



Garland Alert System

The City of Garland has changed its emergency notification system from CodeRED to the Garland Alert System. This new system allows you to select the types of alerts you wish to receive and it gives you an opportunity to provide additional information that notifies responders of unique circumstances, needs (e.g., medical conditions or physical limitations), and even emergency contact information in the event that you are incapacitated.

Be sure to register with the new system so you don't miss out on any alerts.

Holiday Safety Tips

As we enter the holiday season, keep safety in mind with these tips:



- Lock your car to help deter thieves who are looking for an easy target.
- **2. Remove valuables** from your car including holiday packages, shopping bags, guns, electronics, money, medicine, and jewelry.
- 3. Report suspicious activity. If you see suspicious activity or something (or somebody) that seems out of place, call the non-emergency number at 972-485-4840 (or call 911 for an emergency situation or a crime in progress). Remember to include details that go beyond race and gender such as behavior, vehicle description, location, time of day, hair, clothing, identifying marks, etc. Share any security camera video that might helpful with Officer Barnes at BarnesT@garlandtx.gov.
- 4. Vacation Watch Request (free for Garland residents). If you plan to be out of town, consider having Volunteers in Policing check your home while you are gone. Complete the Vacation Watch Request form online (https://www.garlandtx.gov/640/Volunteers-in-Policing).
- 5. Discourage Porch Pirates with the following:
 - Track deliveries online and quickly retrieve packages from your porch as soon as they are delivered.
 - Have packages delivered to your office building or a remote pickup site. Amazon has several hub lockers around the city. FedEx and UPS also offer similar options.
 - Ask your neighbor to collect packages from your porch when you are away from home.
 - Get a video doorbell (such as Nest or Ring). They
 may not always stop a Porch Pirate in their tracks,
 but they can help police identify them later.

Disposal of Holiday Items

There is a right way and a wrong way to dispose of holiday decorations. Keep reading to learn more.

Christmas Tree (natural) -- This item is accepted for Brush collection. Remove all tinsel, lights, decorations, tree stands, and plastic bags from Christmas trees prior to setting outside for collection.



Christmas Tree (artificial) -- If in usable condition, consider donating your artificial tree to a charitable organization to brighten up the holidays for their clients. Otherwise, this item is accepted for bulky goods collection.

Placement of Brush and Bulky Waste for Collection -- Bulky waste should be set out in separate, distinct piles from brush, bagged grass, and leaves. Brush and bagged grass and leaves should also be placed in separate, distinct piles. Brush (including grass and leaves) should NEVER be placed in your green trash cart.

Christmas Lights -- Lowe's stores offer a convenient receptacle to drop off your old holiday lights for recycling. If you do not plan to recycle them through Lowe's or another Christmas Light Recycling program, then place them in your green trash cart. Do not place Christmas lights in your blue recycle bin.

Christmas Decorations -- Put this item in your green trash cart. Please bag all garbage to prevent litter.
