

### "Do Not Call" Registry

Most of us receive unwanted phone calls from time to time: sales calls, surveys, robocalls, scams. Here are some ways you may be able to reduce the number of unwanted calls:

- Add your number to the National Do Not Call Registry. This registry allows you to opt out of telemarketing calls, though it does not apply to calls from charities, surveys, debt collectors, or political calls. To add your phone number to the list visit <a href="https://www.donotcall.gov/">https://www.donotcall.gov/</a> or call 1-888-382-1222 from the number you want to register. To verify whether or not you have already added your phone number visit <a href="https://www.donotcall.gov/">https://www.donotcall.gov/</a>.
- Report unwanted calls. Did you know that robocalls (when a machine talks instead of a live person) that are trying to sell you something are illegal? These should be reported even if your number isn't on the National Do Not Call Registry. As for unwanted sales calls, if you are on the National Do Not Call Registry and you are still receiving unwanted sales calls, those should be reported. - Learn how to block calls on your phone. This feature comes in handy when you repeatedly receive unwanted calls from the same phone number. Call-blocking is handled differently depending on the phone you have. Phone Tip! Don't believe your caller ID. Technology makes it easy for scammers to fake caller ID information, so the name and number you see aren't always real. If someone calls asking for money or personal information, hang up. If you think the caller might be telling the truth, call back to a number you know is genuine. ### Asking the Chief

We were fortunate to attend a recent Zoom call with Garland Chief of Police Jeff Bryan where he tackled several difficult questions from the audience. We appreciated his candor and willingness to hear from the community.

Here are a few of the topics that were addressed:

- Peaceful protests: The Chief and officers marched in solidarity and sadness with protesters in Garland in response to the George Floyd killing.
- **Militarization of the police:** The Garland police believe their duty is to serve and protect our community—which is not the same mission as the military.
- **De-escalation:** Officers in GPD have extensive training and involvement in role-play simulated events. Many officers are transfers from other police forces so they are experienced. GPD has a number of proactive programs to promote positive community relations.
- Riot gear: Garland has not had riots, looting, or situations of excessive force like other cities. The riot gear and SWAT vehicle are only designed to protect police and be defensive.
- **Use of force:** GPD abandoned choke holds years ago and most officers never fire a weapon. For those resisting arrest, police have tazers and pepper spray (which cause the least amount of harm). Hardly ever is there a reason to use a club or qun.
- Community programs: Citizens Police Academy is a great program which provides great insight into all aspects of policing. A 1-day youth program is being developed. Classes will resume when it is safe. School Resource Officers, Neighborhood Police Officers, and the boxing gym are proactive ways that the Garland Police build relationships with the community.
- "Defunding" police: The Chief agrees that resources are needed to address homeless and mental health needs in the community. The infrastructure is not in place to do so. For now, GPD responds and partners with organizations who can help.
- Coronavirus: The GPD is following Dallas County and CDC guidelines to keep officers and the public safe by wearing masks and practicing social distancing where possible.




### Bulky Trash...did you know?

Are you planning to do some household remodeling? Be sure you know the rules for bulky trash.

**Small Projects.** According to the City of Garland's website, they will pick up "building, construction and remodeling materials from small household remodeling projects completed by the resident and arranged in manageable piles (allowed four times per calendar year)." Visit their website for more details (<a href="https://www.garlandtx.gov/495/">https://www.garlandtx.gov/495/</a> Accepted-Unaccepted-Materials).

Large Projects. City Code states that "construction and demolition debris generated in connection with a major renovation project" shall not be placed for collection at any property in the City. "Such items shall be removed by the building contractor, owner or occupant of the premises at their own expense." (Section 52.30(19)) Be sure to talk to your contractor about hauling away the debris or make other arrangements - such as asking the City for an open top container (<a href="http://garlandwastewizard.com/562/">http://garlandwastewizard.com/562/</a>/ Residential-Roll-Off-Services).
