

Be a Good Neighbor

Good Neighbors Reduce Crime. Would you be Mine?

While Mister Rogers may not have been nominated for Best Picture this award season, we feel it is worth sharing some good reminders for being neighborly.



The most effective means of reducing crime in the neighborhood is an organization of neighbors helping one another. It's a fact: concerned neighbors reduce crime. Putting into practice the time-honored "good neighbor" policy is still the single most important factor in solving problems—including crime.

Here are a few good neighbor tips:

- 1. It's always smart to get to know your neighbors. The "rule of 5" is to at least know your 2 neighbors on both sides and 3 across the street or alley. Practice small acts of kindness: smile, wave, or say "hello". Welcome new neighbors, maybe bring by a plate of cookies.
- Be aware of your neighbor's habits, such as when they are generally at work. Also notice whether they have small children or teenagers or if they are elderly and may need extra assistance from time to time. This awareness will make the neighborhood a much tighter community and everyone will be able to better prevent crime.
- 3. Get to a level where you can at least trust one of your neighbors. This is a good idea especially if you plan on being away for a few days or more. By giving a copy of your keys to a trusted neighbor, you can have them pick up your mail or just make sure everything is okay at home.
- 4. Share your contact information or at least a phone number. Create a neighborhood group text with a few

trusted neighbors so it can be readily accessible in case of an emergency. Many of our neighbors are also on NextDoor where you can private message them.

Here are some upcoming opportunities for you to get to know your neighbors:

- Join us and Officer Barnes at the ONA General Meeting, Thursday, Feb 27 at 7pm. Bring your neighbors!
- Come to your local Block Party! (Details to be provided in upcoming newsletters and on the website.)
- Participate in Crime Watch. We have members on every street in Oakridge who keep watch for suspicious activity and are contacts for us, if needed, to assist with a crime in the area. Don't Cut That Tree Down!

Thinking about cutting down that beautiful tree? Read this first!

A few weeks ago, one of our Oakridge residents was

thinking exactly that after they heard that tree roots could damage the foundation of the house (which is a very real possibility). A tree trimming firm was called. They came and looked and said they could cut it down for \$1,500. Problem solved, right? Wait! Instead of cutting the tree down, how about calling an arborist? Arborists—tree doctors—know everything about trees: planting, trimming, treating, and preserving.

The arborist came out and assessed the problem. Could the foundation be protected? Could the tree be saved? The arborist answered "yes" to both questions and suggested digging a trench between the tree and the foundation: 3 feet deep and 12 inches wide—cutting and removing the roots during the digging.

(Note: Before digging, the homeowner is responsible for calling 811 to have underground utilities flagged.)

What is the cost of digging a trench? Less than half the cost of cutting the tree down completely.

Is this method effective? Yes. Using this method will provide excellent protection for your foundation for 10-12 years. If you're still the owner of that house and that tree in 10-12 years, you MAY need to do it again.

Protect your foundation while saving a tree that will live on for generations providing shade (cooling), controlling erosion, bringing oxygen into our lungs, and adding beauty all year round.

Arborists in this area include: Texas Tree Surgeons, Preservation Tree Service, and Arborilogical Services.

ONA Beautification Funds

The appearance of the entrances and perimeter of Oakridge are important, so I want to thank those of you that gave extra money for Beautification. This year, ONA Members gave an extra \$3,160 in Beautification funds compared to last year. I want to take a moment to update you on the status of these funds. First, a quick summary of the ONA budget over the last year-and-a-half.

When I took over the ONA Treasury in July 2018, I realized that we were on track to spend more than the General Membership dues supported; therefore, I broke down the budget into Mandatory Expenses and cut all other expenses—including watering and planting. (I explained the overall financial picture last month in the January Newsletter, which you can reference for more details.) Due to the budget cuts, we finished the 2018-2019 membership year with an extra \$3,000, which we spent on tree trimming, irrigation repairs, entrance lights, and organizing the storage facility. We are on track to finish this fiscal year with a balanced budget again and still have over \$6,000 remaining in the Beautification account.

Rather than just sticking flowers in the ground, the ONA Board of Directors (BOD) feels we need a more cohesive plan to best use the money donated by ONA Members. Therefore, we are getting quotes from landscape companies. We are also generating a Standard Operating Procedure on when and where to plant seasonal color and investigating our options for getting additional Neighborhood Vitality Funds to make the common areas less expensive to maintain.

Thank you for your patience as we go through this process of due diligence and establishing a landscape plan that will work not only for this year but for the sustainable future.
