## The Homeless in Garland

Handling the homeless is a full-time job. Garland Police work 4-10 hour days, but the Homeless Liaison/Task Force spends extra time outside those hours. It is difficult to determine the number of homeless in Garland, but there are hundreds. Recently, Dallas forced 1,500 homeless to leave Dallas. It is likely that many of them came to Garland. The officers know most of their names and have contact with their families.

Often the homeless live in a world of drugs, hunger, sex, crime, abandonment, and violence—which leads to mental issues. There aren't enough places to help them, nor do all of them want that help.

Many of them have no ID. The Task Force works with the DMV and others to solve this problem.

Why are they on the street? Can't get along with family; did not do well in school or at a job; some seeking adventure. In many instances they have been given a place to stay, but they don't stay there. They hit the streets again.

In many cases the homeless occupy private property; authorities step in and give them 4 days to remove their possessions. Police move in and remove what is left but keep it for 4 days. If not retrieved, the "recovered debris" is sent to the landfill.

How about the persons on corners begging for money? Hold it!!! On average, 8 out of 10 of those folks are not homeless; they are entrepreneurs. They are con artists stealing from you, living off of you. Stories of them driving off in a Caddy or a Benz are true. The other two persons in that equation NEED your help. But which ones? You have to make that decision.

You can help best through charities. The homeless are not horrible people! They are people who need HELP.

**How can you help?** Contact charities like Good Sam, Hope's Door New Beginning Center, The Salvation Army, and many others. They know the needs of these people better than you and I. Contact them and donate your usable clothes; things you haven't worn in months or years. See if your church is working with them.

The information for this article came from the March 16th meeting of Oakridge Gentlemen where guest speakers from the Homeless Liaison/Task Force of the Garland Police Department— Officer Wendy Sheriff and Zoning Inspector from Garland Code Compliance Department, Dedra Johnson—presented information on the Homeless in Garland. We thank them for their time.

## City Council Update

For this month's update, I would like to focus on one area of our Council Meetings that gets little attention from the public, although it is always the largest allocation of taxpayer's dollars of any item on our agenda. The item I am referring to is the portion of the consent agenda that is for the approval of bid items. It is during this item that we as a Council approve the purchase of the many goods and services that the city uses to perform its duties as a municipal service provider.

Think of the City as a large conglomerate company that provides many items and services to its tax-paying citizens. Whereas a company like Apple may focus solely on technology products, the City of Garland must provide services across a wide variety of fields. You know many of the services already which include fire and police protection; weekly trash and bulk goods pick-up; water and electricity service; the operation of four libraries, six recreation centers, two senior centers, and dozens of parks; and the animal health services provided in our new Animal Shelter and Adoption Center, but there are many others as well.

I would like to highlight below some of the more interesting items (to me) that we approved from each Council Meeting since the beginning of the year.

During our January 4 meeting, we approved \$299,280 for the purchase of tubular steel for the construction of 138kV transmission structures. These structures form the large transmission towers along roadways and in easements that Garland Power & Light uses to safely and reliably relay power to our substations throughout the city.

On January 18, we approved \$1,822,302 in funding for the demolition of existing restroom and concession buildings and the construction of five new restroom and concession buildings at Bradfield Park, Central Park Football and Baseball Fields, Holford Park and Audubon Park. This project is a portion of Proposition D - Parks and Recreation from the voter approved 2019 Bond Program.

February 1 saw us approve the purchase of construction services of Landfill Cell No. 9 for \$5,825,000. Waste disposal at Hinton Landfill must follow strict Texas Commission on Environmental Quality standards, and we must construct future cells before the current ones are full. This additional cell will provide up to six years of airspace at the current rate of waste acceptance.

We approved the purchase of shelf-ready audiovisual library materials on February 15 for \$220,000. With new media and learning material constantly being produced,

this purchase will allow us to have the latest best-selling novels, reference materials and electronic resources available for check-out and use by our library patrons.

At our first meeting of March we approved \$566,609 for the replacement of water and wastewater mains in Forest Lane and Country Club. It is through purchases like this that we do our best to maintain the miles of underground infrastructure utilized by the city to provide fresh drinking water and to remove waste.

Finally on March 15, we approved \$205,500 for the purchase of two explosive ordnance disposal robots. The Police Department currently has two robots from 1998 and 2004 which are now obsolete and showing their age. The new robots will support our SWAT and Bomb Units.

At our March 15th meeting, we recognized our Garland Purchasing Department who won the Achievement of Excellence in Procurement Award for the 23rd consecutive year. Their efforts have saved the taxpayer more than \$8M over the past year through the procurement of over \$300M in goods and services while dealing with supply change and labor issues during the pandemic.

I am so proud of everything the City of Garland provides to its citizens while being good stewards of the taxpayer's dollars. I encourage you to view our Council Agendas posted on the City's website to see all of the other various goods and services that are purchased each council meeting.

- And more...




