City Council by Rick Williams

August and September is always "budget time" on the city council, and we hear from various departments regarding their planned operating budget for fiscal year (FY) 2013. I always learn a few tidbit of information during these briefings which I find of interest, and I'll pass some of those on in this article.

Garland has been piloting and now is ready for city-wide implementation of E-billing. The E-bill system allows you to receive your monthly utility bill from the City of Garland by email which (1) saves the City the cost of a stamp, and (2) guarantees your bill will not be lost by USPS. Expect more information on this during forthcoming bill stuffers, *The Garland City Press*, etc., but if you want to get started now, go to www.garlandutilities.org and click the purple box

labeled "E-Bill."

If you have been reading my articles for the last 5+ years, you've heard me sound the alarm about the forthcoming increases in the cost of water that the City buys from the North Texas Municipal Water District. At briefing in late August, it was explained that 9 years from now, the cost should be about double what it is right now. For FY 13, we will continue with our tiered water rates: Up to 3000 gallons: \$3.02 per one hundred gallons (OHG), 3000 to 15,000 gallons: \$3,97/ OHG, and 15,000+ gallons: \$6.14/OHG. I also found interesting a break down on the percentage of residential users in each of these three tiers: Up to 3000 gal (19%), 3000 to 15,000 (50%), and 15,000+ (21%). Since I fall in the 21% category, my water bill has exceeded my electric bill the last 2 months. The water department does public education on water conservation, but as I commented at the meeting, water

conservation will be driven much more by the price of water than altruistic water resource stewardship.

Environmental Waste Service (EWS) reported that even though single stream recycling has been in effect for only 2 months (including 8200 homes that received large blue recycle containers), the tonnage of recycled material has already increased by 14.22% which is a bigger increase than what was prognosticated at this early date. I asked what would happen to the blue containers if they are not being used for recycling. Basically, we are going to give all the households that received the blue containers about 6 months to begin recycling, and if not participating, we'll simply take them back. They cost \$53.00 each. EWS received three State/local awards last year, and they were well deserved.

Despite many management innovations and course improvements, the Firewheel Golf Course (63 holes) lost \$360,000 this fiscal year, yet this golf course is one of the smartest investments this city ever made. The course attracted upscale homes which annually pay about \$4.5 million in property taxes, and had not those homes been in place when we were trying to bring a mall to Garland, Firewheel Town Center would have never been built.

With a lot of new council members, we are starting to discuss issues previously dispatched by the past Council. One such past decision being revisited is banning cell phones in school zones. Garland is one of the few local cities that does not, and there are some good reasons for that decision. It's complicated issue too long to discuss here, but if you'd like to hear all the arguments, the video replay of the recent work session discussion is on Garland's web site or you can send me an email, and I'll send you the link to the discussion. The final decision has not been made yet.

NPOs Capers and Rumatz brought new NPO Tommy Barnes to my home recently as I had not

met him. I was very impressed by Officer Barnes, and I'm confident he'll do a fine job in his assigned area essentially south of Apollo and west of North Garland Avenue.

The 2012 Neighborhood Summit, 10th anniversary, will be held on October 27, 8:00AM to 2:00PM, at the Curtis Culwell Center (formerly special events center), 4999 Naaman Forest Blvd, Garland 75040. Several years ago, the Building Inspection department took over responsibility for "code violations" on commercial properties such as high grass, 18-wheelers parking on parking lots overnight, trash, etc. Previously, the Code Compliance Dept. handled such complaints in addition to residential property violations. I have told many individuals and neighborhood groups that they can report residential code violations by emailing Code at codenfc@garlandtx.gov, but Building Inspection never had a general email address to report violations on commercial property. Well, I learned at a budget briefing recently that such an address now exists, and it is buildinginspections@garlandtx.gov. Like ALL reports to Code Compliance, BI, and police via phone, letter, etc., these email reports are also 100% confidential.

As of this writing (September 20), it appears a buyer for the Oakridge Club/Course has been found. They are already seeking bids to renovate the club house, but the golf course will not likely open until July or August next year as it is too late to plant new grass for the greens this year. Anyway, there will be much more info on this in the future, but one thing is certain, when the club/course opens, it will be very, very important for Oakridge residents to support it!

