regarding utility bill "errors," and in 99.5% of the time, there is no error. However, I had one of those 0.5% calls from a lady whose rent house in District 7 had no water usage in months Dec – March. Water use in those 4 months is how the sewer bill is calculated for the remainder of the year. Turns out the City's computer was not programmed correctly to handle zero water usage situations, so this lady was issued a \$27.43 credit and the City manually recalculated about 200 similar cases. Customer service thanked this lady for bringing this billing glitch to our attention.

Garland recently issued a press release whereby citizens are being contacted saying President Obama will pay their utility bill, and all they need is your Social Security number and bank routing number. Hard to believe anyone would provide such information, and I contacted Garland customer service to see if anyone had been taken by this scam. The answer was "no," which was a relief. Surely by now, everyone knows better than to give their SSN and bank routing number.

Is The Water Safe To Drink?

Aquatic fungi, actinomycetes, grow on dead and decaying algae and cause an earthy taste in the water. **Steps The District Takes To Control The Taste & Odor?**

North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) utilizes several steps to control the taste and odor produced by the algal blooms. Laboratory personnel, through daily analysis, perform algal counts and can determine the onset of an algal bloom. With the onset of an algal bloom, additional chemicals are added to the treatment process.

Potassium permanganate is added as an oxidizing agent in reducing the odor levels. To reduce the unpleasant taste, activated carbon is used as an absorption media. Each of these chemicals is removed during the treatment process prior to delivery of the potable water supply. Chlorine, which is used as the disinfectant in the treatment process, also aids in odor reduction.

The water is safe to drink with no health hazards created regardless of taste and odor.

Crime and Safety Report By Brenda Olive

This month's report looks pretty good; perhaps the rain, mosquitoes and heat have worked against criminal activity. Between June 6 and July 14 we only had 2 incidents reflected on the police reports.

6/28/12 3000 block of Oak Point, Theft of motor vehicle accessories

7/06/12 2800 block of Stoneridge, Criminal Mischief greater than \$50

Please bear in mind, just because activity slowed down this month, it doesn't mean that they won't be back. There are always criminals looking for that perfect opportunity---so don't give them opportunities—remove valuables from your vehicle, lock your vehicle, always utilize your security system both on your vehicle and your home—be safe, not sorry, the time and effort spent completing police reports, insurance claim forms, etc. plus the feeling of being violated—is a terrible price to pay for failing to use good judgment.

A serious criminal warning to all residents:

We just received notification from State Senator Carona and the City of Garland Utilities regarding a nationwide scam being perpetrated against utility customers. In this instance, customers have been contacted by email, U.S. mail, fliers, social media, phone calls, text messages and door-todoor solicitation with claims that President Obama or some other governmental agency (i.e.: the City of Garland) will help them pay their utility bills by providing credits or making payments. To" receive the money for the bill payment" the scammers ask customers' to provide their social security and bank routing numbers. At that point, the scammers provide the customer with a phony bank routing number that will purportedly pay their utility bill. The consumer is still responsible for paying the utility bill, so it is important that you are aware of this scam and pay attention to your utility bill, and/or other mail that may come in your mailbox. If you notice mail is missing or not received, be on the alert, while there have been

no indications of actual mail theft—door-to-door solicitations can provide an excellent cover for mail theft.

Obviously, there is no such payment program and customers will believe their utility bills have been paid when in fact they have not and will not be paid. Instead, personal information belonging to the customer will have been stolen. Bank accounts can be totally wiped out, and credit cards or other credit lines can be opened using the stolen Social Security numbers.

To avoid being a victim, never provide your social security number, credit card number, banking information or other personal information to anyone requesting it over the phone or at your home (door-to-door solicitors) unless you are the individual who initiated the contact and are very confident with whom you are speaking.

If you are a victim of this scam and live in Garland, contact the City of Garland Customer Service Department at 972-205-2671 to notify them of the situation and to verify the status of your utility account. You should also contact Garland Police at 972-205-2018 to report identity theft.

A serious Health warning to all residents:

Mosquitoes containing the West Nile Virus were found in Oakridge recently and the City sprayed our area on July 9th. We do not know just how long this spraying will last, especially in light of the fact that we have had some interim rain and most of our residents are watering their lawns and other plants. There were at least 15 locations found in Garland, and one of those was located near the Stoneridge/Big Oaks/Diamond Oaks intersection. West Nile Virus is spread from mosquito bites to humans and is a very serious disease. At least 2 Dallas County residents have already died because of this disease during the past month. We've had no reported cases in Garland, but you are urged to take precautions against mosquito bites.

