## Planning a Garage Sale?

The City of Garland's Code Compliance Department offers these reminders for residents who are hosting a garage sale:

- Call Code Compliance at 972-485-6400 for a permit number. There is no fee required.
- It is illegal to erect or affix a sign in the right-of-way (the area from the curb to the sidewalk), on the median (the area in the middle of any street), on public trees public fences and/or buildings, traffic signals and street lights, street signs, or utility/ telephone poles.
- Signs must be on private property. You may have no more than 4 signs, 1 in your yard and 3 others on private property only.
- All signs must be removed by 9 p.m. on the last day of the sale.

#### **Report Suspicious Activity**

If you see suspicious activity or something (or somebody) that seems out of place, call the non-emergency number at 972-485-4840 (or call 911 for emergency or crime in progress). Remember to include details that go beyond race and gender such as behavior, vehicle description, location, time of day, hair, clothing, identifying marks, etc.

#### Slow the Roll at Oakridge Stop Signs

## Dog Care in Hot Weather

Our Texas heat can be rough on dogs. Keep these tips in mind:

- The layers of a dog's coat help protect them from overheating and sunburn. Therefore, rather than shaving your dog, stick to trimming longer fur.
- On hot days, keep in mind that dogs with flat faces (like Pugs) are more susceptible to heat stroke since they cannot pant as effectively.
- Hot pavement (especially asphalt) can burn sensitive doggy feet. Also, being close to the ground, your dog can heat up quickly when standing over hot pavement.
- Dogs that are young, elderly, overweight, have short muzzles, or have dark fur are at a higher risk for overheating.

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#### Nicholson Memorial Library

The Nicholson Memorial Libary System in Garland began as a single, 1,200-square-foot library. Over the years it grew into a system of libraries with 3 branches and 120,910 square feet of space.

The library was created as a memorial to Garland residents—Mrs. Missouri Nicholson and her son (and former Garland Mayor) S.E. Nicholson—who lost their lives to a tornado in 1927. A former bank building on the Garland Square was remodelled to house the memorial library and a community center.

The 1,200-square-foot library opened in 1933 with 2,344 books and a single volunteer who kept it open for 10-12 hours per week.

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#### Garland eAssist

Did the City forget to pick up your bulky trash? Is there a dead squirrel in the road?



Have you noticed a broken streetlight? Is there an abandoned car sitting on your street? Do you have a noise complaint?

The Garland eAssist app is a fast way to report a wide range of *non-emergency* issues. Popular service requests include parking violations, potholes, streetlights (not traffic lights), trash on private property, graffiti, deceased animal, and standing water in meter box.

Once you submit a request, you will receive email updates letting you know when the request has been received and when it has been resolved. (Emails notifications will be sent to the email address you provide when you first sign up.)



You can access eAssist online (visit <u>GarlandTX.gov</u> and click on the yellow eAssist button) or you can download the free eAssist mobile app from the Apple and Google Play Stores.

## Watering Your Landscape

The City of Garland is currently operating under the Water Conservation Plan. This means between April 1st and October 31st:

- Garland water utility customers may water twice per week using an in-ground sprinkler system.
   Customers have the flexibility to choose which day of the week to water.
- No outdoor irrigation between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. to prevent excessive evaporation.
- Watering with a hand-held hose using an automatic shutoff nozzle, soaker hose or drip irrigation is allowed at any time.

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#### Slab Leaks

What is a slab leak? A leak in the pipes under the concrete foundation of your home



Many of the homes in this area are reaching the age of when slab leaks start to appear. In fact, many Oakridge residents have already experienced slab leaks.

What are some of the signs of a slab leak? A quick search online will tell you some of the basic signs: a mildew/moldy smell, the water pressure in your house seems lower than usual, there's a spike in your water bill, your flooring has unexplained water damage, and (with hot water leaks) there may be warm spots or "hot spots" on the floor.

Who fixes slab leaks? Plumbers—though not all plumbers will fix slab leaks. Be sure to do your research and ask questions. Consider asking your neighbors, family, or friends for plumber recommendations and advice. Here is some slab leak advice\* shared by Oakridge residents on NextDoor:

If you suspect you have a leak, go to your water meter at the street. Take a picture of the meter count, note that if the flow meter or little red dial is moving. Wait 10 minutes (don't use the water) and go and check the meter again to see if there is any loss. – Mary B., Oakridge Resident

Call a reputable plumber. A licensed plumber! Look into doing a total rerouting of the damaged line by connecting a new line through your attic. Check with your insurance company to see how this will affect any coverage as well as payment for the work to be performed. - Eric S., Oakridge Resident

This [rerouting of the damaged line by connecting a new line through the attic] is was how our leak was repaired. Very happy with it. Our first clue was a warm area on the living room floor and we don't have heated floors. – Peggy S., Oakridge Resident

Expect a huge dusty mess if they have to go through the slab. Go to the hardware store and buy the multiple pack of plastic drop cloths, cover everything, put rags/plastic under the door to keep the dust down. Turn off the AC and block the return

and vent ducts. Been there done that! - Mary B., Oakridge Resident

Slab leaks sometimes occur when residents have work done on their home's foundation. One Oakridge resident strongly urges homeowners to test for leaks after foundation repairs or lifts:

You always get tested after a lift. If the home is older and/or has cast iron, odds are it will have a leak/ brake after lift. Some cities require post test. All cities should. - Keta W., Oakridge Resident

Finally, be sure to check with your insurance company to see if your insurance policy covers slab leaks. Many insurance companies will not cover slab leaks or they will only cover a portion of the cost.

## Energy Saving Tips Source: GP&L (link at end of article)

As we enter the hottest part of our summer, consider adding some energy saving tips to your daily routine. Here are a few suggestions offered by GP&L:

- Dry loads of clothes back to back to take advantage of heat built up in the dryer.
- When not using a fireplace, keep flue dampers closed. Otherwise, air conditioning and heating continuously escape.
- If using your oven for an hour or more, shut the kitchen off from the rest of your home and turn on the stove exhaust to help take heat out of the kitchen.
- Let foods cool before placing in refrigerator unless the recipe specifies otherwise. Warm food will cause your refrigerator to run more.
- Try to schedule cooking in the morning so that kitchen heat does not contribute to air conditioning use during the hotter parts of the day.
- Defrost (manual) freezers before the frost exceeds a quarter inch thick. Greater frost buildup makes the freezer work harder, running longer than necessary.
