Wyrick Farm to be Developed as Single Family Homes South of Buckingham Road

The bulldozers have begun to clear the way for Garland's newest single family home development named Riverset at the southwest corner of W. Buckingham Road and N. Shiloh Road.

The 101 acre site, formerly know as the Wyrick Farm, will be developed in two phases into 590 lots. Phase 1, generally on the northern half of the property, will consist of 93 two story townhomes, 70 villa homes, 58 garden homes and 65 manor homes. Phase 2 will consist of 177 twostory townhomes, 44 villa homes, and 83 garden homes. Approximately 16.5 acres will be dedicated to open space.


The Detail Site Plan calls for trails and sidewalks throughout the development for pedestrian access and street trees along interior streets to promote traffic calming and lower summer temperatures over sidewalks.

A detailed Pattern Book establishes standards for architectural styles and details including house design, construction materials, fencing and landscaping.

"Our vision for the Wyrick Farm was to establish a quality master-planned, multi-phased and multi-product, residential community with a strong sense of place consisting of a diverse collection of detached and attached homes with walkable distance to open space," Chas Fitzgerald of Wilbow Corporation said at the October 2 City Council Meeting.

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
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Daytimers Visit George W. Bush Presidential Library
