

City Council Update

I hope that your 2022 is off to a good start as we are all ready to move past the year that was 2021. Unfortunately in our city, the year ended with tragedy as three teenagers were shot in a convenience store just north of downtown. On January 10, another shooting between teenagers occurred in Armstrong Park in south Garland near IH-635.

In response to these events, the Police Department is putting more resources towards curbing gang violence and intervention in the local schools. Additionally, we will modify the City Budget at our January 18 meeting to fund seven additional positions within the Department and to purchase a Flock license plate reader and gunshot detection system.

Funding will be provided for five additional officers to supplement the existing Gang Unit. A Crime Analyst will be added to assist with complex social media and criminal intelligence, investigative analysis, collection, case support, link analysis, timelines, open-source and intelligence data of criminal investigations. Finally, a Mental Health Clinician will be added to provide continuous resiliency training to police staff and to assist the current Mental Health and Homeless Liaison Officers.

The Flock system will be used to read license plates at selected locations and provide real-time data to the police. The data will be compared against a database for vehicles which come back as stolen or were used in crimes, street racing, and Amber or Silver alerts. The gunshot detection system will triangulate the sound of gunshots to provide more accurate real-time location data than is typically received from citizen reports though the 911 system. All of this data will be encrypted and secured on the AWS Government Cloud and will require a specific search reason by the Police Department to access the data. The data is owned by the Police Department and will not be sold or shared by Flock.

Oakridge Street Repairs

The City started working on Oakridge streets in November 2021. In January I spoke with Dustin (in the Garland Street Department) to get an update on what is being done. Currently they are stabilizing all the panels that need stabilization by spraying foam underneath. This will be completed in the next few weeks.

The day that I spoke with Dustin, they were in the process of asking contractors to bid on street panel replacement. The bidding process takes 4 weeks. The work will start in early spring of 2022. All panels currently marked with white arrows will be replaced. The street department came in last year and graded our streets. Oakridge must have received a grade of 60 or above (out of 100), making us eligible for panel replacement rather than new streets.

Once the street department is ready to begin panel replacement, they will put hangers/flyers on our front doors with a 2-week notice and instructions (i.e., where to park, etc.). The whole process is projected to end late 2023.

As we step in to 2022, we are looking for ways to maintain and expand these efforts. The ONA is positioned to encourage neighborhood unity, and the Board works hard to get that done. That's where we need more help from you. Come out and join us in this effort. We would love to hear from neighbors who have creative ideas and a heart to serve the neighborhood.

We have two General Meetings coming up: the 4th Thursdays of February and May. (Keep an eye on the website for details.) At the February meeting, the General Membership will put a Nominating Committee in place to assemble a slate of Board candidates for the coming 2022-2023 year (the new year begins June 1st).

This is a great time to raise your hand and volunteer!

While we have many volunteer opportunities (see page 3 of this newsletter), I would like to take a moment to highlight an especially important volunteer role: District Director. The District Director (we have 7 of them) is the most active and important job on the Board. It involves being in the districts and being active with neighbors, reaching out on behalf of the ONA and serving as a conduit for folks to reach back. We need signs put out and taken up, new neighbors welcomed, etc. Our District Directors are people who care a lot about Oakridge and have some time and ability to help. We need folks to raise their hand and step forward to fill these important positions.




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Oakridge Crime Watch

Thanks to everyone for the best year on record for reported crimes in Oakridge.



What were the most most frequent crimes reported in Oakridge last year?

#1 (40%) Burglary from vehicles. Many thefts were from *unlocked vehicles*. Please lock your car and remove valuables—especially your guns and keys. If possible, park your car in the garage.

#2 (20%) Mail Theft/"Porch Pirates". Keep an eye out for your package deliveries and bring them inside as soon as they arrive. If you aren't available to receive a delivery, consider having a neighbor pick up the package or arrange to have your items delivered to a business.

#3 (10%) Catalytic Converter Theft. Police around the country are dealing with a trend of stealing then selling catalytic converters. It only takes 30 seconds for thieves to steal one. Be on alert for suspicious activity around vehicles and call 9-1-1. Anyone with video is asked to please email Officer Barnes at <u>BarnesT@garlandtx.gov</u>. Thanks to Garland Police for cracking down on this type of theft here in Oakridge.

Oakridge has a long history of active involvement in the Neighborhood Crime Watch program. In 2021, we became the first **Video Crime Watch Neighborhood** in Garland. Many of you with security cameras (e.g., Ring) have signed up to participate in this program that allows Garland Police to quickly reach out to those in the vicinity of a crime to identify suspects. Oakridge also participates in Garland Police Department programs like **Citizens on Patrol (COPs)**. Our COP volunteers patrol Oakridge in marked vehicles at various hours every month. Safety Tips

How did we keep our crime rates so low in 2021 and what can we do in 2022 to continue to keep Oakridge safe?

Get to know your neighbors. Get to know the neighbors on all sides of you. Go for walks and spend time in your front yard. Join us for ONA-sponsored events like National Night Out or Spring Fling.

Watch out for your neighbors. Oakridge prides itself on a long history of neighbors watching out for each other. Each month we continue to hear many examples of neighbors helping neighbors in Oakridge. For example, a set of keys was found on the sidewalk at Peakwood and were returned to their rightful owner because the residents knew that one of their neighbors regularly walks her dog along that path and they also knew the type of car she drives (which matched what was on the keys).

Learn the daily pattern of your street. Each area of the neighborhood has daily patterns of activity. This includes neighbors who walk/jog regularly, people who walk dogs, families riding bikes, and cars that come and go. If you pay attention, you will gradually start to notice what is normal for your street and what is suspicious.

Discourage criminals. Outdoor security lights and cameras help discourage criminal mischief. Keeping your vehicles locked (remove valuables) and making sure to retrieve your packages promptly from your front porch will help to deter opportunistic thieves.

Report any suspicious activity. Call the non-emergency number at 972-485-4840 to report any suspicious activity. Be detailed in your description.

- Behavior What was the person doing that made you suspicious?
- Appearance Hair, clothing (head to toe), identifying marks. Race or gender alone is not enough.
- Vehicle Make, model, color, direction of travel, license plate
- Location & Time Address, date, time
- Video footage If you have video camera footage of the activity, contact Officer Barnes at <u>BarnesT@garlandtx.gov</u>.


Report Power Outages

Report outages by calling 972-205-3000 or texting OUT to 972-205-4000. Surge Protectors

Are your electronic devices protected from power surges/spikes that can occur with power outages, tripped circuit breakers, or (more rarely) lightning strikes? Surge protectors are a great way to help protect your electronic investments.

Are surge protectors and power strips the same thing? Surge protectors come in a variety of shapes and sizes, including some that look like power strips. As a result, many people incorrectly assume all power strips offer surge protection. When shopping for a surge protector, always read the product description to make sure you are purchasing something that can protect against power surges or spikes.
