Does the idea of a neighborhood plant swap (neighbors sharing different cuttings, plants, and seeds) appeal to you? Perhaps you are an




avid gardener or maybe you are looking to get started on your green thumb.

## Storm Recovery

Whenever there are natural disasters (such as the winter storms in February) it's a sure bet that scam artists will soon pop up.

If you find yourself in the position of needing a contractor, be extra diligent in doing research and asking questions. The Texas Department of Insurance (TDI) provides a list of ways you can avoid contractor scams. Tips include getting more than one bid, being aware of misleading language, and refusing to pay up front. Did you know that after a disaster, it's against the law for out-of-town contractors to ask for a down payment before they start? Check the TDI website for more information. (https://www.tdi.texas.gov/takefive/contractor-scams.html)

When it comes to financial assistance for disaster recovery, be especially wary of anyone asking for your Social Security number or other sensitive information. FEMA's website cautions everyone to beware of visits, calls or emails from people claiming to be from FEMA asking for your Social Security number, bank account or other sensitive information. Giving out this type of information can lead to identify theft. (https://www.fema.gov/fact-sheet/texas-winter-storms-dr-4586-rumor-control)

Finally, if a disaster affects the entire city (like the February winter storms), then be sure to check the city's website (<a href="https://garlandtx.gov/">https://garlandtx.gov/</a>) for legitimate sources for financial assistance, food, counseling, and other helpful resources.

## Shutting Off Your Water

I have been doing handyman work since 2009 and I typically tell my customers to purchase a water meter shut-off tool. It makes it easy to shut the water off to the whole house in case of an emergency water leak. This tool sells for less than \$20.00 and can save you a lot of money and frustration. I like this particular tool (see photo) because it also has a built-in key for opening most water meter boxes in Oakridge.

It is also essential to make sure that you can access your water meter box. Therefore, if you have a lawn service, ask them always to weed eat around your meter and verify the lid opens freely.