Officer Tommy Barnes is the new Neighborhood Police Officer for District 14, which includes Oakridge. Officer John Capers will now be responsible for District 11 only, but will be nearby in the event that Officer Barnes needs his assist, or vice versa. This move accomplishes something that Chief Bates has wanted to do for quite a while—have one NPO for each of the 26 districts in Garland. This will allow each officer the opportunity to "get to know" their respective areas in a more one on one way, harking back to the days of beat officers. We will miss Officer Capers but we're also looking forward to working with Officer Barnes.

This newsletter will reach you after the fact; however, by way of explanation, the parade, etc. that the COP was planning for the National Night Out was cancelled due to concerns about West Nile Virus after we learned there were apparently at least 2 cases in Oakridge. The COP hopes we can plan something for the neighborhood once when we don't have to be concerned about the safety and welfare of our residents. A few years ago, the National Town Watch group who sponsors the National Night Out agreed to allow Texas, Florida and Arizona to change their events from August to October to avoid the heat, unfortunately, they could not foresee the outbreak of West Nile Virus, not only around the country, but more importantly, here in Dallas.

Although you may not see mosquitoes, they're obviously out there and we simply did not want to put anyone in peril. The city did re-spray by truck,

on Sept. 19th, but this only kills mosquitoes which are flying or exposed to the spray. Please, take a few minutes, spray yourself down with a repellant containing **Deet**®, and take a walk around your home to make sure that anything that can hold even a miniscule amount of water is dumped, covered or otherwise protected. When you water your plants or your lawn it raises the possibility of mosquitoes hatching. We'll probably have to wait for a hard freeze to ensure the elimination of these pesky insects.

A large swarm of Africanized Bees was recently discovered on the golf course—I was advised that there were over 30,000 of them, but fortunately, they were located and subsequently exterminated. For anyone who doesn't know, Africanized Bees are also known as "killer bees". These bees were first found in the U.S. in October, 1990 in Hidalgo, Texas. Now they've spread to over 100 Texas counties. Africanized bees are easily agitated by vibrations, noises or movement. Unlike our native honey bees, they generally don't sting as individuals, instead, the entire hive or swarm will attack anything or anyone nearby. Simple things like a lawnmower, barking dog, or loud music can set them off. Although there is a slight size difference and color variation usually, it is virtually impossible for a lay person to know the difference between a regular honey bee and an Africanized one, so if you see a swarm of bees it is best to avoid them and call a professional bee keeper right away. Another problem with these bees is that they are known to invade native hives and mate, creating more easily agitated honey bees. We need honey bees to help pollinate crops and flowering plants, but we should all be aware that if you see a swarm of bees, hanging on a tree, in a bush or eve of a house---step away and call an expert.

Finally, some good news—we have a potential buyer for the club—hopefully by the time you read this, it will be fait accompli!

Holiday Decorating

Rope Lights -

Light Clips -





Utility Customers May be Targeted By Nationwide Billing Scam

City of Garland utility customers are warned about a nationwide utility bill payment scam that can result in identity theft and unpaid utility bills.

Details about the Scam

Nationwide, customers have been contacted by email, U.S. mail, fliers, social media, phone calls, text messages and door-to-door solicitation with claims that President Obama or some other governmental agency will help them pay their utility bills by providing credits or making payments.

To receive the money for the bill payment, scammers claim they need customers' social security and bank routing numbers. In return, customers are provided a phony bank routing number that will supposedly pay their utility bills.

Since there is no such governmental bill payment program, there is no money for payments, customers will believe they paid their utility bills when in fact they have not, and personal information will have been stolen.

How to Avoid the Scam

Never provide your social security number, credit card number, banking information or other personal information to anyone requesting it over the phone or at your home unless you initiated the contact and feel confident with whom you are speaking.

Victims of the Scam

If you are a victim of the scam and live in Garland, contact the City of Garland Customer Service Department at 972-205-2671 to notify them of the situation and check on your utility account status. Also contact Garland Police at 972-205-2018 to report the identity theft.
