Scatter Shooting with Mike Rose

As my wife and I have been walking in our community, we try and **wave** to all passing walkers and drivers as they cross our path. **To wave** - "an instance of moving the hand or arm as a signal or greeting". As you have read in earlier issues of this newsletter, your Board has gotten a handle on the cost to produce and distribute this communication device. Yes the weather has played its part in causing these entrances to deteriorate but they must not continue to look the way they presently appear. Funding not keeping pace with street deterioration by Bryan Bradford Assistant City Manager

On November 5, 2013, Garland voters will have the opportunity to vote "yes" or "no" for a referendum that would increase the property tax rate by 2 cents with those funds being used exclusively for street refurbishments. The impact of the 2 cent increase for a home valued at \$100,000 would be \$1.53 a month (\$18.40 a year). For seniors, the increase would amount to 68 cents a month (\$8.20 a year).

The City invests a significant amount of funds each year in repairing and replacing streets and alleys. When the amount of deterioration exceeds the investment in maintenance, however, the overall condition of the roadway network begins to decline. Over the past five years, the equivalent dollar amount of deterioration has exceeded repair and construction expenditures by an average of \$4.5 million a year. At the current rate of deterioration verses spending, roadway conditions can be expected to get worse over time.

District 7 City Council Scott LeMay

Council Updates- At our first meeting in September we approved the 2013-2014 budget as scheduled. At our September 3rd meeting we did approve the zoning change request for the Merriwood Ranch property by a vote of 5 to 4. The property will be redeveloped with approximately 40 single family lots. I voted against the change in zoning due to the flood plain concerns around the property as well as some ongoing erosion issues along that section of Spring Creek. The developer is committed to making the project work. Another ongoing concern has been the traffic and parking issues associated with the new charter school. I and the city staff including GPD are continuing to work with them to resolve these issues.

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
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Treasurers Report by Dave Morgan CPA

Since the title calls for it, let's start with the good news first. We've had 21 new members and 300 renewing members join the Oakridge Neighborhood Association for the 2013-2014 year. We would like to welcome all the new members to the ONA and thank the renewing members for their continued support! Moving on to the bad news, our current membership stands at only 321. That means 161 members from the prior year have yet to renew. Now here's the ugly part. There are 1163 homes in Oakridge. That means only 28% of those residences are members. It gets worse. If we do not have an increase in membership, there will need to be some tough decisions made with regard to services the ONA provides. These services affect the aesthetic quality of our neighborhood such as lawn maintenance, landscaping, watering, and electrical service for the common areas and entrances.

Please help us to understand why the 161 members from last year have not joined. Since the newsletter is funded entirely by the advertisers, it has to go to every Oakridge home. Therefore, we were wondering if prior members think they paid since they are getting a newsletter. This is a plea for everyone to verify they paid and to urge your neighbors to become a member. We are considering other reminder methods but they all cost money which takes away from our intended purpose. Please be proactive and help us help you. Environmental Update by Don Pattie


Summer in Garland Texas is supposed to be over in September but the weather in Texas rarely does what it's supposed to and this year is no exception. What that means for the ONA is another \$600 water bill. The severe heat coupled with watering restricted to one day a week has made it necessary to run the sprinklers 3 times on watering day. This just keeps the grass and plants from burning up until the next watering day.

We would really like to redo the entrance planting beds with more heat resistant and less water demanding plants but unfortunately we simply do not have the funds to do this. With less than half of the people in Oakridge contributing to the ONA it's a challenge. A big THANK YOU to those who think that the voluntary sixty dollars a year ONA dues is a small price to pay for keeping Oakridge the greatest neighborhood in Garland to live in.

The City maintains a Payement Condition Index (PCI) for each street and alley segment in the city. The PCI is essentially a measure of the percent of the street without failures. Garland's current average PCI is 89 for streets and 83 for alleys. Any street or alley with a PCI below 70 is considered to be deteriorated beyond the point for isolated repairs and instead must be completely rebuilt.



It is important to note that the deferral of roadway refurbishment comes with a high cost. When maintenance is not performed in a timely manner, infrastructure deteriorates quicker and can reach a point where the only feasible method of repair is to completely rebuild the street at significant costs.

Garland has faced challenges the past few years related to sustainable street funding. The largest source of funds for maintenance has historically been the City's tax supported General Fund. The lack of growth in General Fund revenues has made it difficult for infrastructure funding to keep pace with inflation and purchasing power.

The Garland community will be able to voice their wishes regarding addressing this need on the November 5, 2013 ballet. Early voting runs from October 21st – November 1st at the Richland College – Garland Campus. Monitor the City of Garland website at GarlandTx.gov for additional information.

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Golf Course Revival by Mike Ussery

Sprigged fairways areas are growing in nicely and are being supplemented with additional sodding in some areas. The greens which were sodded around September 1 are doing great and should provide nice putting surfaces when the course reopens. A major project is almost complete to remove dead trees and to trim canopies on many others. Some trees have been trimmed up to allow cart traffic underneath them, while others have been thinned to facilitate sunlight to greens and other turf areas. Tee boxes will soon be overseeded with a perennial rye grass blend to enhance playing surfaces through the winter.

The irrigation system continues to be the biggest challenge as we deal with a steady dose of leaks, valve failures and replacement of irrigation heads. There is steady progress in getting the irrigation system to the point where it is fully reliable and that work will continue through the winter once the early fall Bermuda grass growing season stops.

Work on the clubhouse is nearing completion to prepare it for reopening. The golf pro shop, bathrooms and casual grill areas will be in operation initially. Efforts continue to

identify a group interested in leasing the large kitchen and banquet space portion of the clubhouse. Those areas are not being renovated at this time. The entrance to the clubhouse will on the side of the building, near the pro shop.

Most golf course maintenance equipment is already in use with a few items yet to come and our golf cart fleet will be delivered in mid-October. We expect to have the golf course open for play the last week of October. General Manager and PGA Head Golf Professional, James Roberts, is on site daily overseeing operations and readying things for reopening. James is also fielding inquiries from individuals who may be seeking employment opportunities at the new Duck Creek Golf Club.