- Limit outdoor activity near dawn and dusk—joggers, bicyclists, runners, dog walkers should take extra precaution.
- •Wear long pants and long sleeve, loose-fitting shirts if you must be outdoors during peak mosquito timeframes.
- •Use a repellent spray or oil on any exposed skin. Be sure the active ingredient is DEET. Always use these repellents and insecticides per the label directions and avoid getting any into your eyes. Remember: Mosquitoes also carry heart worm to animals—protect your dog (s) and cat(s). If you have small children or grandchildren, review the label on your repellent or spray, be certain it is safe for children under 12.
- •Check your door and window screens to ensure that they are in good condition and fit tightly—mosquitoes only need a small opening to enter your home.
- Be diligent about monitoring your yard, look for anything that can hold a small amount of water mosquitoes only need a thimble full or less to lay eggs and hatch thousands of offspring. Check the saucers of your flower pots; make sure the water in your bird baths is freshened daily. You can buy tablets at Home Depot and Lowe's to drop into bird baths, small ponds, etc. to kill the larvae. Clean your gutters—to remove debris that can block good drainage. Dog water bowls or other small containers should be washed and refilled at least once per day. If you have a wading pool, drain it, wash it and refill it frequently. When you run your sprinklers, check later that day for anything that is holding water, dump it immediately.
- •Call the Health Department at 972-205-3460 if you are aware of a neglected swimming pool or areas that contain stagnant water bodies.

Some other things around Oakridge:

Recently we've received several calls about "lost

keys"—in one instance a resident found a set of keys lying in his yard, apparently they had been either tossed from the street to the yard or tossed from the golf course to the yard. Fortunately, our Neighborhood Police Officer was able to locate the owner and return those keys. In another instance individuals were walking on the course and lost a set of car keys. Those keys have not been recovered and the owner was forced to have the dealership create a new key system. In yet another instance, someone was riding a bike on the golf course, and lost keys, possibly along several different areas since the key chain broke and the keys were falling off along the way. Some of those keys have been recovered, but others are still missing. Your house keys, car keys, office keys, locker keys, etc. are all valuable items and when lost or stolen any of them can present a major headache. A suggestion--have one house key made up and put it on a long chain that you can wear around your neck when you're out walking, biking, running or dog walking. Don't carry the entire set of keys with you when you go out for exercise or dog walking. You never know who might find those keys or what they may do with them.

We are noticing that more and more residents are allowing their dogs to run "off leash". This is against City Ordinance and could result in a fine against the dog owner. It also presents a possible danger to other residents or the animals of other residents: unfortunately, no matter how well trained a dog may be, when another dog enters his/her territory or his/her owners space that dog may feel threatened and attack, or it may become scared and dash out in front of a car. Be a good neighbor, keep your dog on a lease, and always, always, carry a litter bag when you're on a walk with your beloved pet.

♦Set your thermostat up higher—every degree of extra cooling will increase energy usage 6-8%



Five Easy Projects to Cut Energy Expenditures

Handicap Parking Enforcement Enhanced in Garland Through New Volunteer Program



The Garland Police Department has created a handicap enforcement volunteer program to ensure individuals whose needs require accessible parking spaces have spaces available.

Twelve volunteers who have completed a required training course will begin issuing parking citations for handicap parking violations. Volunteers must complete the Garland Citizen's Police Academy and meet both state and departmental requirements.

Volunteers use their personal vehicles with magnetic signs that note their special assignment by the Garland Police Department. The volunteers are not sworn police officers and have no other enforcement authority beyond that of any resident, except for issuing handicap parking violation citations.

First-time handicap parking violations are punishable by a fine of no less than \$500 or more than \$750.


- ♦Use ceiling and portable fans to circulate the cool air.
- ♦Install solar window screens to block some of the sun. If you're planting new trees or plants, plant them on the south and west sides of your home to help block the heat during the summer.
- ♦Keep your blinds and drapes closed during the day to block the sun and heat. (This also is a good deterrent against criminal's prying eyes).
- ♦If possible, shade your outside a/c unit.
- ♦Cook, wash dishes, do laundry or other heat producing chores early in the morning or late evening hours.
