

City Councilman Update

This month, I would like to update you on the progress Garland Power & Light has made since the February snowpocalypse. I know the wounds are still fresh from that natural disaster, but be assured GP&L is doing what it can to



improve its operations if another disaster like that

should ever occur. However, it is important to remember that the state's power regulator ERCOT mandated that GP&L to shed load during the event, forcing GP&L to cut power to thousands of customers during the days from February 14 through 17.

At our November 15 Council Work Session, GP&L's CEO Darrell Cline and COO Tom Hancock updated us on the operational and equipment changes that have been implemented over the past nine months.

Cline stated that unfortunately the communication from GP&L and the City was inconsistent and belated during the event when trying to convey information to its customers. Cline said that GP&L received 78,000 calls during the event. He compared that to the 72,000 total customers that GP&L serves; that's more than one call per customer. Phone lines were jammed and recorded messages were not informative.

To remedy the situation, GP&L has hired additional call center representatives and will utilize a third-party call center for call overflows and after hours service. During outage events, more informative prepared messages will better notify callers of any changes and updates.

Additionally, other platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, and Nextdoor will be used to more effectively communicate to customers. I also encourage you to sign up for notifications through the Everbridge platform. This allows the GP&L to send notifications to you directly via text and email to its customers. You can sign up for the alerts at http://garlandtx.gov/3789/Garland-Alert-System.

If you had friends in other areas of Garland, you may have noticed their power may have not gone out while yours did. The reason is they may have been on a critical load feeder which serves a fire station or other critical infrastructure. Additionally some of the other feeders of the 99 total in the GP&L service area are designated as "under-frequency feeders." These feeders must stay energized to maintain the frequency integrity of the ERCOT grid. They would only be shut off when the normal 60 Hz frequency of electricity falls below specified levels.

Hancock said that GP&L is balancing load among feeders and adding equipment to its other non-critical circuits to allow them to be designated as under-frequency feeders. This will allow an additional 34 feeders to be added to the current number of 49 feeders which were available to be shut off during the event. Theoretically this will allow a more equitable distribution of outages and shorter outages if they are ever mandated by ERCOT again.

I know this is all quite complicated and highly technical. For this reason, GP&L is also updating its website to remove much of the electric industry jargon and make its processes and operations more easily understood by the non-technical customer.

Finally, I would like to end on a happy note concerning our bond program. We broke ground November 18 on the Downtown Square redevelopment project. This project was many years in the making and will likely be another 18 to 24 months until it is complete. When it is finished, we will have another gem of a destination in Garland which should draw residents and visitors for many years to come. I encourage you to buildgarland. com for updates on this project and as well as the other bond projects.

Fats, Oils, and Grease

If your holiday cooking leaves some grease in the pan, don't pour it down the drain. Fats, oils, and grease can coat the inside of plumbing pipes, leading to clogs and backed up sewer lines.



The City of Garland offers these tips for properly disposing of fats, oils, and grease:

- Collect liquid cooking, oil, motor oil and grease in a tightly sealed container and take it to the Dallas County Home Chemical Collection Center.
- Dispose of cooking grease and fat by pouring it into a sealed container, let solidify and then discard in trash.
- Put leftover food in the trash or compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal.
- Use a paper towel to wipe greasy pots, pans, and dishes before washing them.

Holiday Safety Reminders

In addition to actively looking out for our neighbors—which is one of the best ways to keep our neighborhood safe—there are several things we can all do to stay safe this holiday season. The Garland Police Department offers several good safety tips for us to keep in mind during the holidays and all year long:

- 1. Lock your cars to help deter thieves who are looking for an easy target.
- 2. Remove valuables from your car—including holiday packages, shopping bags, guns, electronics, money, medicine, and jewelry.
- 3. Report suspicious activity. If you see suspicious activity or something (or somebody) that seems out of place, call the non-emergency number at 972-485-4840. (For an emergency or a crime in progress, call 911.) Remember to include details that go beyond race and gender such as behavior, vehicle description, location, time of day, hair, clothing, identifying marks, etc. Share any security camera video that may be helpful with Officer Barnes at BarnesT@garlandtx.gov.
- 4. Vacation Watch Request (free for Garland residents). If you plan to be out of town, consider having Volunteers in Policing check your home while you are gone. To fill out the Vacation Watch Request form, visit http://www.garlandpolice.com.
- 5. Discourage Porch Pirates with the following:
 - Track deliveries online and quickly retrieve packages from your porch as soon as they are delivered.
 - Have packages delivered to your office building or a remote pickup site. Amazon has several hub lockers around the city. Walgreens, FedEx, and UPS also offer similar options.
 - Ask your neighbor to collect packages from your porch when you are away from home.
 - Get a video doorbell (for example, Nest or Ring). They may not always stop a Porch Pirate in their tracks, but they can help police identify them later. NOTE: Video doorbells can be added to the Garland Video Crime Watch by going to the Garland Police Website. http://www.garlandpolice.com
