#### Residential Lockbox Program

The Garland Police Department's residential lockbox program is designed to expedite access to senior adults in their own homes during medical or other emergencies. The lockbox program also reduces the likelihood of property damage caused by first responders forcing entry into a home in response to an emergency call.

#### **Eligibility**

The lockbox program is open to all Garland residents who either live alone or must be left alone on a regular basis and:

- Are age 65 and above
- Are under 65 with a major medical issue that could render them incapacitated or unconscious

#### **How the Program Works**

- The eligible participant will complete a Lockbox Program Application (PDF) to the Garland Police Department. Applications can be found on the Garland Police Website, picked up at the front desk of the Police Department, or by contacting our Neighborhood Police Officer (NPO), Officer Barnes, at BarnesT@garlandtx.gov.
- Once the application is approved, Officer Barnes will contact the participant at their home to review the program.
- The participant will provide a spare house key to the officer and place the key inside the lockbox and set the combination.
- The officer will determine the best location for the lockbox that allows quick access for emergency responders but is not readily visible to the typical street or pedestrian traffic.
- The lockbox will only be used during an emergency call, and when responders can't make entry without

using force. At no other time will the lockbox be used or will entry be made without authorization.

- There is no cost to participate in the Lockbox Program, other than the cost of a spare key.
- A participant may withdraw from the Lockbox Program at any time by contacting Officer Barnes. After the key is returned to the participant, the empty lockbox will be removed from the residence and returned to the Police Department.

This program is paid for and sponsored by the Garland Citizen Police Academy Alumni Association.

# City Councilman Update

In my last update, I provided an update on the proposed City Budget for FY 2021-2022. I am proud to say that after much discussion and meetings, it was passed unanimously with minimal changes at our City Council meeting on September 14.

The \$815.6 million combined budget funds all city activities including city personnel, operations, capital, electric fuel & energy purchases, water purchases and debt payments among other expenses. This year's budget is an increase of 5.4% from the previous year and does not require a tax increase largely due to the additional property tax revenues received as a result of higher home values.

During our discussions, we decided to use the remaining SafeLight funds—a program which used revenue from red light camera infractions that is no longer allowed due to State law changes—for traffic safety items including lane striping and crosswalk marking improvements. We also decided to delay increasing the fees for EMS transports until mid-year to allow for additional time for public education. Finally, we decided to fund improvements to the Garland Police Boxing Gym from the General Fund. This worthy program provides a safe after-school youth program which trains over 100 youth in boxing and 45 children in karate each day.

I am happy to say that the City Budget met this year's goals of addressing operational staffing needs, enhancing parks and recreation operational funding, and restoring employee merit/compensation increases to remain competitive in the job market. After the continued uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, I believe this year's budget is a sound financial plan for the upcoming year.

The next topic the Council will focus on is how to spend the \$53.5 million funding the City will receive from the

federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The rules set out in the act allow the funding to be used for a variety of purposes including public safety initiatives, additional bond projects that were left out of the 2019 Bond Program, new capital projects or community programs. The Council will be debating the allocation of these funds in our next several meetings so please provide me with your input on how you would like to see the funds used.

By the time you read this, one of the most popular events the City of Garland hosts will be complete. After a virtual event last year, this year's 0.5K Garland Guzzler fun run will return to the Downtown Square. This will be one of the final events to be held in the Downtown Square before construction begins on the redesigned Square passed as part of the 2019 Bond Program. Events such as Christmas in the Square will be moving to Firewheel Mall this year to accommodate the construction. Keep an eye on garlandtx.gov for future events and more information.

We continue to have a low crime rate. #### **Catalytic Converter Theft Alert**

Police around the country are currently dealing with a trend of thieves stealing and then selling catalytic converters. It only takes 30 seconds for thieves to steal one! Be on alert for suspicious activity around vehicles.

Anyone with video is asked to please email Officer Barnes at <u>BarnesT@garlandtx.gov</u>. Let's catch these guys and prevent Oakridge from being a target.

#### **Safety Reminders**

**Porch Pirates.** Continue to watch out for "Porch Pirates". Be diligent in retrieving your package deliveries. If you are unable to retrieve your package upon delivery, consider asking a neighbor to pick up your package.

Lock your Vehicles. Please lock your car and remove valuables—especially your guns and keys. If possible, put your car in the garage. Many thefts from vehicles happen when the vehicles are unlocked. Don't make yourself an easy target!

**Discourage criminal activity.** Make it a point to be a watchful, active neighbor. Take walks in the neighborhood and get to know your neighbors. Also consider adding outdoor security lights and cameras. All of these things help make our community less inviting to potential criminals.


