

Neighborhood Update

Hello Oakridge. Each May we see some changing of the guard in the ranks of the resident volunteers that serve the ONA as Officers and District Directors. This year we welcome quite a few new faces as well as renewing terms for several veterans with years of service. As one of the incoming residents, I am proud to serve our great neighborhood as President of the Association. I'm energized by a number of recent conversations over shared ambitions for the coming year.

First things first – I want to thank the loyal ONA membership for your support as we continue to work hard to keep the landscaping beautiful, along with keeping intact our eye on safety and building community. Your membership, support and participation are much appreciated.

And...we have work to do. The main challenge we intend to take on is Neighborhood Inclusion. Our Association has membership from only 25% of Oakridge households, which means that 75% of the households in the neighborhood don't belong to the ONA. While one of the upsides to voluntary membership is that those who don't want to don't have to join, I think we can do much better than 25%.

We've heard two possible sources driving the lack of participation so far:

- 1. We can do a more effective job of communicating the value proposition of the ONA.
- 2. We are not clear about that fact that we want everyone in the neighborhood involved.

Oakridge opened in the mid 80s as a premier subdivision with exclusive membership in a private Golf Course, Country Club, Tennis Courts and Swim Club. Some of the residents were lifetime members of the Country Club, many of who continue to be very supportive and active in the ONA. And...history has taken the neighborhood on a journey. Along the way the cultural fabric of the neighborhood has changed. The structure of the ONA Board, its by-laws and processes may convey to some people, to a certain extent, that the ONA is an "exclusive" association. I assure you it is not. Whereas the 80s were filled with great memories, it's time to make new memories in 2019 with a model that embraces our diverse cultures and changing demographics.

We see increasing diversity in the general membership, as indicated by the crowd at the Spring Fling – what a wonderful mix of folks. More of that please.

The challenge we'd like to highlight is that in order to have a healthy future in the neighborhood, we need some of the new neighbors to drive and lead this organization. I know you're out there! You are tempted to join, to come to a meeting, to put yourself out there. But for some reason, you don't do it.

- Are we sending out signals, quite unintentionally, that say you are not welcome?
- Are we not communicating in ways that work?
- Are we still seen as Country Club folks attempting to hang onto a bygone time?

We hope not, but if so then help us start dismantling that. We want you to help us update the ONA to reflect the current demographics. We believe that we need to change our message, how we communicate that message, and how we value having an Association of Neighbors. And we need input, fresh ideas, feedback and opinions.

This year the ONA plans to dig in, actively focusing on an "inclusive" model that makes it clear to every single person in Oakridge that you are welcome, valued, and needed! We are a diverse Association of Neighbors and with your help, we will not only grow membership but grow as neighbors and friends.

You'll hear from us going forward on this and we'll figure it out together.

Oakridge Landscaping by David Parrish, ONA Environmental Committee Director

Landscaping for our neighborhood perimeter and entrances is managed by two groups: Platinum Landscaping and ONA Environmental Committee volunteers. ONA membership dues pay for Platinum Landscaping to take care of the mowing and edging of the perimeter parkways (edges around our neighborhood). Everything else - mulch, plants, trimming, some sprinkler repairs, landscape lights, flags - is handled by the ONA Environmental Committee volunteers.

Many volunteers generously donate their time to keep the neighborhood entrances looking beautiful. We have an adopt-an-entrance approach where volunteers (or teams of volunteers) choose to take responsibility for one or more entrances and/or medians. Since the largest portion of our volunteers live on the west side of the neighborhood, most of the entrances on the west side have been or are being planted with some color plants. Whereas, on the east side we have cleaned and mulched the beds and trimmed the hedges but are not planting color this spring.

We need more volunteers - especially if you live on the East side of the neighborhood (close to Shiloh or Beltline). This is a great opportunity to connect with your neighbors and have fun! We also want to express our gratitude to those of you who have given money to support beautification of the neighborhood. During the 2018 membership year, households in Oakridge donated \$4,548 for neighborhood beautification. This year (2019), we have already received \$3,358. Thank you for your contributions!
