

Tips for Staying Safe

The Garland Police Department has several good tips to keep in mind all year long:

Lock your cars and remove valuables. Thieves are looking for easy targets and stealing guns, electronics, money, medicine and jewelry from unlocked cars.

Porch Pirates. Here are some ways to avoid becoming a victim:

- Track your deliveries online.
- See if you can have your package delivered to a remote pickup site. Amazon has several hub lockers around the city. They'll give you the code to open the box. FedEx and UPS also offer similar options.
- Instead of having that Playstation delivered to your front door, consider having it shipped to your office.
- If you must have deliveries shipped to your house, talk to your neighbor and see if they can collect the package while you're away.
- Consider getting a video doorbell. They may not always stop a Porch Pirate in their tracks, but they can help police identify them.

Report suspicious activity. If you see suspicious activity or something or somebody THAT SEEMS out of place, **CALL 911** or the non-emergency number at **972-485-4840**. Share any security camera video that might be helpful with Officer Barnes at BarnesT@garlandtx.gov.

ONA Financial Update

First of all, I want to thank the ONA for trusting me with their finances. Jane Mayers manages the ONA Membership and she keeps a separate financial summary so we have a solid system of checks-and-balances.

I keep the ONA Finances in QuickBooks and I create regular financial summaries for the ONA Board, such as the report shown below.

Category 1 is a comparison of the fiscal year-to-date compared to all of last fiscal year. You can see that we exceeded the revenue of last year by \$748.00. This was mostly due to the extra money given for beautification.

Category 2 is a list of the monthly Mandatory Operating Expenses. Notice that we paid our postage and storage through the end of the Fiscal Year (May 31st). We estimate our average utilities will be \$300 per month, but occasional leaks in our sprinkler system do affect that amount.

Category 3 shows discretionary money remaining after subtracting the mandatory recurring expenses from our current checking account balance. We have an estimated \$899 as a reserve buffer. This category also shows that we have over \$6,600 remaining in the Beautification Funds. The ONA Board is working with the environmental committee to determine how to best use that money to improve the neighborhood appearance. We have \$1,800 budgeted for special events, however, as with personal finances, it is good stewardship to take care of mandatory expenses first.

Again, thank you for trusting me with the ONA finances, and feel free to call me with any questions or concerns.
