## The Cost of False Alarms

If you have a home security system, please be aware of the City of Garland's Alarm Ordinance and how false alarms are handled.

The City of Garland defines a false alarm as: "A burglar alarm notification to the Police Department that is uncorroborated by eyewitness, video, or photographic evidence and where police officer(s) respond within thirty minutes of being notified and from an inspection of the interior or exterior of the alarm site find no evidence that criminal activity occurred."

False alarm fines will be assessed starting with the fourth false alarm. (False alarms remain on file for 12 months.) Fines are as follows:

False Alarm Coun	t Charge
1 to 3	\$0
4 to 5	\$50
6 to 7	\$75
1 to 3 4 to 5 6 to 7 8 plus	\$100 & Permit Suspension

### Video Crime Watch Program

When a crime happens, it is helpful for the Garland Police Department to know which homes and business have video cameras in the area where the crime occurred. Those videos can aid the police in their investigation. The GPD has recently launched a program (Garland Video Crime Watch) that will provide them with a map of video cameras in Garland (strictly optional and for police use only—not for public access). If you have a video surveillance camera, we encourage you to go online and add your video camera(s) to the map. All surveillance cameras count, no matter how small or insignificant you think it may be. The system is strictly voluntary and cannot provide direct access to any surveillance system. If the police believe footage from your camera may be helpful, they will contact you using the contact information you provide.

In the past, the only resource the police had for video cameras in our neighborhood was the private database kept by our ONA Crime & Safety Committee. Currently that private database contains 40 Crime Watch members who have voluntarily let us know they have video cameras. This means that the GPD must go through the ONA to gain that information. We would love to have all our Oakridge residents with video cameras add their information to the Garland Video Crime Watch map—that way the GPD could access this information directly.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if Oakridge could lead the City of Garland in the number of sign-ups? As of this week, there are 4 residents participating in the Garland Video Crime Watch program. To sign up, go to the GPD website (www.garlandpolice.com/331/Police) then scroll down to the "Garland Crime Watch Video" section.

If we have enough people add their cameras to the program, we will receive a plaque to hang beneath our Crime Watch signs throughout the neighborhood, indicating we are a Video Crime Watch neighborhood. This visible statement of our level of security would be a big deterrent to criminals looking to target our neighborhood. The police have already seen a decrease in car break-ins in other neighborhoods with this program.

Sign up today and let's make it clear to criminals: Don't Mess with Oakridge!

### Remember to Breathe

When we are anxious or scared, we often forget to breathe deeply. Instead, we take shallow, quick breaths. This type of breathing tends to make us more tense, which is the opposite of what we need in moments of anxiety.

Take multiple opportunities during the day to stop and practice breathing deeply for at least 5 minutes. There are many techniques (and apps) available to encourage you to practice deep breathing. Here is one to get you started:

> Breathe in through the nose for 4 counts. Hold for 4 counts. Breathe out through the mouth for 4 counts. Hold for 4 counts. Repeat for several minutes.
